Schedule Says Midland-McCamey Not To Meet Until Friday-But The Two Clubs Are Meeting Daily This Week

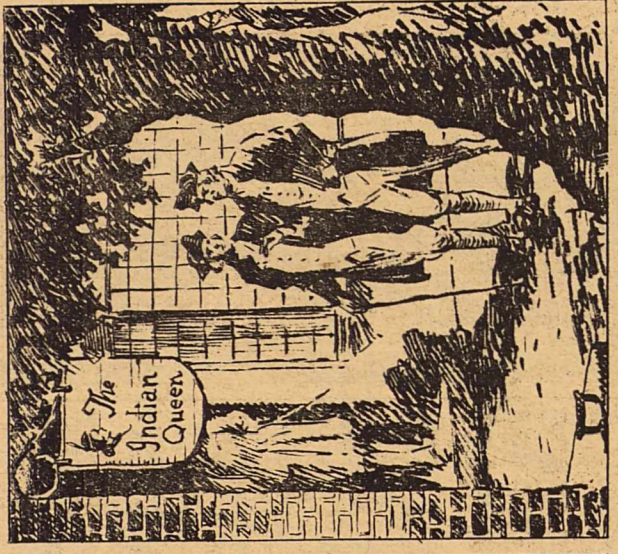
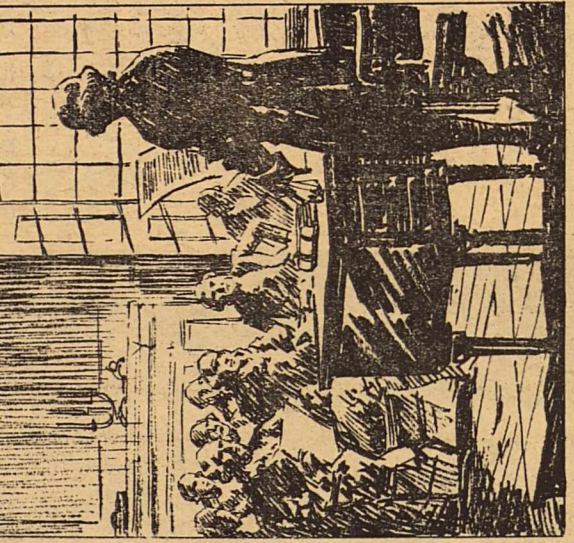

Blame Appendicitis For 786 Deaths in Texas in 12 Months

AUSTIN.—During the past year 786 persons died of appendicitis in Texas, according to vital statistics of health. Many of these deaths might have been prevented had the patient been more aware of the disease and its symptoms.

There are two forms of appendicitis, acute and chronic. The form that appears suddenly, with great pain and which extends over a long period of time and consists of slight attacks at intervals, but, at some

time, will usually occur an attack worse than any before and the disease may then become serious.

"In the presence of abdominal pain, give nothing by mouth. Retain the bowels open with Abdominal pain which persists over a period of six hours is usually serious," advises State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox.

Hospital records show that the above advice has reduced appendicitis deaths 75 per cent. When operation soon after the beginning of the pain and which extends over a long period of time and consists of slight attacks at intervals, but, at some

ably lessened when there is a delay in seeking medical aid, and especially if a cathartic has been given.

How to prevent appendicitis? Keep the body in perfect health as long as possible. Watch your teeth, your tonsils, any place where an infection may occur. Get plenty of good food, plenty of sleep, plenty of exercise. Have a thorough medical examination at least once a year and have your teeth examined and cleaned by a dentist. This kind of watchfulness will not only help you to avoid appendicitis, it will help you to avoid many other illnesses as well.
