"There are but two ways of treating cancer. First, by surgery; and second, by the use of radium or Xray. Treatment must be started early and in the hands of a competent surgeon. Surgery is relied upon to remove cancerous tumors and is used in nearly two-thirds of the cases. X-ray or radium is used to advantage in one-third of the cases, frequently the two methods are combined. Self-medication, serums, colored lights, pastes, salves and diets are valueless.

"The great bulwark against can-cer is early diagnosis. Every case is an emergency and it is unfortunate that the majority of these with cancer do not seek medical advice until beyond a permanent cure. No hope should be placed in fake cancer prophets and their treatments Rather, the annual physical examination and an immediate reporting to your physician of any symptoms which may be suspected to be the beginning of cancer, should be relied upon. These symptoms are: any unusual bleeding from any body opening, any lump in the breast or other part of the body; any per-sistent sore, particularly on the face or mouth, and chronic indigestion. These conditions may not be can-cer, but sometimes they are forerunners of the more common types of this disease. Where cancer is suspected, do not delay, but consult your family physician at once," Dr. Cox admonished.
