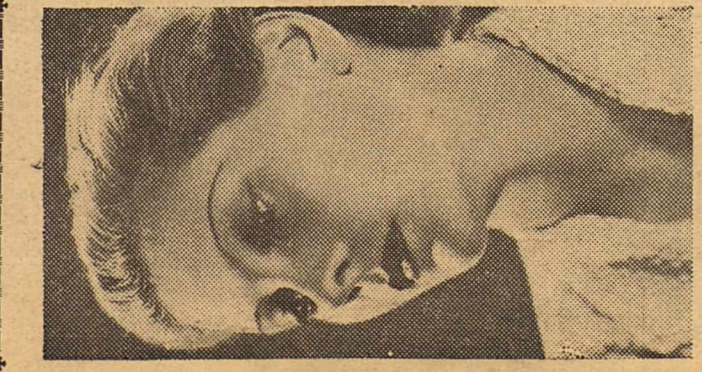

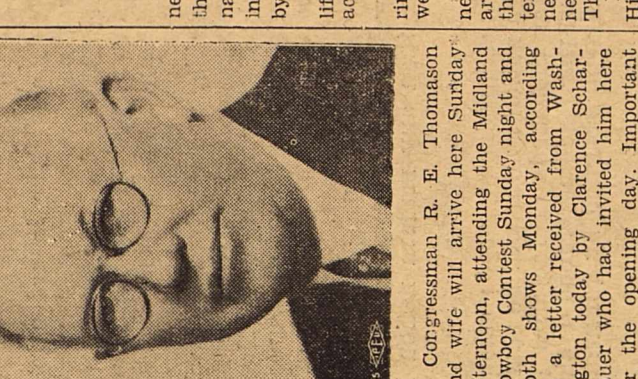

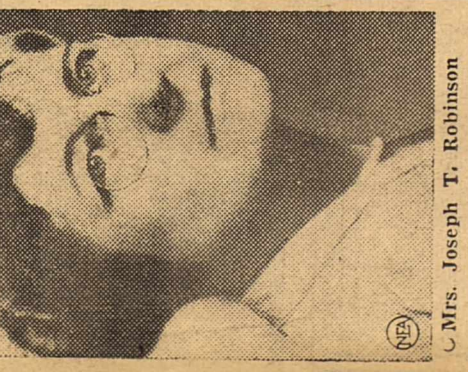

JAPAN GETS MONEY FOR ITS WAR NEEDS

With the war in China only a few weeks old, Japanese financiers and industrialists are beginning to get a taste of what has long been considered an inevitable adjunct of the next war—control of capital if not actual conscription. Okinobu Kaya, Japanese finance minister, made his announcement innocuously enough, merely informing Japanese business men that the government "finds it necessary to readjust investment capital."

Kaya explained that this was done in order to increase funds available for expansion of munitions industries and foreign trade. He further took the sting from his announcement by assuring financiers that the government has no intention of compelling business to undertake its war business.

It was markedly noticeable, nevertheless, that when a short time later the government decided to issue 200,000,000 yen (approximately \$58,000,000) in deficit bonds, a banking syndicate immediately considered measures for voluntary adjustment of capital. The official bank of Japan is a leading member of the syndicate.

The outcome of those "adjustments" will be as tight a control over industrial wealth as the government nation feels it needs and much tighter than any modern nation feels ever felt before.

Industries which are not producing goods essential to the immediate needs of a nation at war will be sharply curtailed. That means that thousands of factories producing other than munitions, war machinery, food or clothing, will find their books sharply scanned by government inspectors.

The government's permission will have to be obtained for mergers and the establishment of new corporations. The sale of stock publicly will be definitely prohibited. Large or long time loans will be impossible to obtain. Naturally the munitions and allied industries will benefit from the money withheld to other industries. Certain export businesses doubtless will be favored because Japan will need to retain a trade balance wherever it buys war supplies.

It isn't hard to get a picture of that sort of "capital readjustment." It's hard to imagine a tighter grip on industry than that which dictates. Japan's armies will have cash or its "non-urgent" industries will close shop. If that is a taste of what all private investment can expect in wartime now, and it apparently is, perhaps a little advance knowledge isn't a bad idea. War that digs into private pocketbooks and effectively stops profiteering is likely to be a most unpopular war indeed.

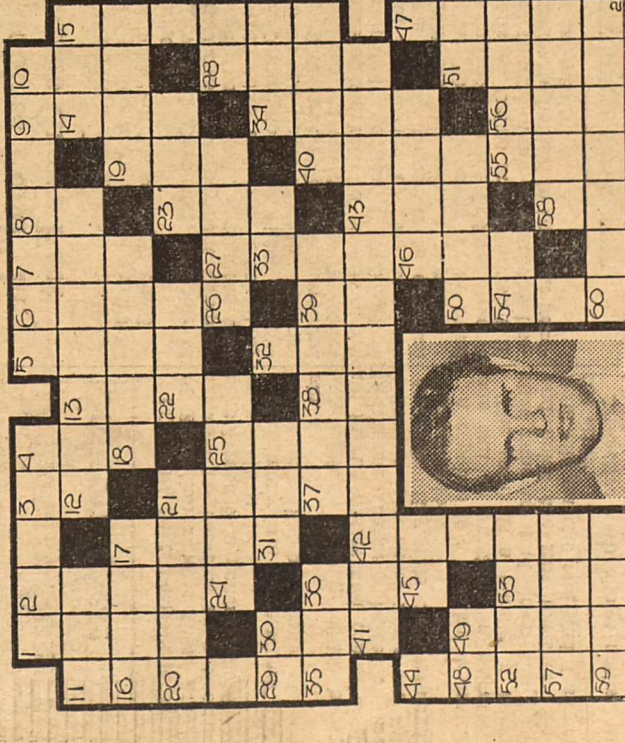

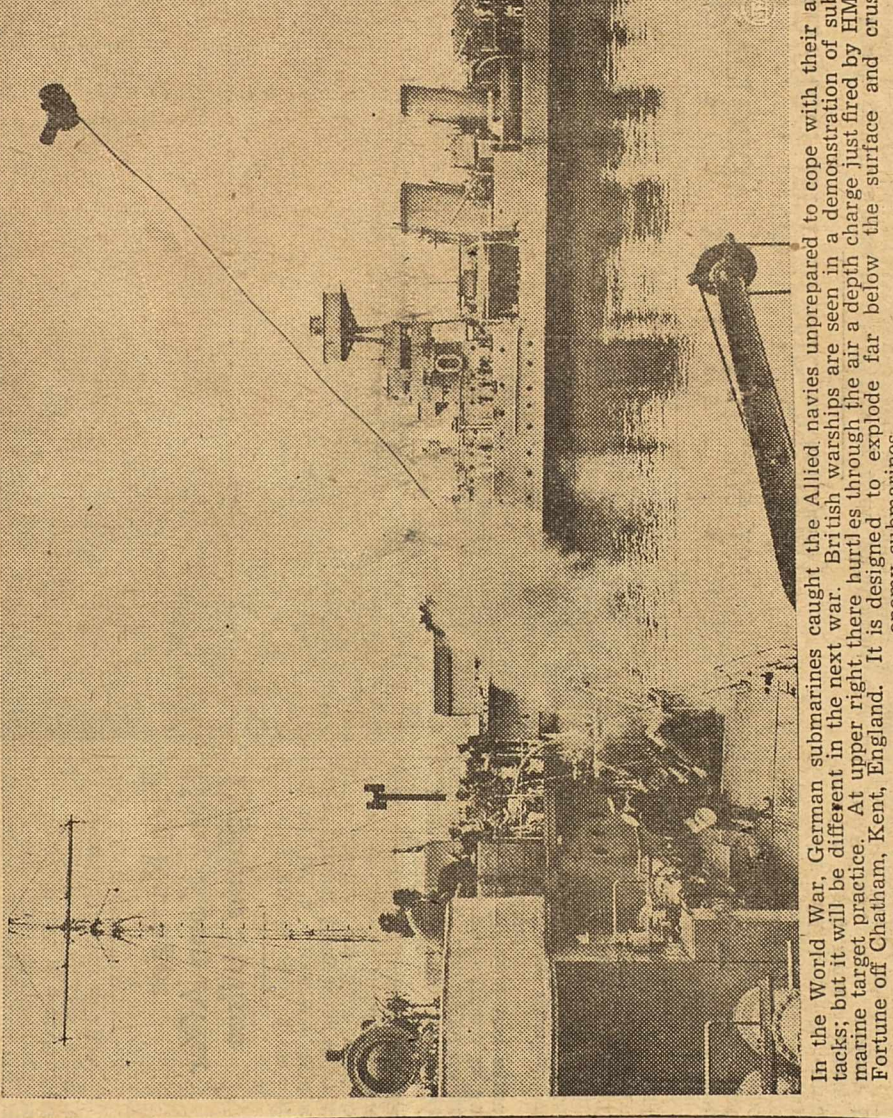

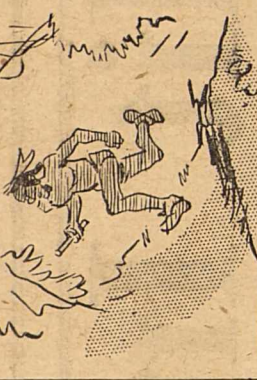

STORIES IN STAMPS CIVILIZATION'S FIRST POSTMAN



FOUNDED on a dim prehistoric culture, the empire of the South American Incas first rose to power about 1100 A. D. Branching out from the Andean highlands surrounding Lake Titicaca, the Inca rule was a drastic form of state socialism.

Under this system, the empire was divided into provinces, each under control of a hereditary local chief. All produce, agricultural, pastoral or industrial was the property of the state. All labor was considered "state tribute" and some form of labor was exacted from every member of the community.

The result was, in time, a vast state organization, controlling great wealth. The administration of this enormous length of mountain territory required rapidity of communication, so, a service of professional "runners" was maintained. They carried messages, oral and written, traversing the country in relays, from rest house to rest house.

and when he began his investigations. Dr. Boner was faced with the problem of obtaining apparatus that would effectively record the data he needed. By taking a commercial calibrating machine for recording the frequencies of electrical impulses, Dr. Boner, assisted by university electricians and shop engineers, has devised an elaborate piece of equipment by means of which any musical instrument may be tested for its quality of sound.

In general, the quality of sound outdoors in order to obviate the effects of echoes within a room. Therefore two cranes have been attached to the exterior of the physics building at the university, extending some fifteen feet away from the building's wall. One of these cranes holds instruments at distance away, holds a receiving device. Compressed air is used to "play" the instrument by means of an artificial "mouth." The sound, undistorted by being confined within the walls of a room, is picked up by the receiving device. It is then transmitted through tubes and its various component frequencies recorded on the calibrating machine.

"This equipment is almost as good as the human ear," Dr. Boner said. "The human ear, hearing the sound coming from a wood clarinet, does not differentiate between the sizes of these differences and the varying frequencies and that make up the sound quality."

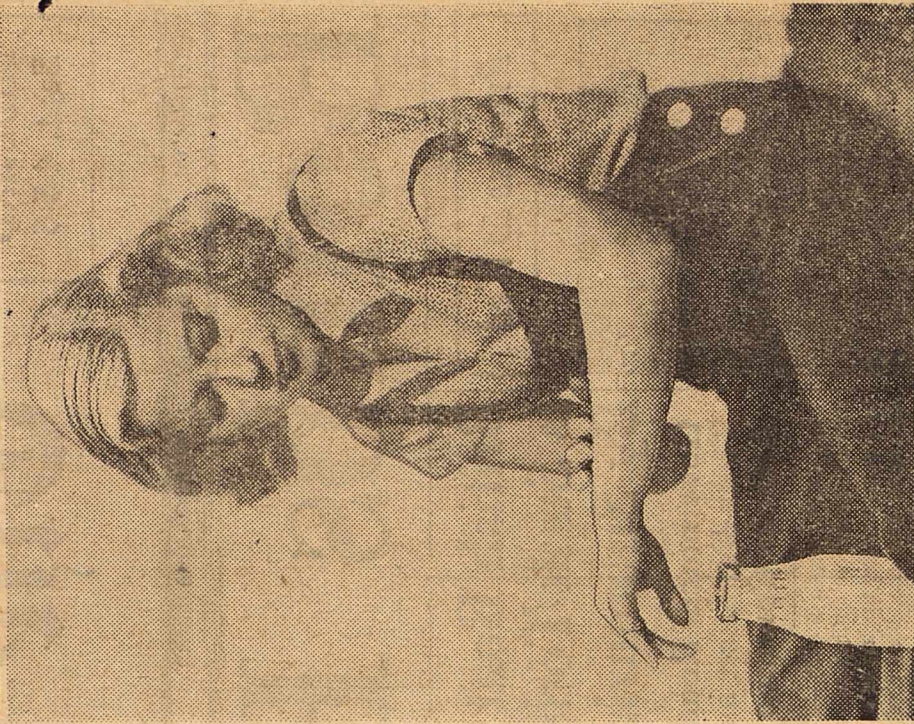
Dr. Boner's experiments were inaugurated largely from an academic standpoint, and he is recognized as an outstanding authority on sound. He is a member of the Federal Trade Commission to carry on, however, agency's investigations which lend a thoroughly practical aspect to the project. His results are being watched eagerly by manufacturers of musical instruments, who may find that the sound effects they usually may be obtained by using simple, inexpensive, complex ones are considered rethunder.

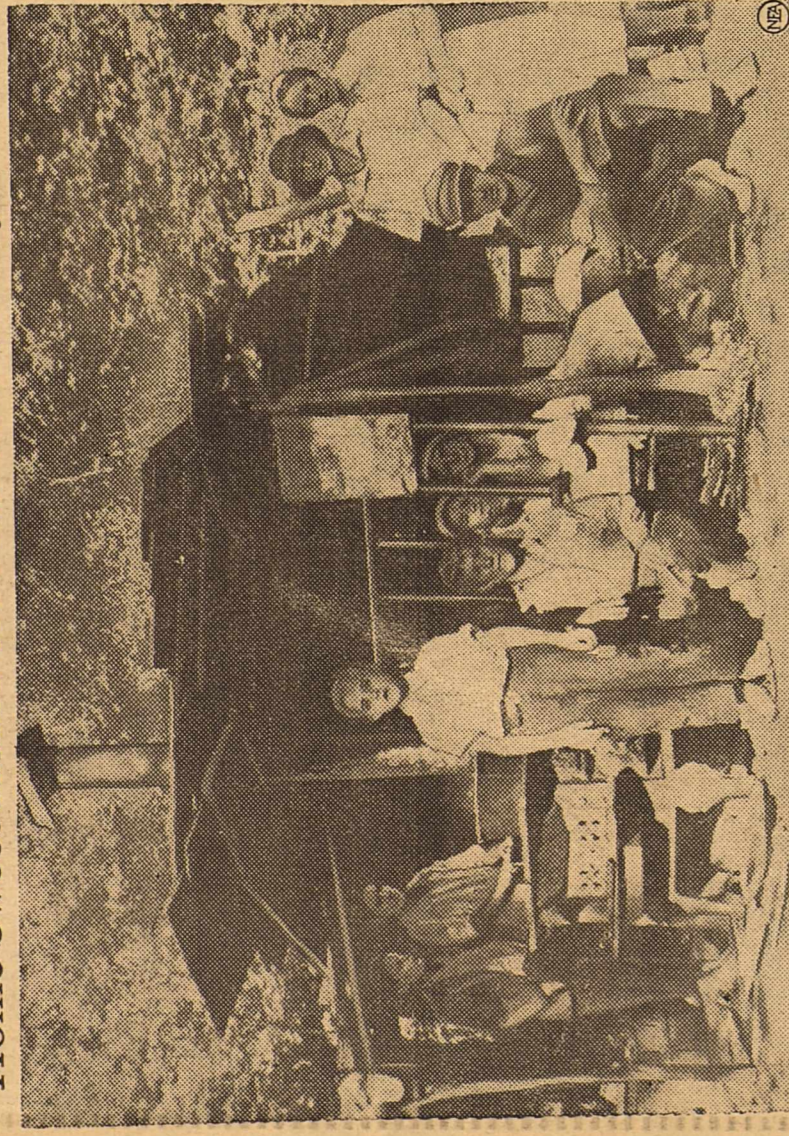

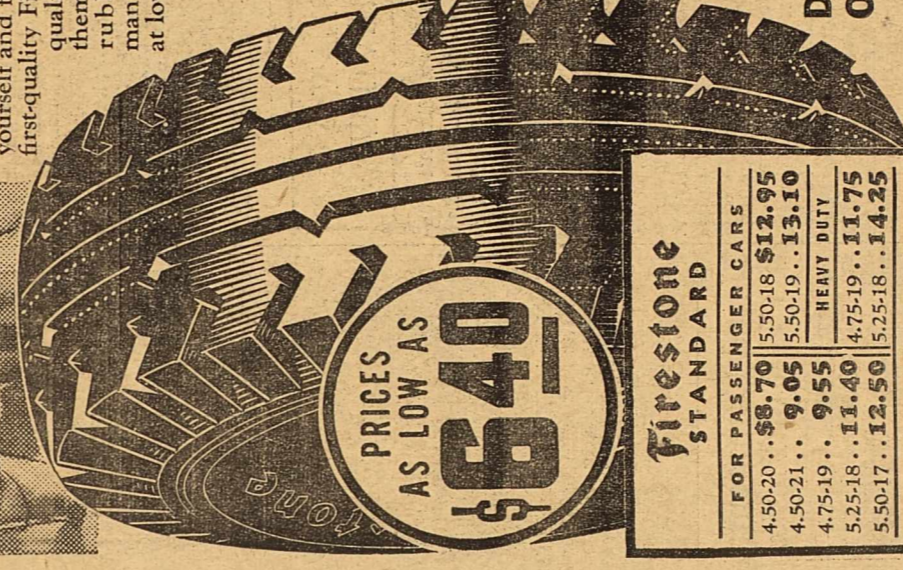

Newest Yoakum Strike Making Half-Bailer Of Oil Per Hour

By FRANK GARDNER. Apparently opening another new producing area in southwest Yoakum, the Texas Company No. 1 well is drilling line at 4,790 feet. Wasson Area Fronter.

A mile and a quarter southwest of the pool opener, Amerada No. 1 Matthews, bottomed at plugged back depth of 5,008, is swabbing and flowing by heads, with production: 99 barrels of fluid, 40 per cent water and three per cent basic sediment, during the last six days.

Phillips No. 1 Wasson, west off-Bennett pool, is swabbing 55 barrels of fluid in two hours after treatment with 4,000 gallons. It was re-treated with 4,000 gallons last night and this morning was still swabbing.
