What Five Years of Hitler Have Done to Improve Nazi Germany

Is the Reich Ready To Assume World Power Status?

Five years after the day in 1933 when mustached Adolf Hitler strode from the Brown House in Munich to promise the German people a return to world power, his iron-heeled troops tread the soil of Austria, now made part of Germany.



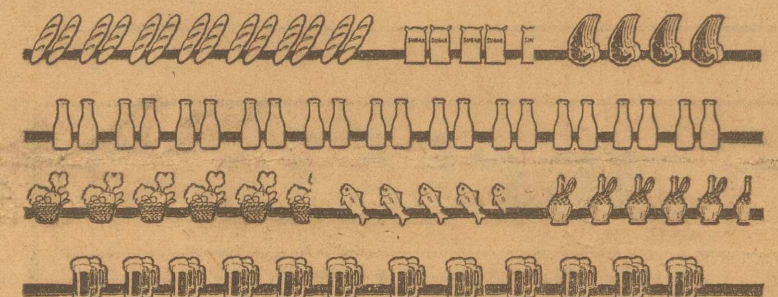

UNEMPLOYMENT IN GERMANY



The chart below shows a year's increase in German food consumption. Each figure represents one pound more per person consumed in 1936 than in 1932.



How increased production of goods has increased in Germany is shown in the chart above. Re-armorment has been largely the chief factor, however, in this rapid rise.

Scrapped Versailles Treaty

In startling succession he ordered reconscription of the German army, triumphantly regained the rich Saar area; reoccupied the demilitarized Rhineland; perfected the Rome-Berlin axis; flung to the world his demand for the return of German colonies lost in the World War, and now has annexed little Austria.

Since then, says a recent survey of the Foreign Policy Association, the decrease in unemployment has been due to a real increase in production.

Imposed Rigid Program

To meet these inadequacies Germany has imposed a virtual economic straitjacket. The government has established rigid control over imports, limiting the purchase of food stuffs and finished goods so as to be able to increase the purchase of raw materials in a semi-finished goods. Experimentation has been carried on to discover "ersatz" or substitute material.

Texaco Drilling in New Wildcat in SW Howard County

Depth of 65 feet in caliche had been reached last night by a new wildcat in southwest Howard county, the Texas Company No. 1 H. H. Wilkinson. Located 330 feet from the north, 904 feet from the west line of section 32, block 34, township 1 north, T. & P. survey, the well is about 11 miles northeast of the town of Stanton. It is scheduled to drill to 3,600 feet unless production or sulphur water in the "big time" is encountered at a shallower or depth. No. 1 Wilkinson is on a geophysical "high." Texas Company blocked approximately 16,000 acres in southwestern Howard and southeastern Martin counties surrounding the test.

Drills Own Oil Tests

Mr. Britte always has believed there is oil under his land and, rather than to sell his leases or farm out the prospective development, he has sunk his own tests. One of the four was turned into a water well, three being given fairly deep tests for oil. The Luke Britte No. 4 is now drilling and yesterday stood at 4,450 feet.

Has 80-Mile Pipe Line
