# **Japs Battle** At Shanghai


Scores of Buildings Fired as Warfare **Rages Unimpeded** 

SHANGHAI, Aug. 13 (P).-Japanese naval guns and Chinese and Japanese land batteries hurled hundreds of shells to open Shanghai warfare tonight, setting fire to scores of buildings on the northern fringe of the city. A strong wind threatened a holocaust like that of 1932.

The United States Asiatic squadron steamed in to protect 4,000 Americans in the Shanghai area, and Britain rushed additional troops from Hong Kong to supplement their regular garrison. It was estimated 7,000 Japanese

bluejackets and thousands of Chinese regular army troops skirmished in Chinese areas north of Shanghai in the international zone The troops were entrenched and skirmishing started early today aft-

er a peace conference failed. The Japanese government, following a special meeting of the cabinet, was understood to be rushing

WASHINGTON. Aug. 13. (P) The senate judiciary sub-committee wiftly approved today the nomination of Senator Black, Alabama to the supreme court, acting only a few minutes after President Rooscvelt had told a press conference that Attorney General Cummings had informed him the nom ination was legal and constitution-

The sub-committee voted after rejecting a move by Senator Austin, Vermont republican, to hold up acion pending a study of the legal

uestions involved. Chairman of the group, Senator Neely of West Virginia, immediately tried to arrange a meeting of the full committee either this afternoon or tomorrow to act on Black's nomination. Neely held that it was not the duty of the committee to "construe the constitution" but pass on the qualifications of Black.

Immediately after the committee acted, two senators, Burke of Nebraska and White of Maine, came out as open opponents of confirma-tion of Black's appointment.
