"MY TURN"

WITHOUT A DOUBT, the funniest movie I ever saw was one which came out about ten years ago starring Dick Van Dyke entitled "Cold Turkey." It was set in a small town in mid-America and every character in the movie reminded me of some person I know in Friona or Bovina.

The movie was actually based on an event promoted by a small-town newspaper editor in Monticello, Minnesota in 1974. Editor Lynn Smith persuaded the citizens of his little town of 1,800 to all go without cigarettes for one entire day.

This event was eventually adopted by the American Cancer Society and became a nationwide program in 1976. It is now known as the "Great American Smokeout" and is the day when everyone across the country tries to quit smoking for one whole day and when non-smokers encourage their friends to quit. The "Smokeout" is scheduled for Thursday, November 16 with a projected goal of a smoke-free society by the year 2000.

Don't ever think "I'm just one small citizen of a very small town in the Panhandle of Texas, so how can what I do or say ever make any difference in the big picture?" Slightly more than a decade has passed since the 1,800 citizens of that little town in Minnesota started the "Smokeout." There are now a total of 37 million Americans who are ex-smokers.

A recent Gallup poll found that 75% of Americans felt that smokers should not smoke in the presence of others. However, there are 54 million Americans who are still hooked on smoke and the cigarette companies have mounted an aggressive campaign against the anti-smoking movement. So the battle is not over.

Smoking among teenagers has declined somewhat, but high school girls are now smoking more than boys. This fact is especially distressing because the incidence of female deaths from lung cancer and breast cancer has more than doubled in the last decade. It is known that smoking causes complications in pregnancy, fetal injury, premature births, etc. Our young girls need to know what they are doing to themselves and their future children.

Let's encourage our friends, family and co-workers to have a smoke-free day on November 16. Use the buddy system and ask a friend to quit with you.

Small Town America has the potential for making the same impact on the alcohol and drug scene as it has had on smoking. We have the opportunity now to make an impact on the nation's "War On Drugs." Our recent "red ribbon" week was a step in that direction.

I do not agree with those in Washington, D.C. who say there has not been enough money allotted to launch a successful Drug War. Yes, it will take some government dollars to stop the foreign import of drugs into the country. But on the homefront, it doesn't cost anything for the citizens of each community to band together and run the local

drug dealers out-of-town. Comedian Dick Gregory has gathered together the citizens of various neighborhoods in Atlanta to march unarmed on the local crack houses and run the dealers out. He claims that if we do this, one block at a time, one neighborhood at a time, one small town at a time, eventually there will be no places left where the drug dealers can set up their business.

I've heard the local rumors. I just don't know the names. If you know who the people are who are dealing marijuana and other drugs on the local scene, gather together a group of your friends and confront the dealers with the fact that they are not wanted here.

You can make a difference.



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

From The Chief's Desk

This week's topic will be on the general types of lighting sources. The lighting sources that we will be talking about are: incandescent, mercury vapor, fluorescent and sodium vapor.

Incandescent lights are your normal everyday light bulbs. Incandescent lamps are relatively short in rated life, and low in lamp efficiency when compared to other lighting sources.

Mercury vapor lamps are generally considered more efficient than incandescent and are used extensively outdoors. Because mercury vapor lamps have a long life and good lumen maintenance characteristics, they are widely used in applications where long burning hours are customary.

Fluorescent lamps temperature sensitive and low ambient temperatures can decrease their efficiency. Fluorescent lights cannot project light over long distances and thus are not desirable as floodlights.

High pressure sodium vapor lamps provide high lumen efficiency and the lamp life expected is up to 24,000 hours. The maintenance of light output is good and averages about 90 per cent throughout its rated life.

Low pressure sodium vapor lamps have about 95 per cent lumen maintenance throughout their rated life. The average lamp life is 18,000 hours.

Maintenance of the lighting system can be just as important as choosing the systems. If maintenance is neglected there will be a loss in money and energy, both of which were possibly the considerations given to selecting the system in the first place.

Consideration should also be given to the possibility of incorporating vandal resistant materials into the lighting system.


