

Chinese in New Advance On 2 Fronts

Japan's Front Lines Being Swept Back By the Defenders

SHANGHAI, May 6, (A). - Chinese claimed the recapture of approximately half the territory in South Shantung province won by the Japanese in the three week's offensive from Lini as the undeclared war ended its tenth month today.

SHANGHAI, May 6 (A).—Chinese, ubilant in hopes of a second major victory on the Shantung front, reported their legions today were coninuing to sweep back Japan's front
