





The conquest begins late this summer. Britain, German, and French planes are poised for test hops across the ocean in planes designed for commercial use.

Here at Seattle the Boeing 314, world's largest airplane, is in the midst of exacting tests to verify her fitness as the American (Pan-American) entry in the race.

Within a month the North Atlantic will be a-buzz with wings.

Hughes spent \$200,000 on his dollars and three years of planning and dreaming have gone into this 41-ton flying boat, which is actually bigger than some of the ocean ships of early explorers.

Although the testing of the clipper has been going on for weeks, the flying tests by her future crew will not be made until August, and actual flights across the ocean not until later in the fall. Passengers won't be carried until next year.


