British Declare Act Violation of Friendship Pact

LONDON, Apr. 4 (A)—Unconfirmed reports Italy was planning to send troops to occupy Albania brought a British hint today such action would violate the British-Italian friendship agreement.

Informed British quarters indicated the British government, while not planning to fight Italy over Albania, would expect to be consulted over any disturbance of "status quo regarding national sovereignties in the Mediterranean area."

The British view was expressed as Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary, and Joseph Beck, Polish foreign minister, concluded the first talks designed to cement Poland into a European front against further German expansion.

The difference between the honest effort at Washington to ease the crushing arms burden and the renewed race of today is the measure of these 18 years.


There is almost no criticism of the new battleship program. We did not choose the road.




