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Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON, June 24. — The job of administering the new wage-hour act is the most important one to be created here in a long time. But it definitely is not nice work even if you can get it.

The three men most seriously considered for the appointment don't want it. They are:

Leon Henderson, present chief economist of WPA and former boss of research and planning for NRA, who forecast the current depression early in 1927 and has fed the President and other New Dealers much of the factual material they have used in the last two years.

Isador Lubin, chief of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, a brilliant economist and administrator who has built government statistical services up to a new high point of efficiency.

Lloyd K. Garrison, dean of the University of Wisconsin law school and chairman of a former National Labor Relations board.

ALL STILL POSSIBILITIES.

LUBIN and Henderson have both repudiated approaches with assertions that they would not accept. Garrison, who is Secretary of Labor Perkins' preference for the post, is said by friends to feel likewise. All three have ideas as to the nobility of public service, however, and none can be considered definitely out.

Amiable conferences between business men and administration officials continue much more frequently than any one publicly admits. Possibly the most significant things about them is that the industrialists continue to pay the checks.

Policy Shaped To Link Navy, Trade Fleet

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The man in charge of efforts to rebuild the American Merchant Marine, entailing the expenditure of more than \$2,000,000,000 over the next eight years, is a retired naval admiral who believes passionately in the use of the merchant marine to enhance the prestige and potentialities of the navy.

Admiral Emory S. Land, who is pledged to carry out the maritime policies laid down by his predecessor as maritime commission chairman, Joseph P. Kennedy, will lead a party of government officials down the east coast of South America this fall on a tour dedicated to maritime good-will.

He also is intensely interested in building up maritime services in the trans-Pacific routes, to Hawaii, the Philippines, China, Japan and the East Indies. Construction of adequate merchant passenger and cargo liners to South America and to the Orient, in Admiral Land's opinion, will enhance the nation's diplomatic and commercial prestige, while assuring a speedy auxiliary to the national defenses on the high seas.

Known as Ship Builder.

Admiral Land is primarily a builder of ships, an organizer and

an expert in the technique of keeping the merchant marine in physically perfect condition, and in maintaining its morale at a high standard.

The maritime commission chairman is a firm believer in discipline in the merchant marine, but he has roundly condemned American ship operators for "washing their linen in public" and for exaggerating the lax morale of American seamen.

As chief of the bureau of construction and repair of the navy, Admiral Land for some years was in charge of all the work on the maintenance and enlargement of naval equipment.

He considers his responsibilities as chairman of the maritime commission as even greater than those he had in the navy. The work of rebuilding the merchant marine, he thinks, is one of the gravest problems facing the government.

Follows Kennedy Program.
For the broad policies of government subsidizing, construction, and operation of privately-owned ship lines, Admiral Land follows the outlines set down by Kennedy. Although naval admirals are generally considered to be opposed to government operation of the merchant marine, Admiral Land has proved to be liberal in his outlook on government participation in maritime activities.

He has pledged the maritime commission to give private interests the "right-of-way" in the operation and construction of merchant lines. Where satisfactory private operation is not available, however, Admiral Land has declared himself in favor of direct government assistance and participation in merchant marine activities.

Of all the accomplishments which have been credited to the maritime commission chairman through his years of active life, he is secretly proudest of a feat of his collegiate career.

In Young Land, as a student midshipman at Annapolis, played football and scored the winning touchdown against army in the famous contest of 1900 when the navy won 11 to 7.

Known as Organizer.
This alone was enough to make Admiral Land one of the most popular midshipmen ever to graduate from the Naval academy. Land's interest in athletics persisted throughout the years in which he was carving out a career as a construction engineer and naval organizer.

Until recently Admiral Land, who looks many years younger than his age of 59, acted regularly as a field referee in football games throughout the country. He still takes an active part in sports, especially tennis at which he is a skillful player.

Italy Sets Up Clinic to Save Ancient Books

ROME, U.P. — A clinic for sick books, hailed by the Italian press as the first of its kind in Europe, has been established here.

Various ailments, some of which are deadly, such as mold, bacteria, oxidation, ruin the books. Lately, as far as Italy is concerned, a new and no less destructive enemy has been added. It is the termite, a voracious white ant which is attracted by the ligneous part of the paper.

During the past year, millions of termites, leaving from Sicily, have been invading continental Italy, doing havoc in the libraries of south Italy and even boring at the vital parts of valuable old choir stalls in certain churches of central Italy. The outstanding and most recent case of these devouring attacks is the beautiful choir of St. Peter's church at Perugia, whose stalls have been almost pulverized internally.

In Tobacco Leaves.
It seems that the termites appeared at Palermo and Catania mingled with tobacco leaves from the Near East, and from those two cities started their invasion northward.

Alarmed at these various threats to ancient documents and structures, the Italian government decided to face the problem in a big way and with adequate financial means. From this decision the idea originated of creating a national clinic for the treatment of printed and engraved matter menaced by destruction.

The clinic, entrusted to the care of Prof. Alfonso Gallo and maintained through a special item in the budget of the ministry of national education, has been made an annex to the Botanical Institute.

It is composed of two sections: the pathological and the therapeutic, each supplied with modernly equipped laboratories. In the former section, the experts, or clinicians, examine the causes and effects of the various ailments. Morphology has a great part in this work. In the latter section the remedies are applied after previous application of microscopy, spectroscopy, fluorescence, ultra-violet rays, photography, chemicals, etc.

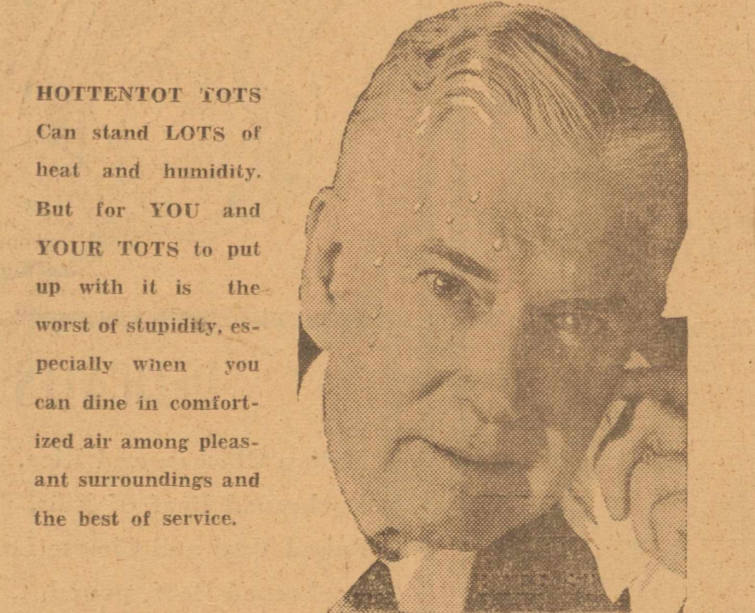

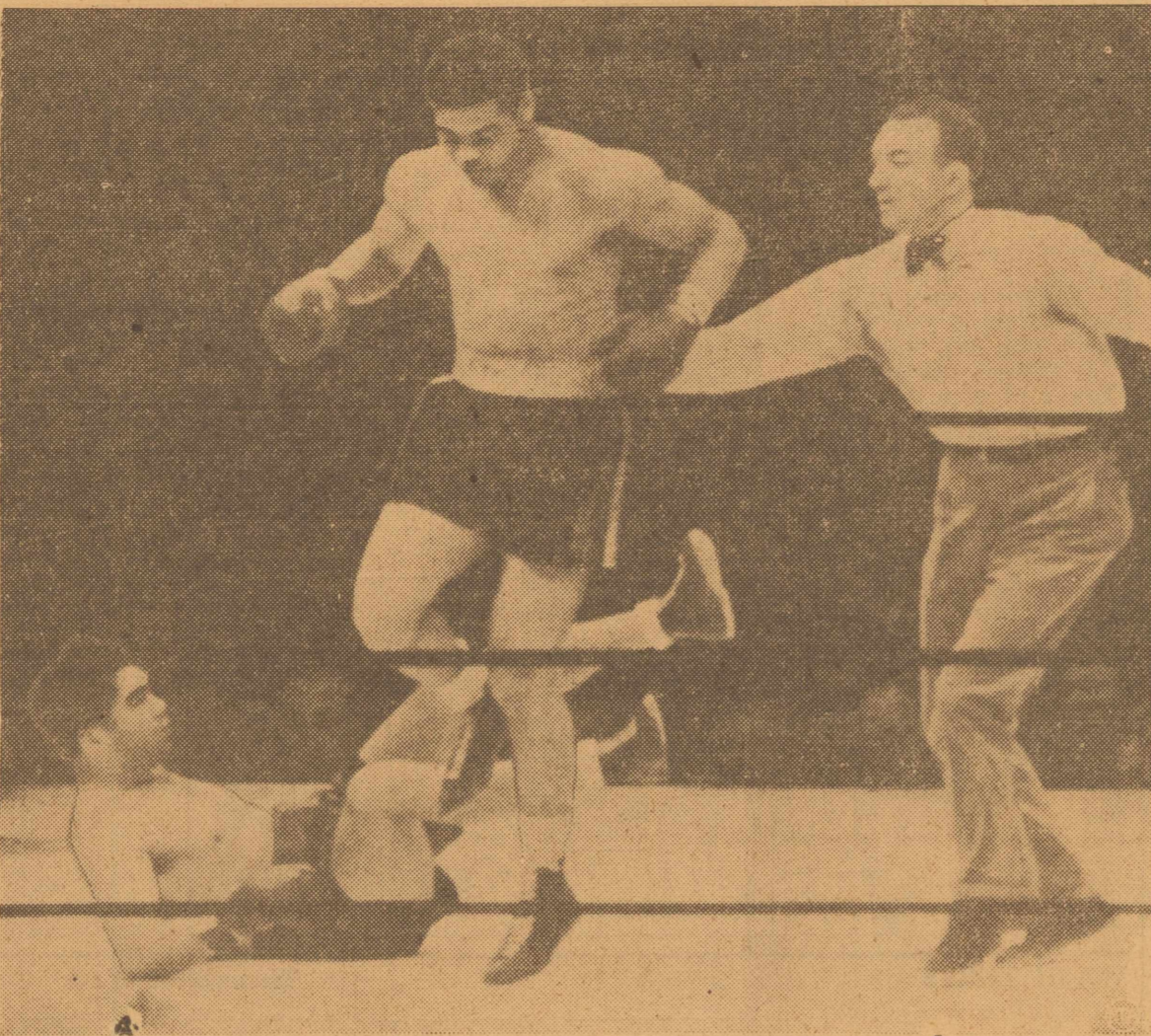
