THE BIGGEST SCAM, or rip-off, involving the unsuspecting public is the notification by mail that "you may already have won a wonderful prize."

These sweepstakes-type promotions start hitting the mail about the week after Christmas, and jam your mailbox, most generally at the Postal Service's bulk mailing rate, until the wee hours of summer.

Generally, you don't have to order any merchandise to be eligible for these fabulous prizes, but the usual gimmick is to make it appear that your chances will be greatly enhanced if you do send in for the magazines, flower bulbs, or whatever else is being offered.

A new gimmick appearing on some of the mailers is the request that you call the company, on a "900" number, if you are interested in claiming your "prize."

One of our readers informed us recently that she learned after calling the 900 number that she would be billed \$39.95 for the call.

Whichever telephone company invented the 900 calling system may in time become just about as popular as the postal official who devised the "bulk mail" system. The only difference is the fact that with the boxholder mail, most people just toss what they don't want into the trash can.

However, the 900 calling system is still somewhat new, and many folks confuse it with the older, 1-800 system, which provides a person with a free long-distance call.

You can see that if the company generates in the vicinity of \$40.00 per returned call, then it will pretty quickly raise plenty of money for their coffers, whether or not they ever award any of the appealing prizes.

Just this week, for example, we received the notification that we were the probable winners of one of the following prizes: \$100,000 in cash; a Chrysler LeBaron convertible automobile; a stereo system with C.D.; an expensive bicycle; a Caribbean cruise for two, or a Sharp 19-inch color television set.

Who in their right mind wouldn't be happy to be picked as the possible winner of one of these prizes?

Postal patrons probably need to tell themselves when they receive a mailer such as this: "This sounds too good to be true." The general rule of thumb is that if it does sound too good to be true, then it probably is highly suspect.

Also, notice the outside of the envelope. If the company is mailing the notification of your winnings in a "bulk rate" envelope, you can be pretty certain that you haven't won anything, because this is the type of mail they would use to send the same letter to hundreds of thousands of mail customers.

These companies, whose very business borders ever-so-closely on mail fraud, don't even bother to pay first class rates like the majority of us postal patrons have to pay.

In the case of the flower bulb company mailer that we received this week, if we had opted to return the entry blank (which we didn't), we would have had to pay full first-class--now 29 cents--in order to do so. Anyone who sends the company an order so as to claim their "ten free bonus prizes" could easily spend \$100 on the items the company has for sale--and they aren't even bothering to pay your return postage. Not only that, you're being charged fully for the shipping of the items back to you.

Be very careful in your approach to this type of promotion. It could wind up costing you a lot of money for some merchandise you didn't even want in the first place.

Another rule is not to give out your credit card number to telephone solicitations. We understand that this type of gimmick has expanded to telephone solicitors.

Grant To Provide Paving

A grant in the amount of \$5,000 was received from Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. and will be used to pay for the paving around the EMS building on Third Street and all other debts owed.

Coleman Young was responsible for securing the grant. He is manager of Agri-Sprayers, Inc., one of Pioneer's dealers who lives and works in rural areas. By contributing to worthy programs and organizations in the areas where Pioneer employees and customers live and work, they are investing in the future success and prosperity in the communities they serve.

The projects Pioneer support must have local community support and commitment and demonstrate the potential to make a positive difference with long-lasting effects on the community.

The range for funding is \$500 to \$5,000. The Pioneer Company policy prohibits funding for individual use but is available for on-going projects that will serve the whole community.

P.C. Hospital Plans To Form District

After much study, the Board of Directors of Parmer County Community Hospital has announced the decision to ask the Parmer County Commissioners Court to call an election to create a hospital district.

The successful election would create a hospital district throughout Parmer County with the exception of the portions of the county included in the Muleshoe and Farwell Hospital Districts.

After one hundred registered voter names are collected on the petitions, they will be presented to the Commissioners Court and an election will be called. All of Parmer County with the exception of those citizens living in the Muleshoe and Farwell Hospital Districts will be eligible to vote on the proposal.

The successful campaign will

enable the hospital district board to levy up to 25 cents per \$100 assessed property value for support of health services. After 1993, sales tax revenues could be used to augment hospital district revenues.

Revenues raised by the hospital district would be used to repair and upgrade the hospital facility, acquire and replace health care equipment, and recruitment and retention of trained health care professionals.

"The creation of the hospital district will ensure that the facility and professionals will continue to be available to provide quality basic health care services to the community while providing access to the more specialized services when these services are needed," said Phil Langston, spokesman for the hospital.

Clinic Is Set For Shots

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for the month of March. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella and mumps.

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The town nearest to Bovina is Hereford at 914 East Park Avenue and the times and dates are: March 14, 21 and 28. The time is 9-11:30 a.m. and 1-4 p.m.

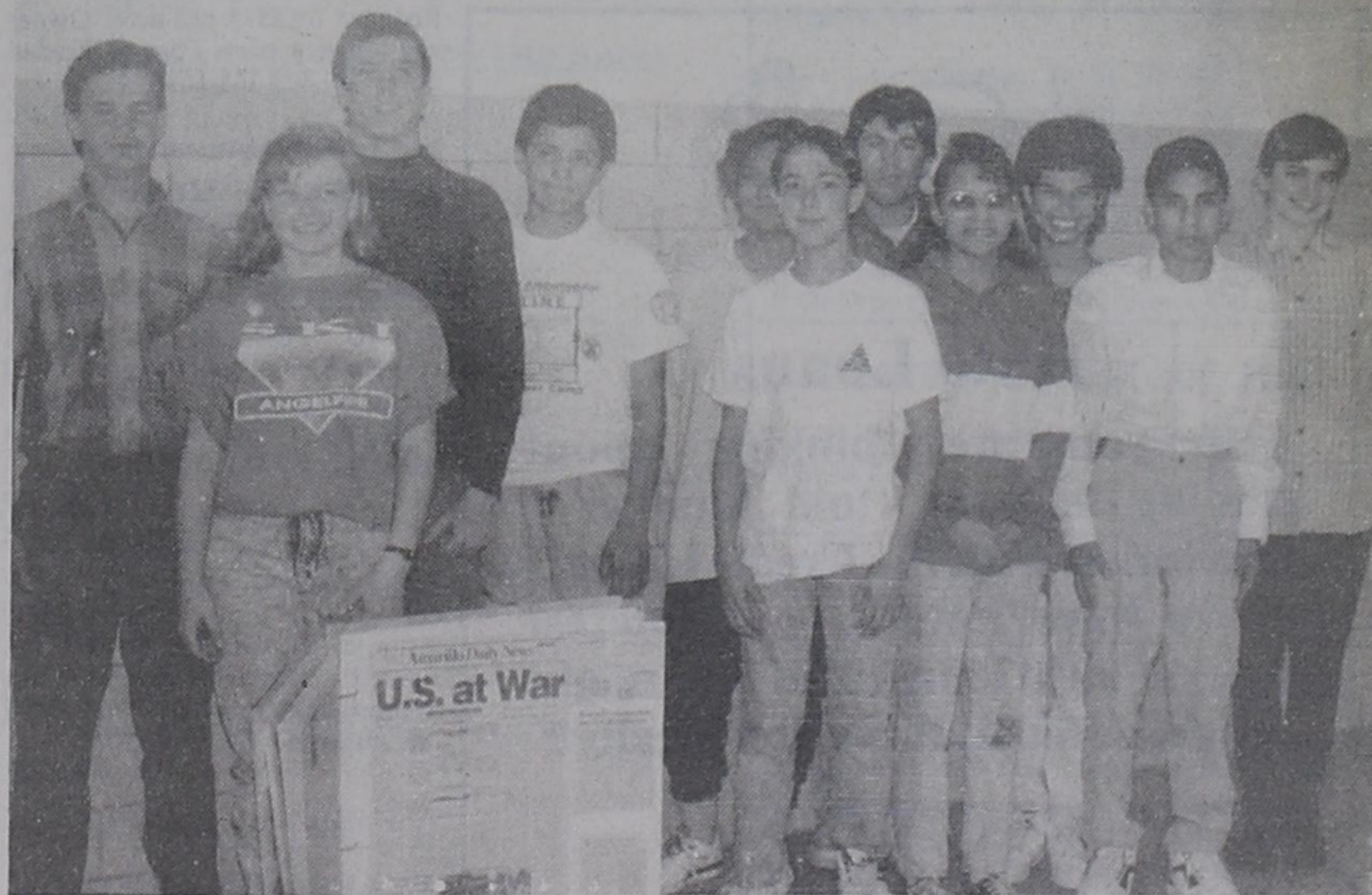



Angler's Corner

The approach of spring signals the upcoming spawning season for the area walleyes. While many gamefish spawn sometime during the spring, the walleye is the first to watch for as it spawns in considerably colder water than other area gamefish.
Areas chosen by the walleye will be from one to six feet deep consisting of pea-sized gravel up to fist-sized rocks. Walleyes spawn in areas exposed to the wind as continual aeration of the eggs are necessary for their survival.
The males will move in first even if the temperature is near the freezing mark. As the water warms up into the lower forties, the females move in. They will stay in adjacent deep water until a few weeks before the spawn at which time they move into the shallows to feed.

Look for the actual spawning to take place when the water temperature reaches around forty-five to fifty-five degrees. Not all females will be ready to spawn at the same time hence the prolonged spawning period. A harsh cold front can suspend the spawning for a day or two and prolonged cold fronts can cause the fish to reabsorb the eggs with no spawn.

After spawning, the females go into a recuperation period during which they will not feed. This may last as long as two weeks after which they will go on a feeding binge and produce some of the year's best walleye angling. The

males continue to feed and stay around the eggs for up to four weeks after the females have spawned.

The walleye will not make a discernable "nest" in which to deposit the eggs. They rely on the crevices between the rocks and gravel to protect the eggs from predators.
Start with the northern end of any lake as it receives the most sun and warms faster. Next check for the gravel and small rocks, then look for the most wind-blown stretch that falls within these parameters. Also, keep in mind that like the bass, the walleye prefers a deep water "escape route" near the spawning grounds. Putting these factors together should eliminate a lot of unproductive water and wasted time.

One thing to keep in mind about fishing during any spawn is the fact that the fish are slaves to their nature and are easy targets during this time. Over-harvest of the fish during the spawn can lead to a downturn in fishing on that particular body of water for many years to come.

\$462,272, make up the remainder of the refund.

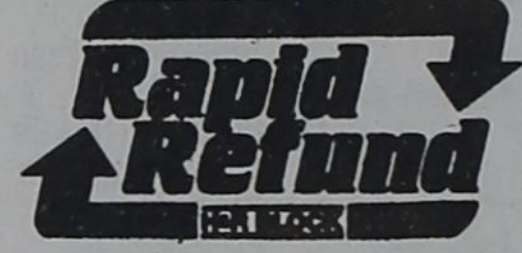

On February 5, during the time between the varsity girls and boys basketball games, a patriotic tribute to the troops in the Persian Gulf was held.

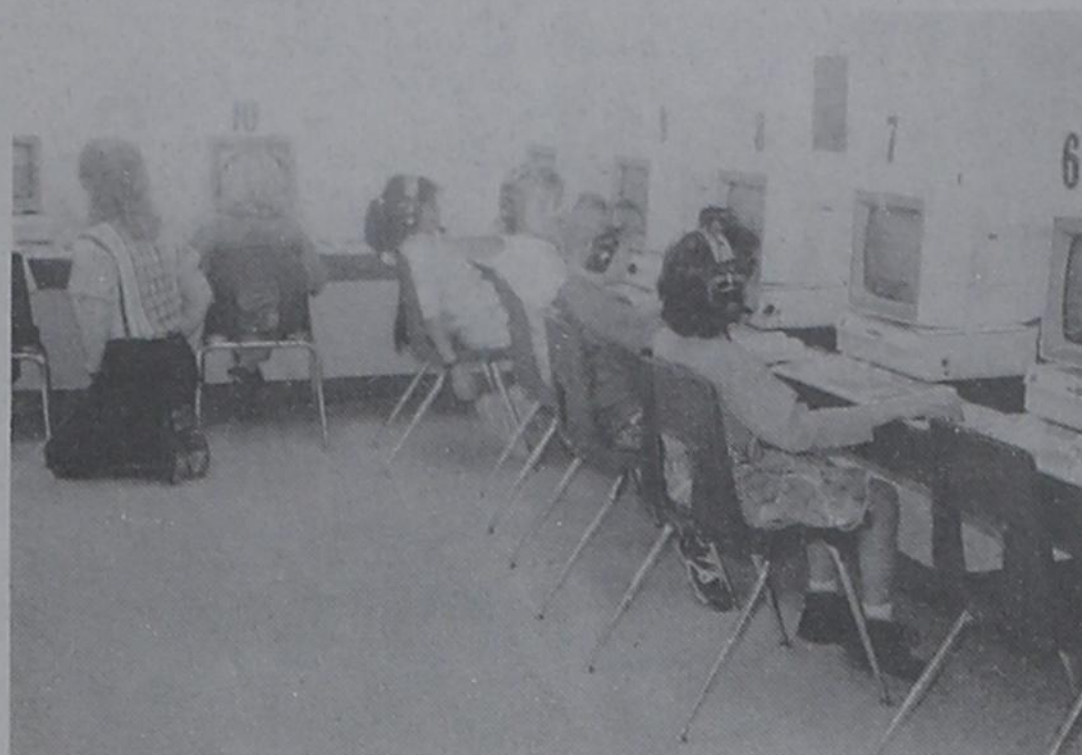
The flag was unfurled by the members of the varsity teams of both Happy and Bovina. Student Council members selected elementary students to participate by helping hold the flag. Grady
