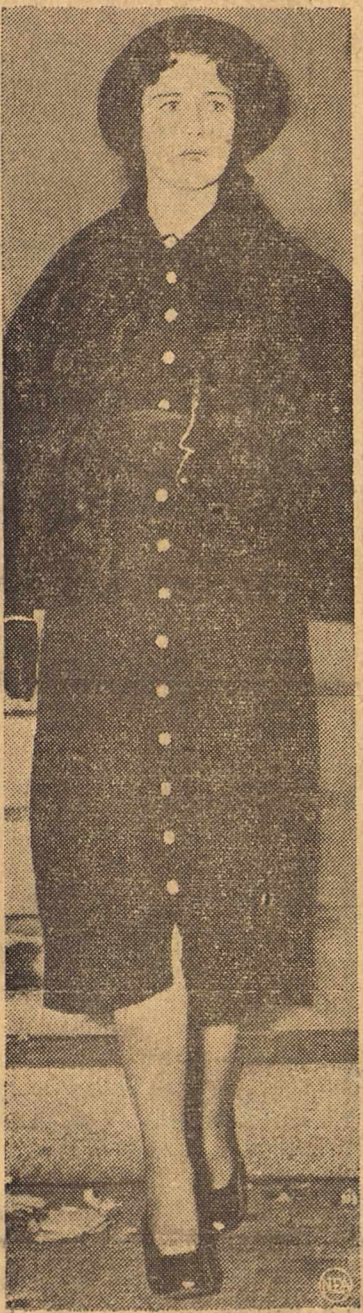
AIRPORT NEWS.

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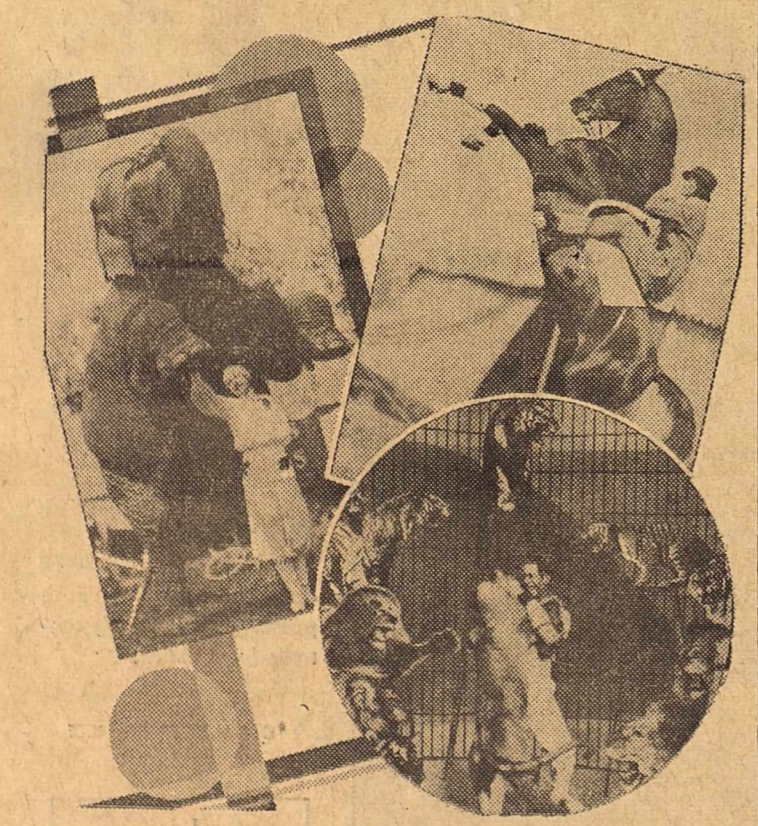
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It's Circus Day in Midland!

COURAGE TO LIVE

Challenging science to "remake man" as the only remedy to save modern civilization, Dr. Alexis Carrel, distinguished surgeon and Nobel Prize winner, astonished a Dartmouth College audience with the assertion: "The civilized races are losing the courage to live . . . the reproduction of gifted individuals is decreasing."

Improvement of the race is possible, Dr. Carrel declared, through institutes of "psychobiology" to produce leaders of government and education rather than the specialists the present system yields.

But, while science can aid, the future of the race seems to rest more upon the individual. Only in the courage to live to the best advantage for self and fellow man, in justice, peace, and health can civilization survive.

Chinese soldiers are offered a reward of \$14.50 for every Japanese general they can capture. The rate for top sergeants, we understand, is about three times that figure.

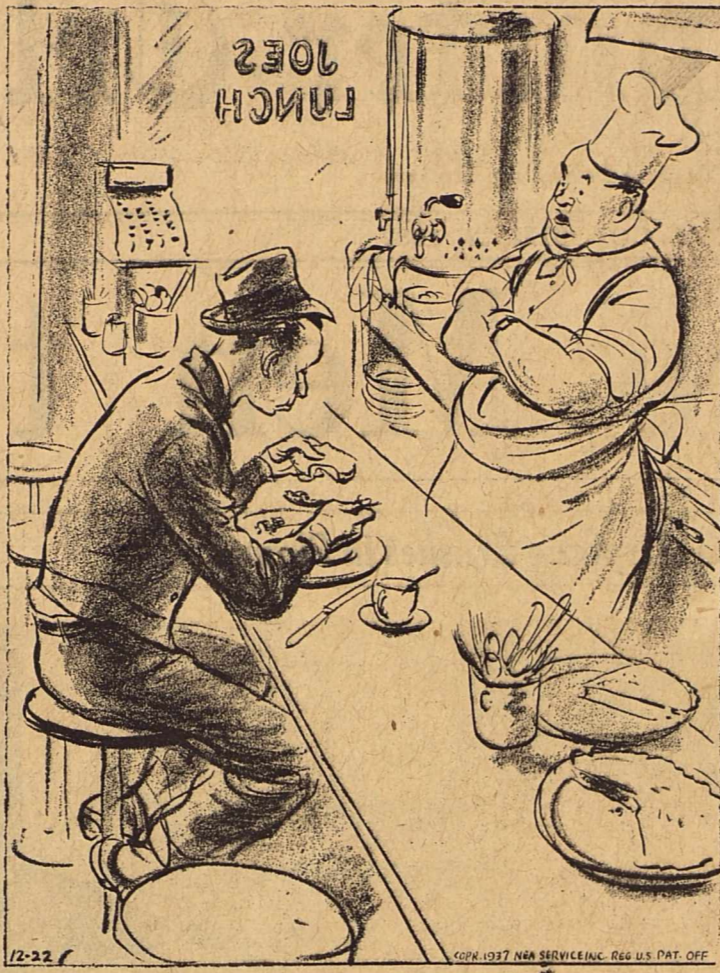
WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Official repudiation of the theory that isolation and neutrality acts could save this country from war has disturbed many peaceful dreams and probably there have been few times when so obvious a demand existed for some fellow with a feasible recipe for world peace.

There is a large school of thought, including many of the heaviest thinkers on the subject, which holds that "quarantines" and other overt actions designed to curb aggressive, militaristic nations are dubious instruments for curing the world's insanity and are likely to cause just so much more hell. This school believes there is no promising path away from world chaos except through economic co-operation between "haves" and "have-nots."

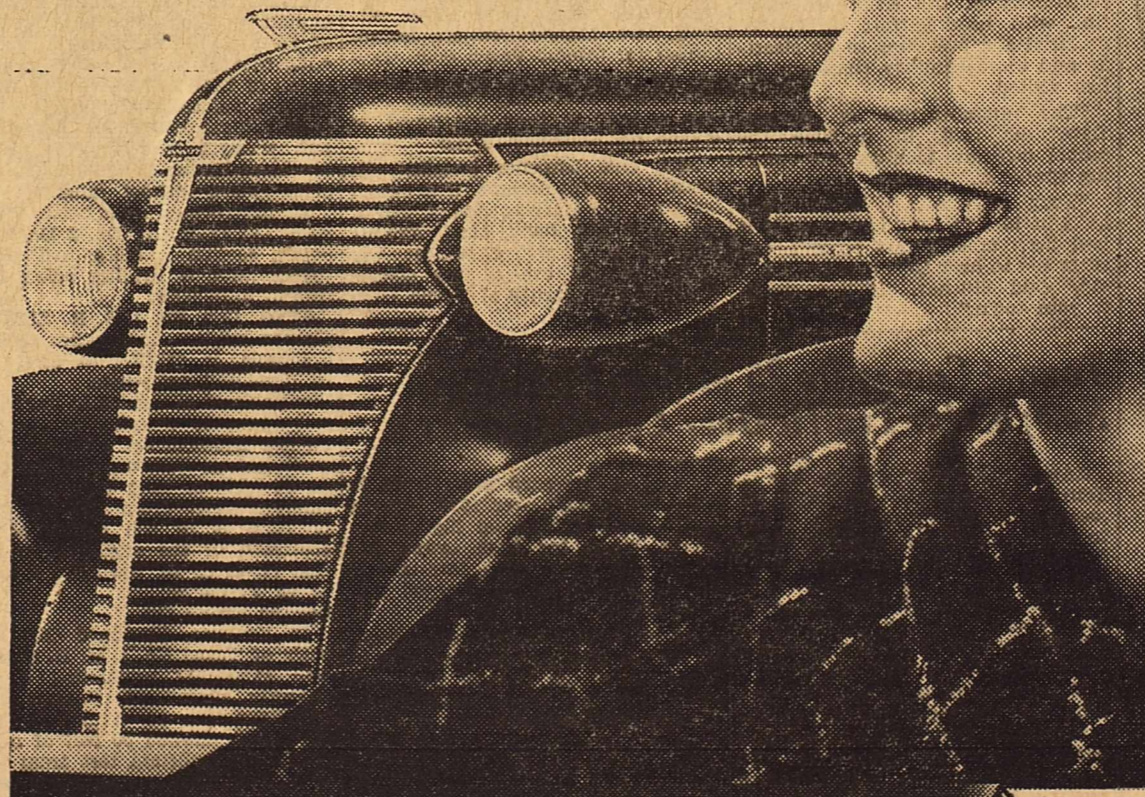

WINK IS HEAVILY FAVORED TO COP BY LARGE SCORE

The Midland Bulldogs, approximately 35 strong, left at noon today for what will probably be their toughest game of the season with the Wink Wildcats at Wink at 8 o'clock tonight.

The club planned to stop in Kermit this afternoon to watch the two cellar clubs, Stanton and Kermit, indulge in a battle that will probably decide which club stays there all year.

The Wildcats, undefeated through five games, will go into the battle tonight heavily favored to take the Bulldogs into camp and avenge a defeat handed them on Lackey field last year.

With the exception of Francis, the Bulldog squad is in good physical condition and should play one of their best games to date. They are unworried over predictions that they will lose by 50 points and are determined to knock the Wildcats over if it is possible to do so.

The Bulldog offense will be hampered by the loss of Francis and most of the ball carrying will be left up to little Pat McMullan. His aids will probably be Harris, Taylor, Wright, Truelove, White and Walker during the battle. Woodrow Adams will be directing the team from his tackle position.

The Bulldogs will be outweighed approximately 7 pounds per man as the game is started tonight, regardless of what line-up coaches Taylor and Meyer decide on.

The Wildcat crews boasts one of the highest scoring combinations in the history of the district, having rolled up the staggering total of 240 points while their opponents could register only 20 points. All the points scored against them were made against their second and third string teams except two points tallied by the Class-A Big Spring Steers. In Hodgett, Callahan, Ezell and Webb they will present a backfield that is the envy of all the coaches in the district.

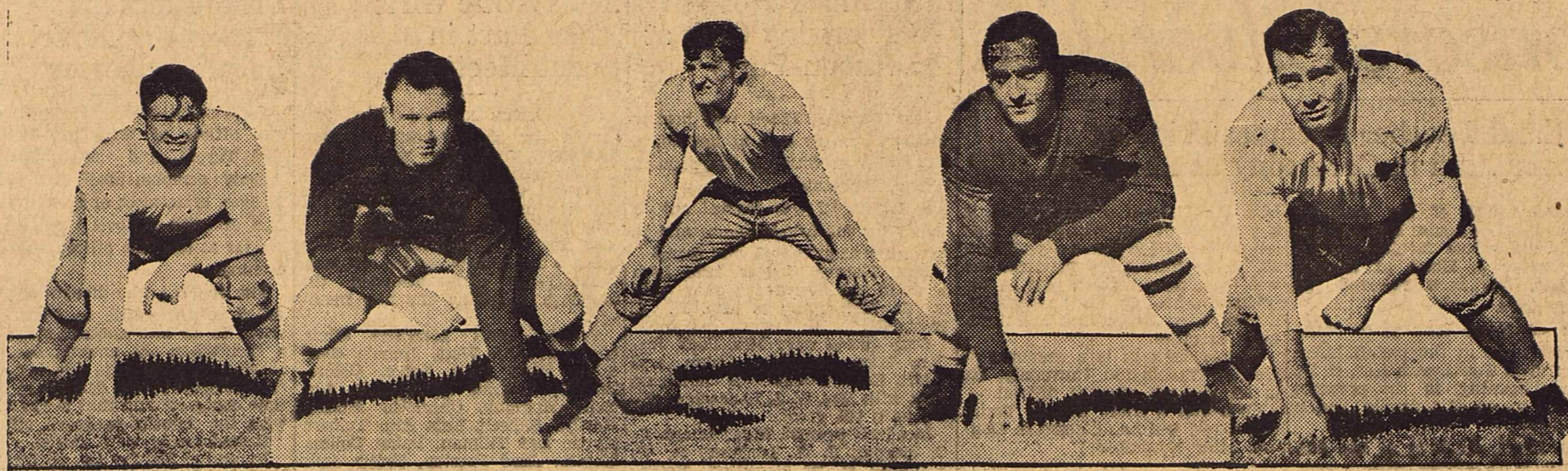

This game will also be broadcast by the Humble Company at 2:20 p. m., with Cy Leland handling the play-by-play and Jack Mitchell the color. T. C. U. goes up against the Fordham Rams in the Polo Grounds, New York City, Saturday. The Ram line is a tower of strength and was dubbed last year "Seven Blocks of Granite." Five of the "Blocks" are back this year. But the Horned Frogs have a pretty good forward wall themselves. Chief among the grunt and shove boys is I. B. Hale, left tackle, who pushes the scales down until they show 240 pounds. I. B. played his high school string at Woodrow Wilson, Dallas, and was a regular last year as a sophomore at T. C. U.
