Many Jews face the future not knowing where to turn even to live from day to day. It is estimated 60,-000 Jewish men have been sent to jails and concentration camps, leaving many families unable to replenish ready cash funds.

A temporary end to wholesale arrests and the recent sharp de-cline in German exports may prove a momentary life-saver at least for the Jewish export trade.

A group of American Jewish leaders urged President Roosevelt Sunday to ask that Great Britain throw open Palestine to German

The request was made in a resolution adopted by a meeting of about 300 Jews from 65 Atlantic seaboard cities, who were called together by the United Palestine Appeal.

At the same time, the meeting pledged cooperation of American Jews "in a large-scale settlement scheme which will insure the absorption of the Jewish refugees into the economic system of Palestine with general benefit not only to the Jewish population but to all inhabitants of the land."

The group heard an appeal from Rabbi Edward L. Israel of Baltimore, vice-chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, for American Jewery to impose upon itself a "volun-tary fine" of \$1,000,000,000 to be used in aiding Jewish refugees from oppression

CHAMBERLAIN TELLS OF PLAN TO REMOVE JEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 21. (AP). - Prime Minister Chamberlain today told the house of commons of plans to lease at least 10,000 square miles of British Guiana to provide homes for German Jews seeking a refuge abroad from the nazi regime's anti-Jewish campaign.

Chamberlain also disclosed favorable progress for settlement of Jewish refugees in Tanganyika, formerly German East Africa, and other territories of Africa.



### Little Red Wagon Saves Wear and Tear on Artist




