



Death Claims Both as Bull Moose Lock Horns in Primitive Battle for Mate

By BILL GEAGAN NEA Service Staff Coresspondent

KOKADJO, Me. — A spectacle, which so far as is known, has never been witnessed by a white man, took place recently in the wilderness that sprawls north of this far-flung village when two bull moose, believed to have weighed 900 pounds each, locked horns and died in battle.

Ed Lowell, game warden, Ray O'Donnell, a guide, found the remains of the warriors on bloody and badly torn battle ground. They found the huge heads pressed tightly together with the antlers so tightly locked that four men were unable to pry, pull, or pound them apart.

This is the first time that such a discovery has been made in Maine's 15,000,000 acres of forest land for many years. Although dead only three days at

the most, nothing remained of the animals but the heads, hides, and Nearly al lof the flesh and bones had been devoured or dragged away by bears, bobcats, foxes, hawks. owls, and other furred and feathered predators of the big wodos.

The death struggle was apparently brought about by the call of a cow moose that echoed through the forest and instead of attacting only one bull, brought two.






