Midland Is Placed In Air Survey

"Feeder Week" to Be Staged by PO **Department Soon**

Designation of Midland as one of the Texas cities to be used in "Air Mail Feeder Survey Week" to be staged by the Postoffic Department in cooperation with the Eastern Air Lines December 6-12, inclusive, was announced today by Postmaster Allen Tolbert.

Upon his receipt of the information from the postmaster at Hous-ton, who has been named chairman of survey week, a meeting was held by chamber of commerce officials and interested citizens this morning to lay plans for the event. A committee, including civic eaders, officials of oil companies and chamber of commerce workers was appointed by Marion Flynt to make a survey, the results of which will be presented to L. R. Fimian, district traffic manager of Eastern Air Lines, and Captain B. Roe who will land at Sloan Field probably tomorrow on a preliminary flight to determine the elapsed time between cities and other data needed

for the survey week. According to the plan, air mail will be picked up here by a special plane December 10, the mail to be flown to Houston and from there to eastern cities. Exact time of the pickup will be made known following the preliminary trip by Mr. Fimian and Captain Roe. They would have been here today but
