Federal Judge Confirmation Given Allred

Opposition Dropped By Senator King On Final Voting

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17. (A) Former Gov. James V. Allred of Texas was confirmed to a federal district judgeship by the Senate Thursday without a record vote after Senator King (D-Utah) had said he would drop his opposition. King, who twice before had asked consideration of Allred's name "go over" under procedure requiring unanimous senate consent, explained he had objected on grounds Allred was not a resident of the Southern judicial district of Texas to which he was appointed.

Apparently there were not enough enate votes to block eventual confirmation, King added. He said he had received a large number of communications from Texas recently protesting Allred's appoint-

Senator Sheppard (D-Tex) also told the senate he would not object to confirmation, and Senator Connally (D-Tex) asked that a state ment he had made before the judic iary committee be inserted in the

In the statement Connally said that while he had recommended someone other than Allred, he would not object to the latter's con-



25-degree temperature. Ice-covered trolley wires delayed car service at Sherman. Th cold is expected to spread to other sections tonight.

Winter blew into Midland again yesterday afternoon and, in doing so, followed its usual course this year-on the heels of a sandstorm. The sandstorm struck in Midland about 3:30 and lasted until after dark. Borne by a north wind, the sand started a decline of the mercury that had reached a minimum of 24 degrees.

Traffic in the city was hampered this morning by a light mist that froze as it fell. Drivers, when driving for more than a few blocks at a time, were forced to scrape ice from their windshield in order to maintain vision.

Yesterday's maximum temperature was 64 degrees, registered at 2:30 in the afternoon, but a perceptible drop was evident after the first cold from the north wind struck. The mercury continued gradually downwards until eight epresenting nine West Texas towns wards. At 1:30 this afternoon the temperature was 28 degrees.
