The Japanese said a new large scale drive against Chinese guerrillas in Shantung province already had scattered 10,000 irregulars near Tsinan, Shantung provincial/capi-

But the Chinese insisted the 42,-000 fight-and-run warrlors in Shantung still were active and that 'continuing to be successful." Guerrillas were said to have driven within 25 miles of Nanking.

In southern Shansi province, where the Japanese have been attempting a new campaign to carry them across the Yellow river, Chinese maintained the invaders were becoming "increasingly confused before the combined onslaughts of

Go to the Polls Next Saturday

It's difficult enough to get out a representative vote at a run-off primary election, due to the fact that the most heated races usually are pretty well decided in the first primary. And the one next Saturday is no exception. Governor, sheriff and constable were elected without a run-off. So the easy going voter, even with his poll tax paid and his path leading across the court house square, will let the run-off primary slip.

But that should not be the policy of the Midland county voter. Certainly there should be interest in the railroad commissioner, land commissioner, attorney general and lieutenant governor races. If not, it should be a matter of pride to see the local candidates in district office races get a fair chance at the decision

And now there is another reason why every Midland county voter, and especially those of precinct No. 1 should go to the polls. For the third time, an effort will be made to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages. Twice the issue has lost, with a fairly representative vote cast. This time it is the duty of every voter to have his say. If you object to having liquor displayed, advertised and offered for sale in down town liquor stores, surely you will want to vote against it. If, on the other hand, you are in favor of that method of government regulation and tax, you will want to aid the attempt at its passage.

Go to the polls Saturday and vote your opinion. And while you are there, don't forget the local candidates who are seeking district offices. They haven't spent these five weeks visiting the home folks but have taken their support for granted and are out in the other districts, making hay while the sun shines.

Pedestrians Help Cause Accidents

The National Safety Council has charged pedestrians with a large share of the responsibility for traffic accidents that killed 39,500 persons in 1937. Of this total Sharp and Healthy, Babson Finds, in 15,400 were pedestrians. In "Accident Facts," a statistical review of 1937, the council said:

"Many pedestrians show utter lack of caution in their use of streets and highways.

'Combined state reports for 1937 show that in 67 per cent of all fatal pedestrian accidents the pedestrian either was violating a traffic law or was acting in an obviously unsafe manner.

"In non-fatal accidents pedestrian faults appeared in above the low level of the reces-
