\$800,000 PLAN

Wheat Growers Membership Discuss Proposed Expansion

About 65 members, only 15 percent of the total membership of Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc., met at the Bovina Schools auditorium Thursday night of last week to discuss the possibility of building new grain handling facilities for the cooperative.

Meeting with the group were Frank Phariss of Amarillo, general manager of Producers Grain Corporation, and Arnold Pritchard of Amarillo, grain merchandiser for PGC. Phariss gave a brief resume of the past history of the association with PGC and expressed pleasure with the work of the local cooperative the past several years.

An open discussion followed with Walter Potts, president of the board of directors, in charge of the discussion.

Members attending the meeting agreed unanimously that the

cooperative needed new storage facilities and discussed methods of financing the project and what facilities would be required.

Preliminary plans, according to Larry Webb, manager of the cooperative, call for new storage facilities to be constructed which would add one million bushels or 56 million pounds to the elevator's present capacity. Also included in the initial plans are the construction of two load-out bins, two high-speed capacity legs for receiving grain and two dumping stations, one regular and one for tractor-trailer rigs.

Total cost of the project is estimated at between \$800,000 and \$850,000, according to Webb. "We will need to raise about \$300,000 from the membership of the cooperative for the building project," Webb commented. The estimated cost

Freak Accident Claims Life Of Bovina Woman

A freak accident here Tuesday afternoon of last week claimed the life of Mrs. Bonnie Mae Stanberry, 57, a long-time resident of Bovina. According to reports, Mrs. Stanberry had taken a co-worker at Gee Cleaners, Miss Apolonia Sierra, to her home at 101 Avenue B about 3 that afternoon. Apparently, when Mrs. Stanberry backed the car out to leave, the rear wheels "high centered" on a rise in the intersection of Avenue B and East

Street. Mrs. Stanberry and Miss Sierra were attempting to push the car off the high place when, apparently, the door of the car knocked Mrs. Stanberry underneath the vehicle which then backed over her.

Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home ambulance carried Mrs. Stanberry to the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona where she received emergency treatment. She died at 6:50 p.m., about four hours after the accident.

Funeral services for Mrs. Stanberry were held Thursday afternoon in the Bovina Church of Christ with Cecil Bunch, minister, officiating. Burial was in the Bovina Cemetery under direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

A native of Bellville, Ark., Mrs. Stanberry had lived in Bovina 22

years. She was married to T.D. Stanberry in 1935 at Danville, Ark. A member of the Bovina Pentecostal Holiness Church here, Mrs. Stanberry had been employed at Gee Cleaners for the past six years.

Survivors include her husband; four sons, Buford Stanberry, Dean Stanberry and Danny Stanberry, all of Bovina, and Harold Stanberry of Farwell; one daughter, Mrs. Brenda McNeely of Bovina; two sisters, Mrs. Alfred Stanberry of Bovina and Mrs. Wayne Webb of Fort Worth; and 12 grandchildren.

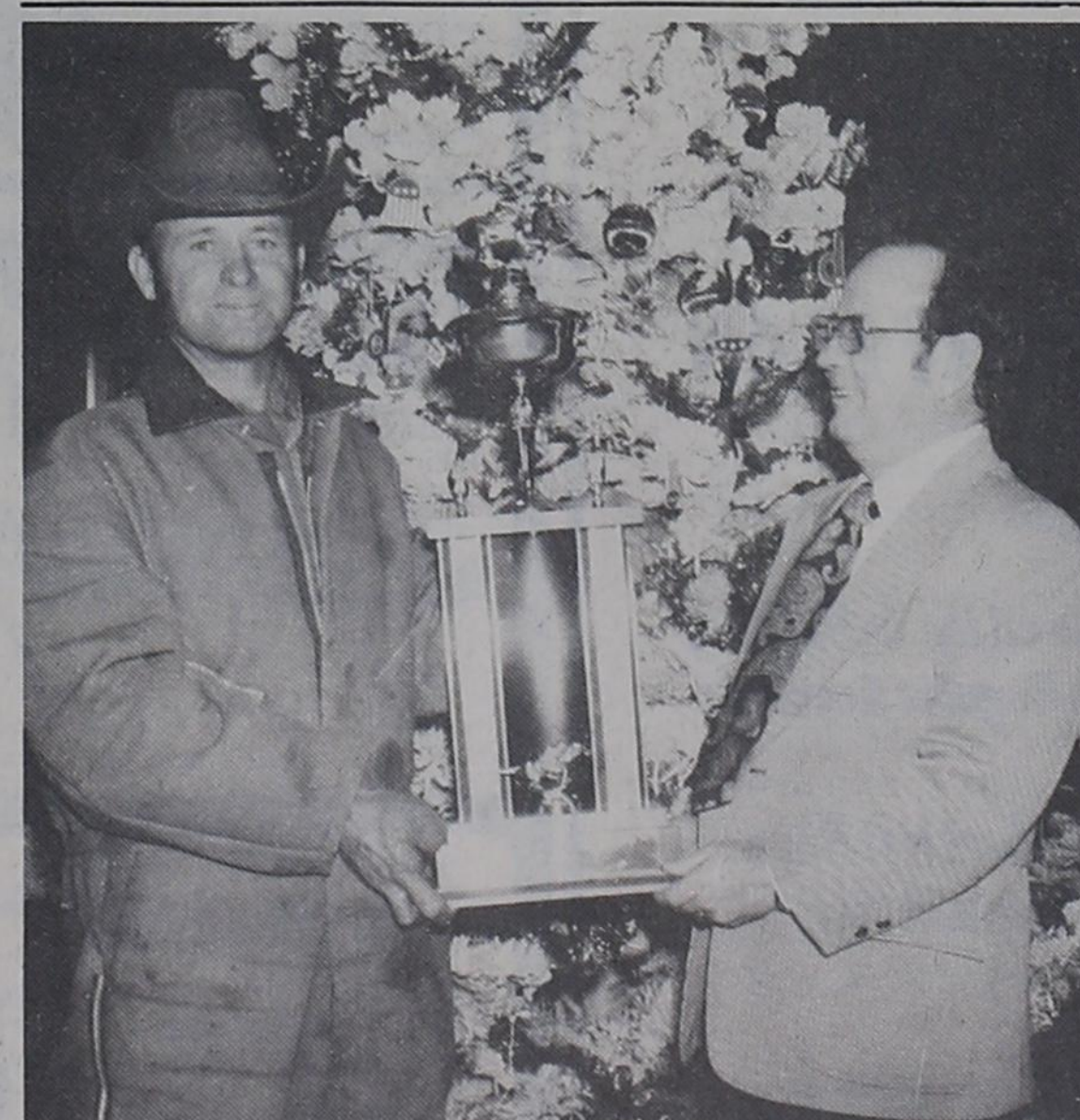

Panhandle Agency Gets New Grant

Congressman George Mahon announced last week from his Washington, D.C., office an administration and general community programming grant in the amount of \$93,468 from the Community Services Administration to the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation.

Purpose of the grant, according to Mahon, is to allow the agency to continue its program of basic outreach and to maintain its system of comprehensive neighborhood centers.

The grant will serve 25 counties, including Parmer and Deaf Smith, beginning Jan. 1.

The Bovina Neighborhood Center, which serves Parmer County, works through the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation.

Add New Donations To Fire Truck Fund

Two donations toward a new fire truck for the city of Bovina were reported this week by Gaylon Rhodes, fire chief.

C.N. "Big Nick" Trienen donated \$25 per fireman, or a total of \$575, to the fund, according to Rhodes. A donation was also received from Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wilson.

The two donations bring the total amount in the fund to approximately \$5,675, according to Rhodes. The fund was initiated about one year ago.

According to Rhodes, a new fire truck will be needed within the next two years for Bovina to maintain its present key rate on fire insurance. "We now have two fire trucks that meet state standards," Rhodes stated, "however, in about two and one-half years one of our fire trucks will be 30-years old and will not count at all as far as fire fighting equipment is concerned. It doesn't matter if the truck is in excellent shape, the fact that it is 30 years old will cause it to be erased as far as the state is concerned."

Rhodes said the fire department "priced" fire trucks about a year ago and the type truck needed here

cost approximately \$33,000. "The same truck now costs between \$40,000 and \$50,000 and there is no way to estimate how much it will cost in two years," he commented. Rhodes said when the discussions began last year, city councilmen felt the city could not afford to purchase a new truck at that time.

"We are going to try to raise all we can in the fire department toward the purchase of a new truck," he stated.

"We would appreciate any donation, no matter how small or how large, toward the purchase of a new truck," the fire chief commented.

Rhodes also reported the fire department had recently purchased new hats, coats and boots for the volunteer firemen.

The purchases were made through donations and fund-raising projects with no money coming from the city treasury, said Rhodes.

"It's the first time since I've been associated with the fire department for all 22 men to be fully equipped," the fire chief noted.

Bovina High School basketball teams took four wins over Lazbuddie teams in games played there Tuesday night of last week.

The Filly JV opened the night with a 36-30 win over the host team. Sandi Sides chipped in 26 points, 10 of those in the final period of play, for the Fillies. Tamara Lambert added seven, Lezli Williams two and Denise McCormick one point.

Jennings was high scorer for Lazbuddie with 20 points. Lazbuddie was charged with 17 fouls in the contest and converted on 12 of 19 from the line.

Bovina's basketball teams lost four of four games in the Spring-lake-Earth tournament this past weekend.

The Fillies were downed, 21-46, in their opening game Thursday. Dianna Naegle scored eight points, Cathy Trimble seven and Connie Ware, Kim Ware and Georgia Terry two points each.

The Fillies were charged with 18 fouls and connected on three of nine attempts from the line. Hale Center, paced by Terri Henry's 22 points, were charged with 14 fouls and connected on six of 18 free throws.

The Fillies were eliminated by Silverton the following day in a heartbreaker, 47-49. Trimble tossed in 25 points, Naegle 13 and Connie Ware nine.

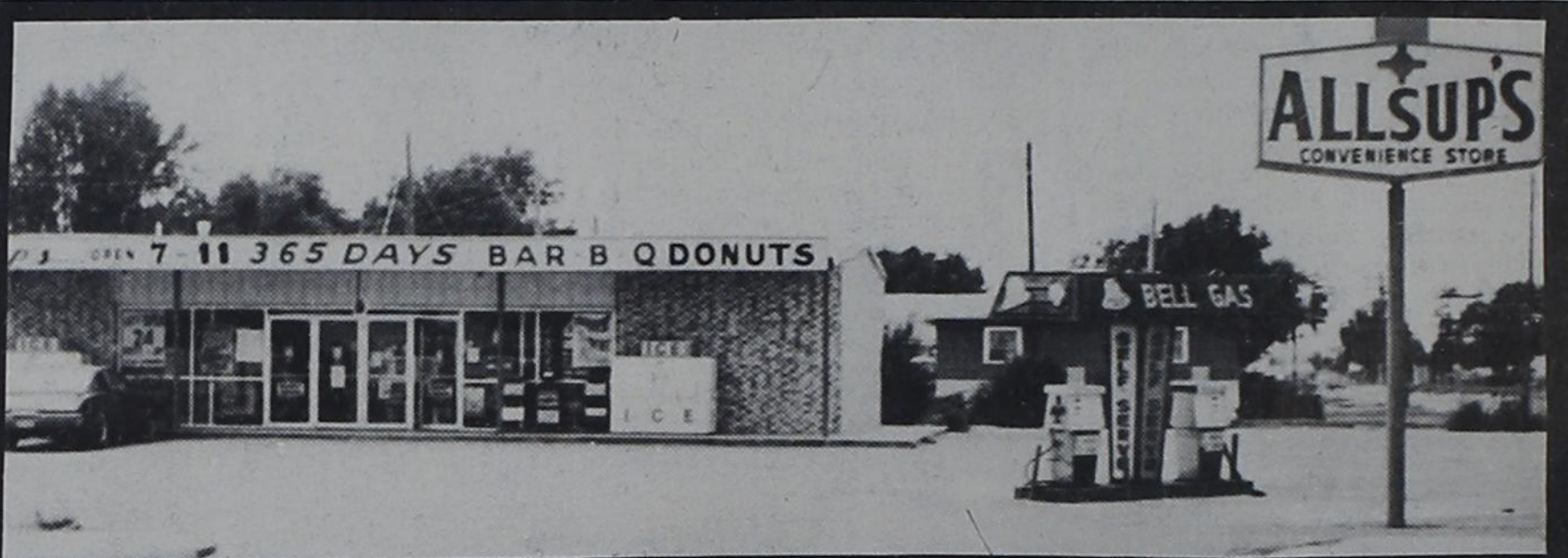

In a shell

Have been silent for two years, out of some latent sense of propriety we suppose, and good grief, everyone knows that's almost impossible for a woman.

Two years ago the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department sent out a batch of pheasant photos to be used in conjunction with the hunting season. Would imagine that all the area newspapers received the packet.

Don't know how many other newspaper-people noticed, but one of the photos was of a hunting dog with three dead pheasants at his feet. Beautiful picture! Just one thing wrong—the middle bird was definitely a HEN.

Now it's easy to understand how a novice hunter can, and does, get "buck fever" his first time out and mistake a hen for a rooster when that big bird flies up right under his feet—but for the government agency in charge of all that stuff to let that photograph slip by just strikes our "funny bone." And it was so tempting to print that picture with the proper label, "photo courtesy of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department."

Never can get a word in edgewise when all the hunters are telling their tall tales, so we'll just write about our experience.

Let's see now, we've lived in Bovina 12 years so the statute of limitations has run out on shooting hens, we hope, in South Dakota. Surely they wouldn't send a game warden all the way to Texas to drag us back to face the music.

At the time we lived in South Dakota (about 40 miles north of Pierre) the pheasant population was something to behold. They were as hard to spot there during hunting season as they are in Parmer County. Maybe even more difficult because they had so much more cover in that country.

Our better half finally, reluctantly, consented to go hunting with us one afternoon. Just walking the fence rows on our place—him on one side of the fence and me on the other.

Visibly bored by the whole process and absolutely certain the pheasants were in no danger, he was ambling along paying no attention to anything. The blast of the shotgun aroused him from his reverie and he looked up in time to see a pheasant hen falling on his side of the fence. We were so excited that we were jumping up and down and hollering

at him to get that bird. Never did find that pheasant. Think he was so "discombobulated" by the whole thing he didn't even know what he was looking for.

That should have been all of our hunting, only we went one more time. However, the only thing we could hit were the hens because they fly slower, so that ended our pheasant hunting trips. Better Half didn't relish running into any game wardens with us along.

Connie Baird of Abilene and his friend, Ron English, visited with us over the weekend. Connie is an old high school friend who was an All-Border Conference football player when he attended Hardin-Simmons.

Hope Connie and Ron enjoyed their hunt. We've had a hard time persuading him to come this far to hunt pheasants. This was the first time for either of the two men to hunt pheasants and they claimed it was worth the trip. Connie wondered why pheasants wouldn't do well around Abilene. Suppose if they have enough small grain crops in that part of the country, the birds should do well there. They would have more cover than here.

Didn't get out in the country the last few days before season started, but it would be well for the game wardens to be prowling around then. There is just too much "early" hunting going on. We think most farmers would agree to that.

Heard that some hunters in the Running Water Draw area north of Clovis shot two calves Saturday morning, apparently "mistaking" the animals for pheasants. Not likely, of course. Such things are the results of carelessness and sometimes just plain meanness.

It has been widely publicized that most of the land in this area is privately owned and hunters should definitely get permission from landowners before hunting on private property. However, some hunters continue to show a lack of consideration and this could cause some serious trouble.

We don't blame the angry landowner who looks out and sees a small army of hunters scrambling across his fields and pastures with shotguns blasting in every direction. That type of behavior could cause landowners to protest having a season at all. And that would be a shame.

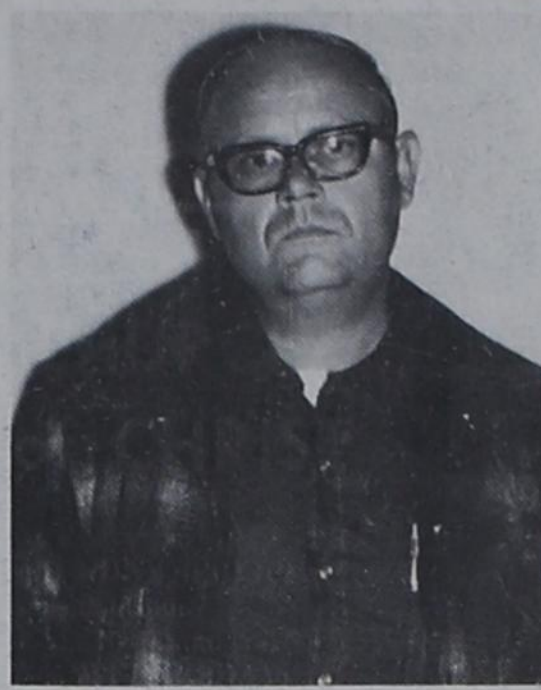
Wassom Receives Promotion

Beginning at 10 a.m., the pastry wagon will call on businesses and homes with Christmas candy, cookies and other baked goods to sell.





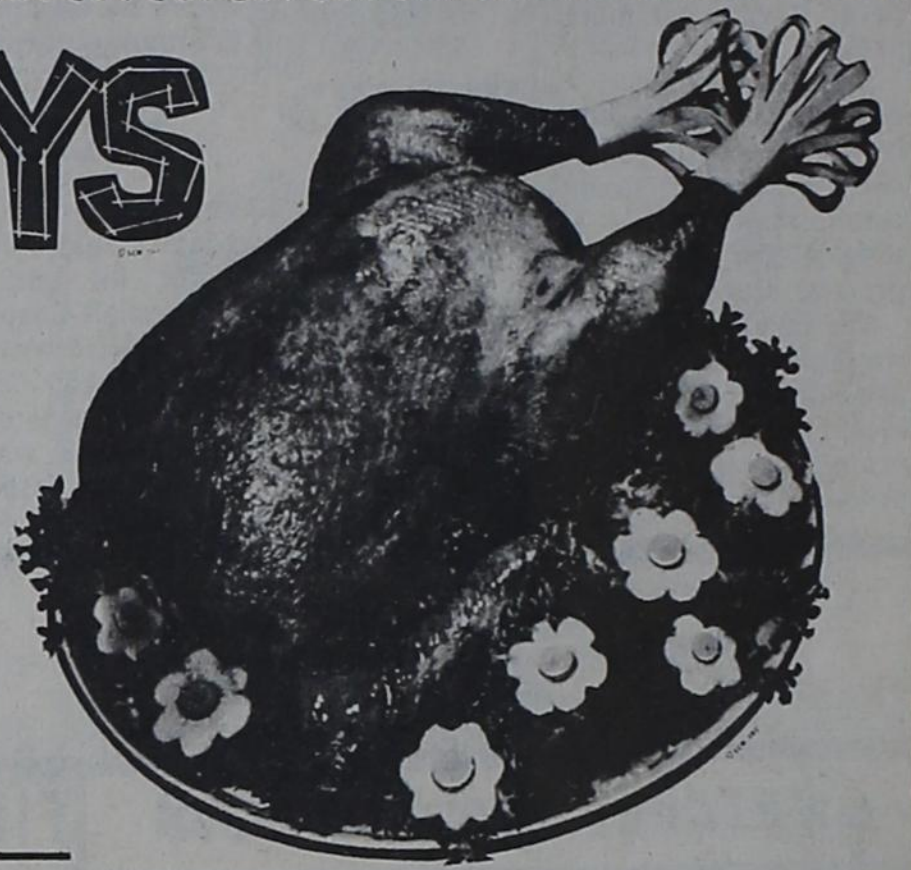
