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Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Charges against Senator John Milton of New Jersey, confidential henchman of Boss Frank Hague, are backed by evidence indicating that Milton is perhaps the only man who understands how Hague has been able to buy "hundreds of thousands of dollars of real estate on an \$8000 salary."
Milton has been counsel, "brains" and financial agent for Mayor Hague, who operates from Jersey City what is sometimes called the most corrupt big political machine in the country.
Appointed to the senate by Hague's Governor Harry Moore after Hague himself had refused the job, Milton took his seat in the face of charges of fraud in the election of Moore and of "all the known devices of violating election laws."

Although the Senate is likely to be complacent about Milton's background and refuse to oust him, the air is becoming surcharged with epigrams. Not the least startling statement is that made by Senator William H. King of Utah, Democratic chairman of the subcommittee appointed to consider the charges, before he had familiarized himself with the evidence.
"I am the law!" said Hague recently.
"I ain't never been arrested!" said Milton after his appointment.
"As chairman of this subcommittee, I cannot prejudice the case," said Senator King to a correspondent. "But Mr. Milton is here and he is going to stay!"

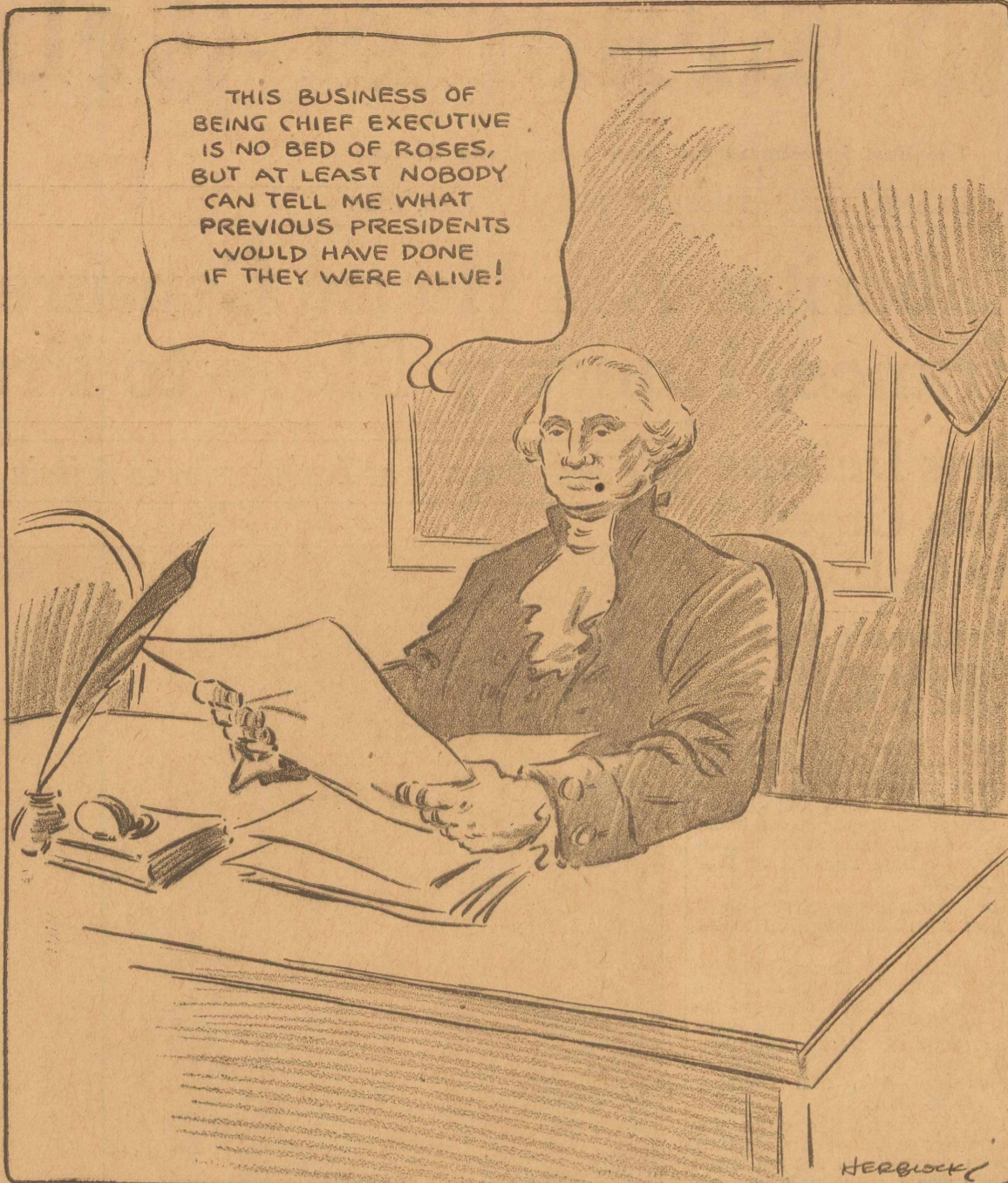

Farm Crop Exports From Galveston Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—The increase in agricultural exports from Galveston and the importance of those exports to farmers of the state, were discussed in the Congressional Record by Rep. Mansfield of the ninth district.

Quoting figures compiled by J. E. Blewett, secretary-treasurer of the Texas Grain Dealers association, Mansfield said 17,305,984 bushels of wheat, or 60 per cent of the 29,780,000 bushels exported the first six months of the current grain season from all United States ports.

Higher Education Urged To Bulwark Democracy

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (U.P.)—America cannot remain a democracy unless a majority of its citizens obtain college educations, Dr. Henry Thomas Moore, president of Skidmore College, Saratoga Springs, N. Y., said in an address to a parent-teacher group here.

A college education is necessary because without it people do not have a proper social consciousness, Dr. Moore said.

"If we are going to resist the movements toward dictatorships and retain our representative form of government, we must have in the United States people who can vote intelligently," he said.

Wardens Warned to Hold Seized Nets

AUSTIN (AP)—Laxity by wardens in disposing of seines or nets seized on charges of unlawful use brought a sharp reminder from Will J. Tucker, game commission secretary, recently.

The secretary instructed coastal wardens their only authority for such seizure was to hold the nets for evidence.

"If the defendant is convicted," Tucker said, "the seine or net should be destroyed only after the court has ordered its destruction or disposition. Remember they are personal property and you are responsible for it. If it is unlawfully disposed of, your bondsman may be required to pay its value."

The wardens also were told to instruct all storage plants accepting game to observe the law and keep a record of the game to avoid infraction of provisions limiting the time of storage.

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Mann Given Little Chance to Belt Million-Dollar Fight in Ash Can

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—It is safe to say that less is known about Nathan Mann—real name Natalino Menchetti—than anyone who ever fought for the world heavy-weight championship.

Indeed, the show was right on top of us before anyone heard of Mann's 15-round fight with Joe Louis at Madison Square Garden, Feb. 23.

This does not mitigate against Mann's chance, however, although I can't see that there is any great danger of his knocking the million-dollar June meeting between Louis and Max Schmeling into the ash can.

Mann has confined his operations to his native Connecticut and New York, and did not attract widespread attention in Manhattan until he dropped Bob Pastor to one knee and poked the Bronx boy around no little at the Garden in late November. That was no mean accomplishment and the feat that is putting him in the inclosure with Louis.

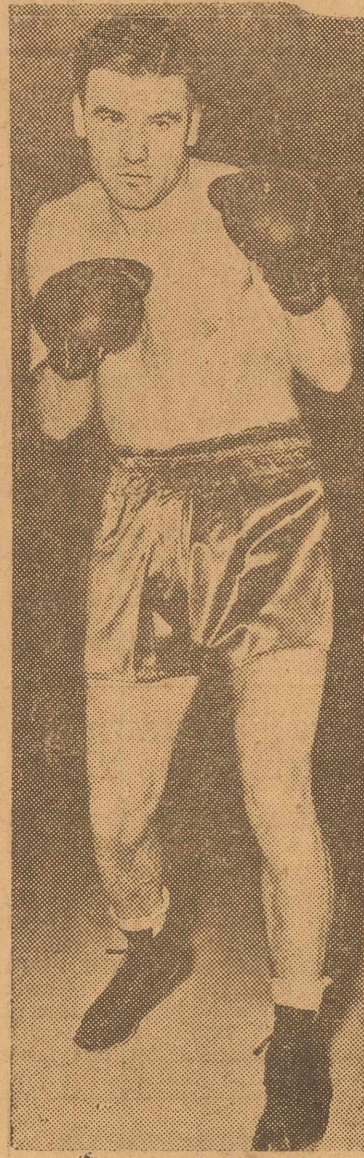
Built Like Boxcar.

Mann, whom the boys in New Haven call Boxcar and who looks like one, has the weapons with which to beat Louis. Certainly he is better equipped and a more polished workman than Tommy Farr. He'll stir up plenty of trouble if it turns out that he can take it as well as the Welshman, who was still chucking punches at Louis in the fifteenth round.

We'll know more about the Louis-Mann scrap following the Negro youth's opening burst of fire. If Mann weathers the early going, his chance may improve as the battle rolls on. He is going more than 10 rounds for the first time, but, as related in a previous

article, he has the type that comes able to do two things. He must pack a good punch. He must be able to move around. Farr moved

and stayed. Schmeling moved and punched and knocked out the Brown Bomber.

Mann has a fine pair of legs and a fast pair of arms. Louis is still a sucker for a right, and Mann hits sharply with his right.

Mann Hungry Fighter.
Both Louis and Mann trained well, but Louis hasn't been to the post since he outspared Farr last fall. It was after a protracted layoff that Schmeling clipped the Detroit lad.

I never saw more savage workouts than those between Mann and Johnny Whitters at Madame Bey's famous Summit camp. Whitters is a capable negro heavy-weight from Pontiac.

Mann has seen every start made by Louis since the champion became prominent.

Unlike the Louis opponents who preceded Schmeling, Mann is totally unafraid. What is more, he is convinced that Smoky Joe can be beaten . . . that he can't shake off a solid shot to the head. Nathan isn't thinking of losing.

Mann has everything to win and nothing to lose, and it never pays to laugh off a hungry fighter, especially when he has the potentialities and pluck of this sturdy kid who came from nowhere.

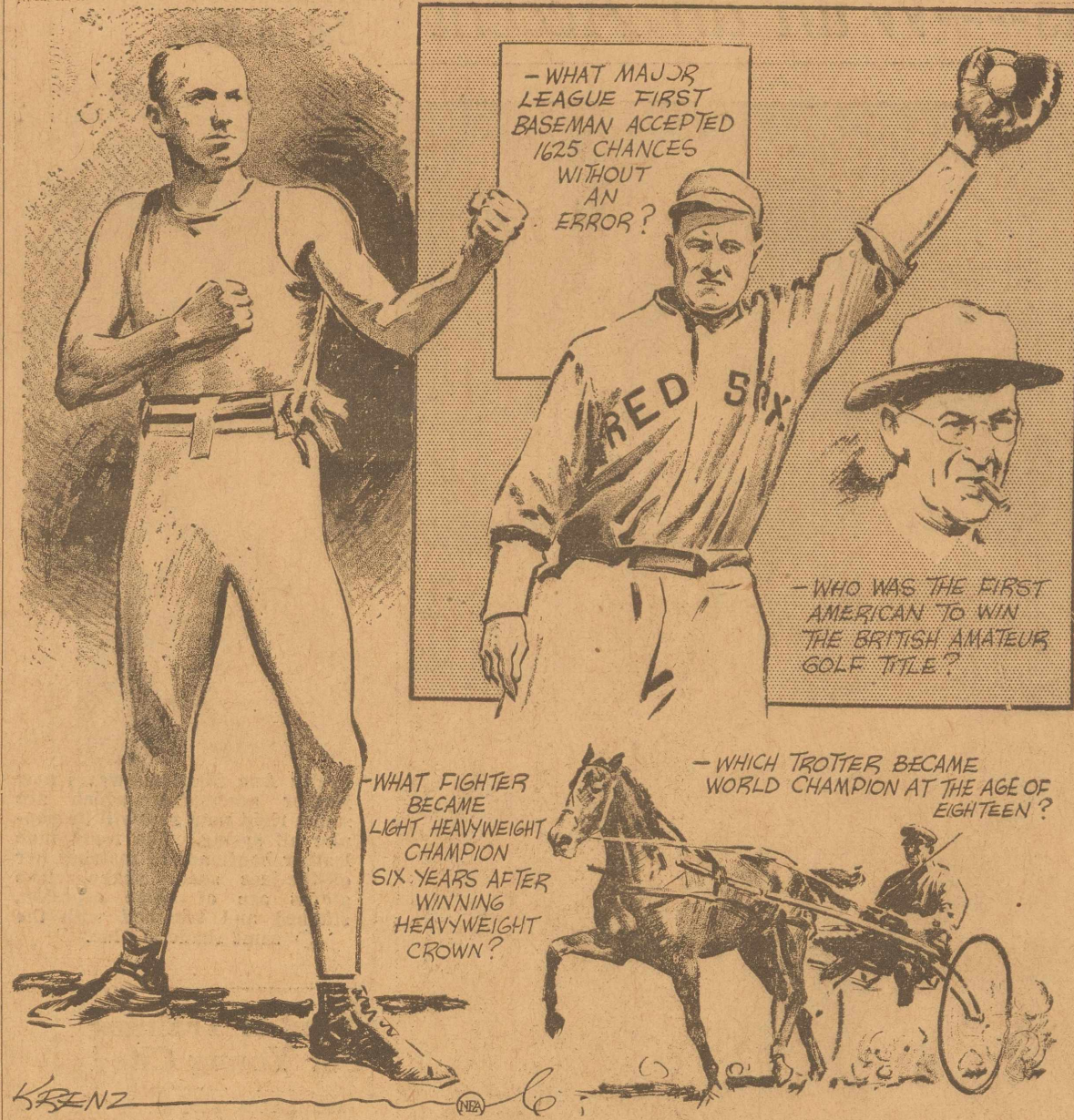

Observations Thru New Telescope Lens To Start in Spring

FORT DAVIS (AP).—Dr. Otto Struve, joint director of McDonald Observatory and the Yerkes Observatory, Chicago, who recently visited the Mount Locke plant near here, said astronomical observations through the 82-inch telescope lens are expected to start this spring.

The lens still is undergoing polish in laboratories in the east. Dr. Struve said the maximum departure from the true in the lens is about twice the maximum error that should be altogether desirable.

"This, of course, is a very slight variation," he said, "and astronomers are constantly urging me to accept it as it is but we prefer to be extremely cautious."

He added that opticians are continuing the polishing process in an attempt to trim the variation to the possible minimum and hopes to be ready to install the giant lens in the early spring.

A new radio set especially built for planes has been recently designed. Complete, it weighs less than two pounds. The set will be very useful in small sport planes.

the Texas coastline do not constitute the only value of those areas. Fishing industries would be endangered, as well as every other enterprise now operating under a state grant or sanction.

"Passage of this legislation would endanger the titles of many holders under state leases. At least one oil well has been brought in on a state lease and others are drilling. Uncle Sam proposes now to take over all these. It is a threat much greater and more vital to more people than the threat of federal control of the oil industry over which many Texans grew excited a few years ago. And fundamentally, the issues are the same—the issue of a sovereign state retaining its sovereignty."

Shell 1-C Baumgart Swabbing 7 Barrels Of Fluid Hourly

Denver No. 4 Whittenburg, in the Denver pool, was flowing 20 barrels of oil an hour after acidizing with 5,000 gallons of acid, is unloading hole after re-treating with 5,000 gallons.

George P. Livermore No. 1 Wright, eastern Cochran test five miles north of the nearest producer in the Dugan area, flowed 27 1/2 barrels of fluid, 30 per cent basic sediment and eight per cent water, on 24-hour test through 3/4-inch choke on tubing following re-treatment with 8,000 gallons. It had previously been treated with 3,000 gallons.

Ohio No. 2 Averitt, on the southwest edge of the Seminole pool, drilled at the rate of one foot every minute from 5,000-89, present total depth, and showed new oil through circulating oil. Operators have killed the well with mud and water for the purpose of changing out defective nipple.

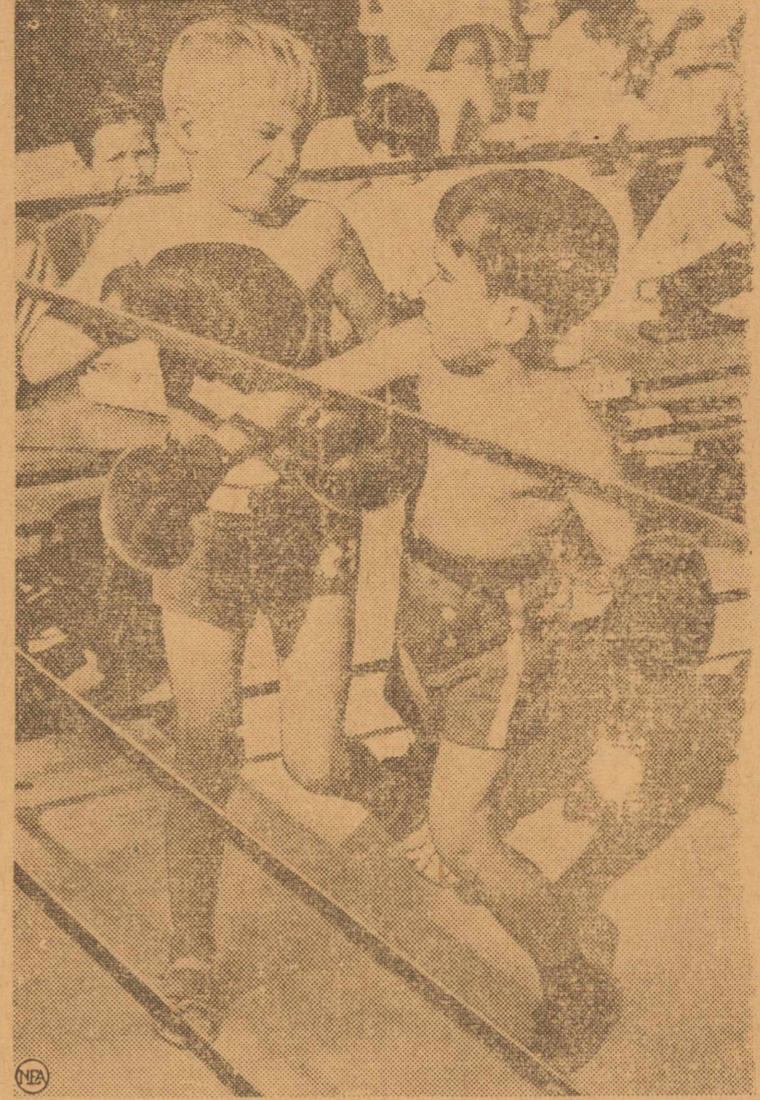
Seaboard No. 1 Munger & Nix, Andrews wildcat five miles west of the Fuhrman pool, this morning was reported to have shown some oil in coring to 4,771, in lime. Amount of saturation in cores was not learned. The well is in section 1, block A-41, public school land.

In Lynn, Baldrige No. 1 Alamo Lumber Company is shut down for fuel at 4,040, in lime. Gulf No. 1 Gordon, Hockley test southeast of Slaughter production, cemented 7-inch pipe on bottom at 4,757 and will rig up standard tools. Gas in Delaware.

Increase in gas, estimated at 40,000 feet daily, was struck at 4,478 feet in C. R. Mallison No. 1 Brown-State, Reeves Delaware test, blowing tools 10 feet up the hole and sticking them. Drilling line has been cut, tools have been jarred to bottom, and crew is now trying to fish them out.

J. C. Hill and Barnett No. 1 Ely, west of Toyah in Reeves, is shut down for orders at 4,223 feet, in black shale. It has failed to show in the Delaware, which was topped at 3,814.

Early Response by Officials on Work Done in Counties

SAN ANTONIO.—Early response by Texas mayors and county judges to a request that they submit reports on their experiences with the Federal Works Program have been particularly gratifying, according to H. P. Drought, state administrator for the Works Progress Administration.

Sponsored by a group of national organizations, the United States Community Improvement Appraisal is designed to gather information concerning the results of the several Works Program agencies which have operated during the past five years. "Representatives of local governmental agencies, large and small, are best qualified to discuss the results of the Works Program for they are the ones who have originated projects for the employment of the destitute jobless in their communities," said Drought. "For this reason, they have been requested to supply data indicating on a nation wide scale the extent to which lasting improvements and valuable public services have been realized thru the co-operation of local and Federal governments."

Representative committees of outstanding citizens will study the reports prepared by local sponsors of Federal projects. Conclusions reached by these committees will be forwarded to the United States Community Improvement Appraisal committee in Washington to be included in the national report. Letters of invitation have been mailed to representatives of all Texas agencies which have sponsored projects and entries will be received until March 8, after which the various committees will meet and prepare their reports. National agencies participating in the Appraisal are: American Association of Planning Officials, American Institute of Architects, American Municipal Association, American Public Welfare Association, National Aeronautic Association, National Education Association (Department of Adult Education), National Recreation Association, U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, U. S. Conference of Mayors, and the Works Progress Administration.
