## Air Victory Claims Made By Japanese

### 36 Chinese Ships Declared Downed In Battle Sunday

SHANGHAI, June 27 (AP).-Chiese and Japanese warplanes clash-Sunday, high over Nanchang, Generalissimo Chiang Kai - Shek's argest air base, but the outcome was in dispute.

A Japanese communique reported between 33 and 36 Chinese planes were destroyed and admitted loss of three Japanese craft.

The Japanese said the attack was started by three groups of army planes which engaged a Chinese squadron. Between 12 and 15 of he Chinese planes plummeted to the ground in this phase of the battle, the Japanese communique said, while three of the attacking planes were lost. Japanese naval planes took up the

## On Projects of NYA

AUSTIN.-At the end of this fiscal year, 9,400 young Texans were being employed part-time on National Youth administration work projects in Texas, J. C. Kellam, state Youth director, announced. This number is the largest assigned to the work and training program during the year, he said.

These young people, many of whom have never had a job before, are assigned to 250 work projects which are sponsored by city and county governments, by school district boards, and by other public agencies. Seven resident projects are providing work and training opportunity for about 400 boys and girls in agriculture, shop work, and recreation leadership and for negroes in domestic service. Seven part-time resident projects are providing work and training in home-

making for 300 Texas girls. Construction work is underway on four community centers, which NYA youths are helping build for the use of their home towns. Applications for several other centers are to be acted upon early in July. Tome economics cottages and a vocational agriculture shop are being constructed at four schools, and the construction of an administration building in the park at Buchanan



Salvador Bows to U. S Constitution

ZEALOUSLY guarding her independence since she separated from Spain with the other countries of Central America on Sept 15, 1821, Salvador holds great faith in the democratic form of government. So it now joins the growing list of nations issuing special postage stamps to mark the 150th anniversary of one of the greatest experiments in democracy, the United States Constitu-

The present constitution of Salvador was promulgated Aug. 13, 1886, and provides for three divisions of government. The legislative function is invested in a congress of a single chamber. Voting is obligatory on every male citizen of 18 years or over. The president and vice president are elected by popular vote for fouryear terms, and may not succeed themselves for the ensuing term. The judiciary is composed of supreme court, one court of third instance, and several of first and second instance. Salvador is divided into 14 departments, presided over by governors appointed by the president for terms of four


