

SHOWERS COVER MUCH OF COUNTY FIRST OF WEEK

Falling in the space of twenty minutes, rain amounting to .08 of an inch at Midland and .59 of an inch at the army airdrome further benefited grass and crops Monday afternoon.

Later in the evening, clouds indicated good showers to the northeast and east of Midland. The shower here fell between 3:40 and 4 p. m., as did the one at the airport.

The precipitation in the city of Midland approached the one inch mark, earlier showers having fallen over the week end.



JAMES ROOSEVELT Fines Assessed Four Officers in APPEARS BEFORE INQUIRY BOARD

WASHINGTON. July 13. (AP) -James Roosevelt, eldest son of the President, made an unheralded appearance before the tax inquiry committee today to deny that he had any interest in a Bahamas personal holding company.

Rep. Treadway of Massachusetts demanded that young Roosevelt submit his income tax report for 1935 for study by the committee, and Roosevelt said he was willing. However, the committee declined to press the demand. Shortly afterwards, the names of

Fire Death of Husband Leads to Murder Charge

POST. July 13. (AP) -Twenty-oneyear-old Cloe Johnson was charged with murder Monday afternoon after 50 witnesses had been questioned in a court of injuiry which sought to learn the cause of death early Sunday of Bob Johnson, the woman's 21-year-old crippled hus-

Johnson's body, almost consumed was raked from the embers of his farm shack in the Pleasant Valley community after Jfrs. Johnson had fled in darkness before dawn to the home of Mrs. J. I. Northcutt and sobbed out a story of awakening to find the two-room residence aflame and rushing out just before the walls and roof collapsed—and without awakening her husband.

The pretty woman, whose parents live at Merkel, had made no indication she wished arraignment for the purpose of obtaining her liberty on bail, said County Attorney Joe Moss, who had questioned the witnesses in the court of inquiry conducted before County Judge Int Weakley and who Sunday night had grilled her.

The young bride was held in Garza county jail tonight.

JAIL SENTENCES REMITTED AFTER JUDGE'S VERDIC RAYMONDVILLE. July 13. (AP)

-County Judge W. E. McCharen today fined State Ranger Power Fenner and Game Warden Morgan Miller \$50 each for contempt of court, growing out of the arrest of Louis Lamadrid, deputy constable who was investigating the mysterious disappearance of Luther, and John Blanton.

Judge McCharen also assessed a fine of \$50 against the Willacy county sheriff's department, saying the department could pay or the fine could be paid jointly by Sheriff H. T. Crags and Jailer Mallie Brownfield, who also were held guilty of contempt.

The three day jail sentences first assessed against Fenner and Miller were remitted. All of the defendants gave notice of appeal to the crim-inal court of appeals.

House Asked to **Override Veto of Cheap Rate Loans**

WASHINGTON. July 13. (AP) -The agriculture committee voted today to ask the house to override the president's vetoe of legislation continuing for two years the three and a half per cent interest rate loans by the federal land banks.

President Roosevelt Monday ve toed a bill which would have set the rate of interest of Federal Land Bank loans at 3 1/2 per cent for the fiscal year 1938 and at 4 per cent for the fiscal year of 1939.

The Chief Executive returned the measure without his signature on the ground it would cost the Government \$52,900,000 during the twoyear period in the form of what would amount to "gifts to individual borrowers from the Federal

Anyone but Ham Fish

A CERTAIN amount of odor has been stirred up Congressman Hamilton Fish's charges that President Roosevelt himself has been guilty of tax avoidance or evasion. There would be more general interest in this, however, if the charges came from anyone but Ham Fish.

Somewhere between the Treas ury and Department of Justic stands responsibility for the \$76,000 tax suit against Mayor Daniel Shields of Johnstown, Pa., who has led the anti-union movement in the steel strike there. The administration is pro-labor, of course, but this case dates back to 1925.


Shields was convicted, retired, reconvicted and sentenced after a prohibition raid on a Johnstown brewery. Shields finally was pardoned by Roosevelt on recommendation of Senator Guffey. But now the government decides he should pay taxes on 12,000 barrels of illegal beer and 400 gallons of liquor seized in 1925.
