Siege of Nanking Started by Japanese

Feed Rate Hearing Is **Ended Today**

Railroads Decide No Testimony Is To Be Presented

. AUSTIN, Dec. 7 (A).—The Railroad Commission's hearing on proposed reduced livestock feed rates into the drought areas ended to-day when railroads decided to offer

The hearing was on application of ranchers who claimed conditions are worse than two months

Ranchers and agricultural agents testifying before the railroad commission yesterday painted a bleak picture of range conditions in 30 South Texas and Panhandle counties suffering from a lack of sufficient rainfall.

They urged the 25 per cent freight rate reduction on livestock feeds granted them until December be extended through the remainder of the winter. A large battery of railroad attorneys opposed any extension and was ready to go into district court here later this week in an effort to enjoin enforcement of the lower rates the rest of this month.

Ten counties were stricken from the group which may receive the reduced rate extension because no one was here to testify regarding their conditions. They were Carson, Dallam, Hansford, Hartley, Moore, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Sherman and Stephens.

Baby Killed After Kick By Horse

Two-Year-Old Girl Dies Instantly of Accident at Tarzan

Little Carol Ann Tramel, two and one-half year old daughter of of Midland but at present living near Tarzan in Martin county, was almost instantly killed today when kicked by a horse at her home.

The child was reported to have followed her grandfather, Frank Walcott, out to the lot where he was working and to have stepped up behind the horse without the man being aware of it. His first knowledge of the accident was when he heard the impact as the horse kicked the girl in one side of the head causing a fractured skull that led to her death before medical assistance could be reach-

The injured child was placed in an automobile and rushed to a Midland hospital but had succumbed before reaching here. Had she lived, she would have been three years old

Receding Traffic Toll

Records of the National Safety Council indicate that automobile drivers are at last beginning to get a little bit more careful—but the improvement is so slight that it is hard to get very enthusiastic about it.

In the first 10 months of this year, for instance, 31,-950 people were killed in traffic accidents. The record for the first 10 months of 1936 showed a loss of life of 29,560. There was, accordingly, an increase of 8 per cent in the number of fatalities.

This, however, is offset by the fact that there was an increase of 9 per cent in auto traffic. In proportion to the number of cars on the road, then, we killed fewer people this year than last. But the gain is pathetically small. Unless we can speed up our improvement, it will be the year 2000 A. D.

U. S. Warns Against Violations of the Monroe Doctrine

WASHINGTON. Dec. 7. (AP) Under-secretary of State Sumner Welles, inveighing against the spread of "alien" propaganda on the American continent, indirectly warned foreign nations Monday night, that the United States would not toler ate any violation of the Monroe Doctrine.

Addressing the Inter-American Center of George Washington University the State Department's Latin expert said:

"Any attempt on the part of non-American powers to exert through force their political or material influence on the American continent would be immediately a matter of the gravest concern not only to the United States but to every other American republic as well, and appropriate action would undoubtedly at once be determined upon as the

Welles did not refer by name to the doctrine, enunciated by President James Monroe in 1823, that the American continents were not to be considered subject to further colonisation by any European powers. Nor did he refer specificially to regular radio broadcasts to Latin America from Fascist and Communist countries in Europe, which are known to be causing some concern to officials
