

#### NOT MAKING TROUBLE MERITS REWARD, TOO

Wondering just how many persons in the vicinity of Detroit had, like himself, lived 70 years or more without being arrested, one John A. Williams, 76, decided that the best way to find out would be through a letter to the editor of a newspaper.

The letter was published and in due time Mr. Williams began to get answers. In fact, so many answers from people who could meet the stringent qualifications, that Mr. Williams was impelled to organize them into a

club. Now in these days, almost any kind of an excuse will start someone organizing something which, nine times out of ten, is nothing more than a dues-collecting scheme. But a club of people who have never been arrested somehow is different. And its virtue is that it lays the foundation for a monument to one of the most deserving varieties of the "forgotten man."

Enormous portions of the nation's talents and resources are being devoted to cutting down the activities of the gangster, the murderer, the bandit and the parolebreaker. They are held constantly in ridicule before the public, as examples of lawlessness.

But comparatively little has been done to popularize the career of the law-abiding citizen or make him the model for positive education in the principles of progressive

It is when he is contrasted against his opposite that the man who has never been arrested assumes his real proportions. In general he is the man who does not kidnap children. He does not rob banks, run gambling houses, sell liquor to minors or break traffic laws. He does not run up the taxpayer's bill in lengthy trials or prison maintenance. He is the fellow who does not slug pedestrians along dark streets or shoot G-Men or write bad checks.

In summary, he is the fellow who has not caused every civilized nation most of its household grief and has not cost that nation appalling sums in money and misery.





# Future of Salmon Industry Rests On Bonneville Dam's Fish Ladders

BONNEVILLE, Oge. fish ladders and elevators being constructed at a cost of \$3,500,000 in the Bonneville dam here serve their purpose and give migrating salmon a chance to clear the 75foot obtacles on their way up the Columbia river to spawn, the money will have been well spent.


One-Foot Leaps.
On paper the two methods seems practical. Since a salmon's instinct tells him that by finding fast water he won't wind up in a blind alley, the fish ladders and elevators been constructed so that a great volume of water flows through them to induce salmon to enter.


The ladders, one on each side of the dam, consist of 75 pools, each 15 feet long and six feet deep. To elimb from pool to pool and eventhe fish leaps one foot at a time, no feat at all for a finny warrior that clears 20 feet in negotiating water-


The elevators operate off a collecting chamber. They are 20 feet square and, when fish enter, a gate closes behind them and the water level increase from about 10 feet to the height of the dam. As the water rises, a grating slowly is lift-ed under the fish, forcing them to evacuate the chamber and move into the water behind the dam when the top is reached.

> The Civil War period, 1860-64, was perhaps one of the most exciting eras of valley history, marking th beginning of the cotton industry on a large scale. From historical records received from Harbert Davenport of Brownsville, Mrs. Winn has assembled a story of that period, when Bagdad, an international port 10 miles south of the mouth of the Rio Grande, grew almost overnight to a city of 16,000 and furnished the only outlet for cotton grown west of the Mississippi.

> The cotton business of the valley had its beginning nearly 75 years ago at Matamoros. During the Civil War federal troops landed at Brazos De Santiago and ships blockaded the port. Hundreds of bales of cotton transported over-land from Alabama, Mississippi and

Texas piled up at Matamoros. After the blockade ships, discharged cargo 10 miles south of the mouth of the Rio Grande where a town named Bagdad sprang up. The cotton being held at Matamoros was sent to Bagdad, 22 miles away, by wagon, oxcart, or any way it could be transported. This being a foreign

port it could not be blockaded. French, English, and Mexican ships anchored off shore loaded cotton for Europe and the eastern

Here at the tip of the United States was one of the largest cotton exchanges in the world, thousands of dollars being handled daily in the boom town and at Matamoros. Many fortunes were made or started here, notably that of the Stilinans of New York.

The road between Matamoros and Bagdad was congested with traffic, stage coaches, wagons, oxcarts, mules and horses. A man who had a skiff or lighter made from \$20 to \$40 a day. Bagdad's populaion quickly reached 16,000 while Matamoros became a city of 60.000













