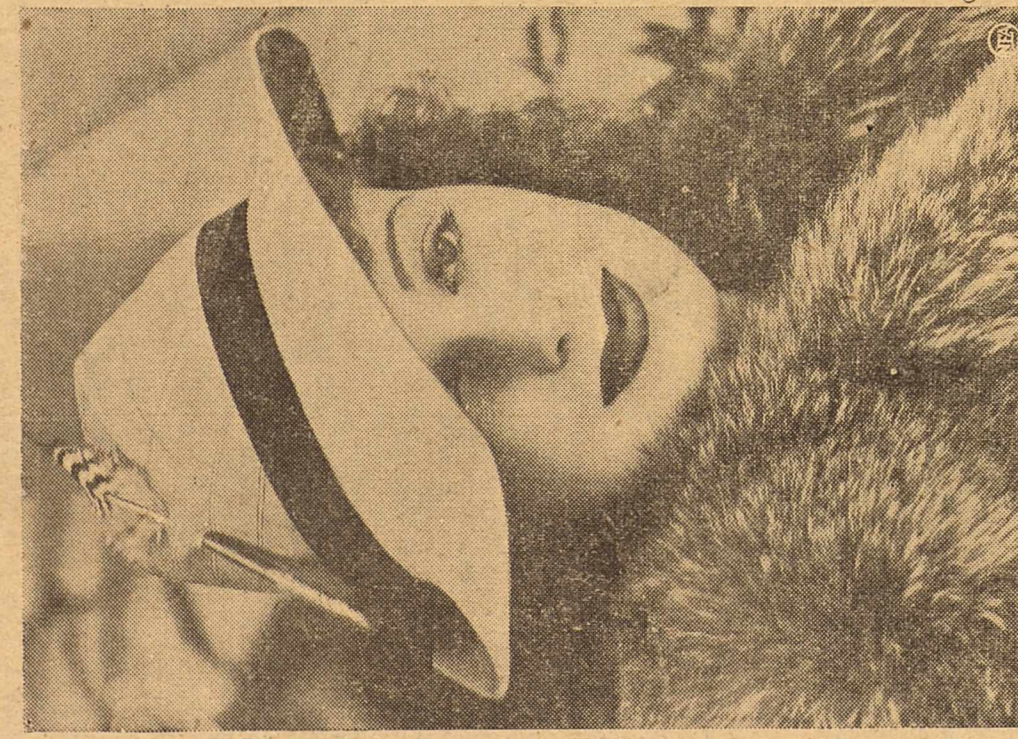

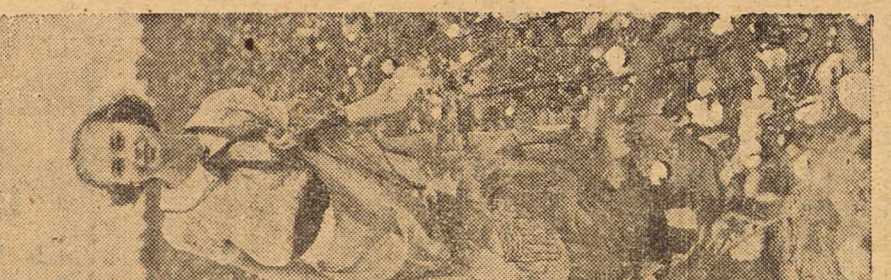

Huge Debts Pile Up Profits Ebb But Matanuska Is 'Home' to Pioneers



This is the second of two stories answering the questions you've always wanted answered about Matanuska, the famous colonization experiment in Alaska.

PALMER, Alaska.—It has been two and a half years since the Matanuska colonists piled off the train up here to start life all over again. So it seems time now to ask, "How are they doing?"

Well, 15 of the 170 colonists are self-supporting today. That means they are living without any more borrowing from the government.

And the other 155? Well, they range all the way from farmers who just about over the hump, down to the next who don't know where the next drink of whisky is coming from.

Income Small
Let's look at the thing up and see how the colonists stand: They get for their butter, eggs, chickens, pork, beef, vegetables.

It probably runs from \$10 to \$50 a month.

Also whatever they make doing odd jobs for the government. One of them works for the post office. Another works for the post office. Another works for the post office.

DEBTS—Every month the colonist gets a bill, telling how much he owes the government. This bill includes the government's share of the cost of the supplies he has got on credit. It doesn't include his house, barn, or land.

THE PAYOFF—Recently there was a story about, some colonist who got mad and left because he couldn't start paying up on his debt.

MOVE
For the government is going to turn down all these debts. No farmer could ever scratch \$25,000 plus a living, out of these 40-acre tracts. The government knows that. It may be something like this—if a farmer's total debt amounts to \$12,000, he may be allowed a 10-year payment plan of \$800. (That's just my guess.)

Shortly, a two-year plan will go into effect. It will give each colonist who needs it enough working relief to meet his running expenses. Each colonist will thus be definitely subsidized for two more years.

FAMED "THIN RED LINE" OF AGGIES NOT TO BE SO THIN THIS YEAR

COLLEGE STATION—The famed "thin red line" of the Texas Aggies is not as thin as it sounds, judging from lengths and breadth of players mentioned in tentative lineups for the Aggie football team.

Driving May Be Taught In 7,000 High Schools

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (UP)—Instruction in safe driving is expected to be offered in 7,000 high schools throughout the United States next year, according to a report from the Pennsylvania State College extension service.

Now on leave of absence to conduct the American Automobile Association's safe driving campaign, Neyhart said 3,500 schools offered the instruction last year. He said he expects twice as many next year.

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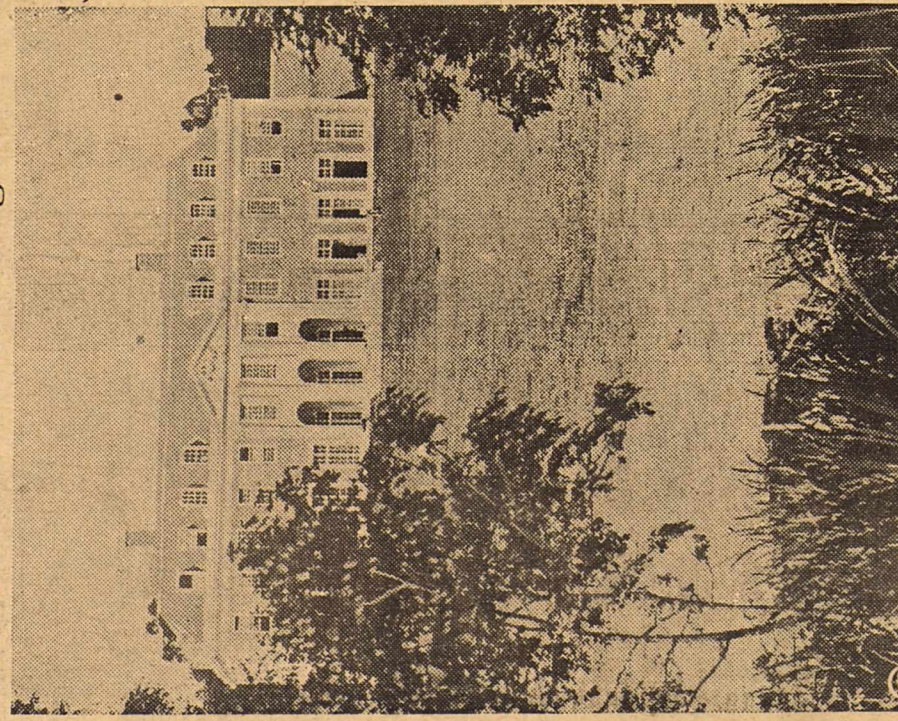
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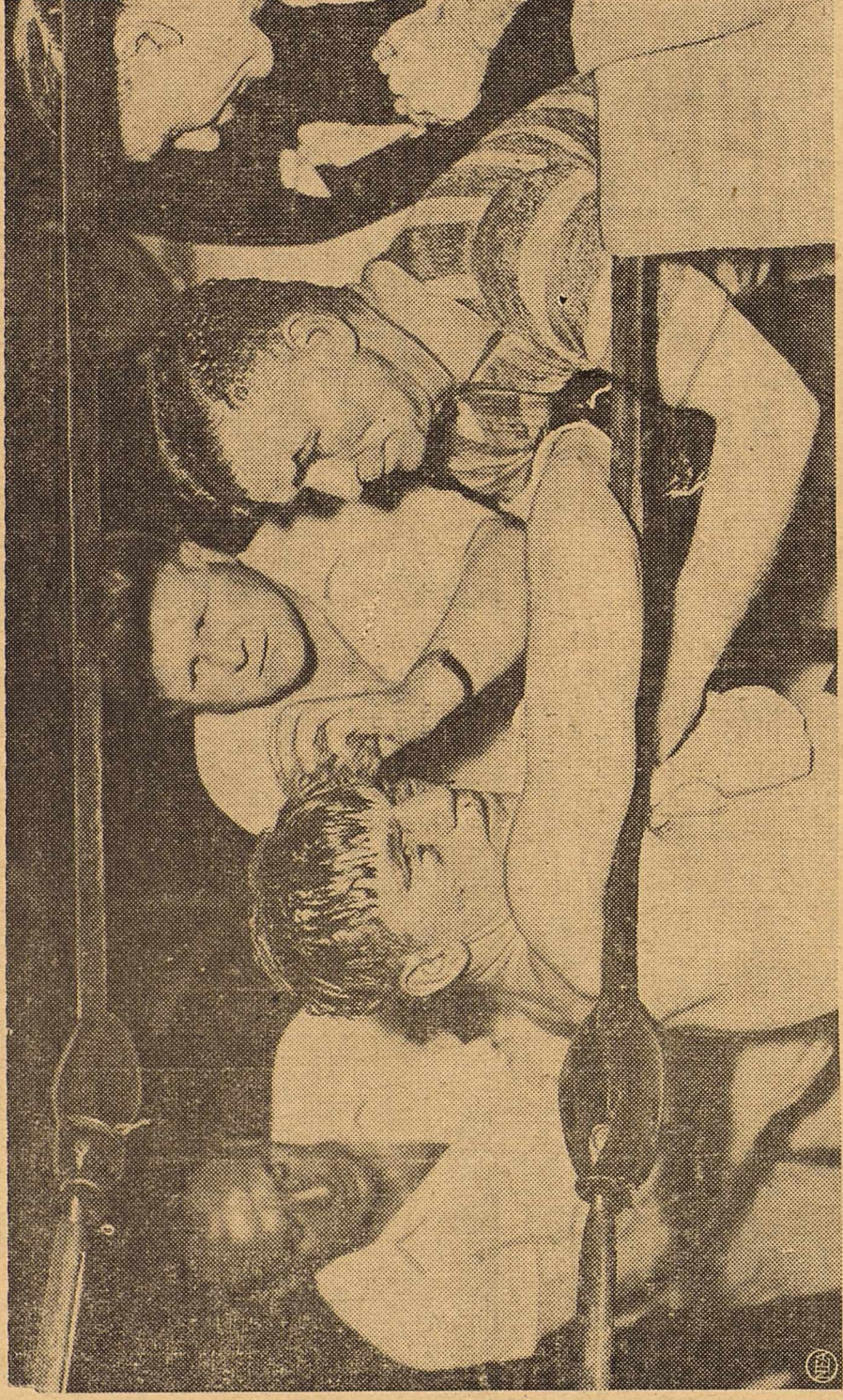
