"Scuttling" Job Flayed by Governor

Marines Are Told to Fire On Attackers

Chinese Retreat To Lines From Chapei Sector

SHANGHAI. Oct. 27. (AP) - American marines were authorized to-day to fire in self defense on any warplane attacking them or noncombatants in their section of the International Settlement.

Fleet commander Harry Yarnell authorized the measure as fierce fighting, intensified by the retreat of Chinese from Chapei to new defense lines, raged around the settle-

Tremendous fires, set by Chinese and Japanese, swept Chapei, the native quarter and penetrated the settlement at one point.

Chinese headquarters declared the 'strategic withdrawal" was accomplished with minimum losses and that their troops were entrenched now in strong positions along shortened lines beyond range of Japanese naval guns. Chirese left no dead, wounded or supplies behind.

The majority of Chinese troops withdrew under cover of darkness, but spirited rearguard action was going on at the bottle-neck railway junction of the Sharghai-Nanking and Shanghai - Hangchow lines which proved the only outlet for the Chinese west of Chapei.

Formally declining to participate in the peace conference in Brussels Japan declared the nine-power treaty obsolete because of "infilti-ration of communism in China."

AUSTIN, Oct. 27 (A).—Governor Allred said today he had never known of a better job of "scuttling" than that performed in the legislative session that adjourned last

He commented only briefly on the session, called to raise revenue for the state's social security program.

The house at the last moment refused to accept a compromise with the senate on a bill estimated to raise \$4,000,000 annually.

Many felt old age grants will have to be sharply curtailed, perhaps suspended temporarily.

The governor said he was "not as worried over what he would do as what a lot of unfortunate people will do." He said he wanted the "check" on the session before further comment.

Governor Allred, who called the session, asked for additional revenues aggregating \$15,000,000 a year but it had been apparent for days the lawmakers would not accede to his request. Shortly before adjournment, the house blocked action on a compromise \$4,000,000 general tax bill be-

cause it did not consider the proposal contained satisfactory provisions for old age pensions. Advised the legislature had com-pleted its work, Governor Allred immediately there was no possibility of another special ses-

"I see no possibility of another session," he said. "I see no reason for believing anything would be accomplished. I certainly will never call another session until there is a guarantee it will do something.' The governor thanked a delega-tion from the house which told him they had finished their labors and

Sale of the 1938 **Buicks Promises** To Set a Record
