

To Start Within 30 Days

Construction was started today on a new ice cream and milk plant the Banner Creamery, headed O. D. Dillingham of Abilene, with expectation that the business will be in operation within thirty days. The plant is being located at the corner of Baird and Kentucky streets, a block south of the Walker-Smith Wholesale grocery, and will be equipped with the most modern type of machinery and equipment for manufacture of ice cream products and for pasteurization of milk, Dillingham said.

The plant and business here will be managed by Houts O. Lamar, well known to the trade for his ten years connection at Midland. Re-frigerated trucks will be used to supply milk and ice cream products to oil field towns to the west. The trucks are equipped to keep ice cream at five degrees below zero and milk products at 45 degrees temperature.

Increased market for milk produced locally will be created by the new business, Dillingham said. He has made contracts for milk from several dairy herds and seeks to enter into additional contracts. He pointed out that the new Banner Creamery is a manufacturing plant and not just a storage plant. Home offices are at Abilene where Dillingham himself lives.

The brick building, 50 by 60 feet in size, is being constructed by C. Roberts, general contractor. An ice plant and milk pasteurization plant also will be built at Odessa, Dillingham said.
