

## **Showers Fall** Over All of West Texas

#### Precipitation in City Totals Only .03 of One Inch

Drizzling rain, starting at 4 o'clock this morning, had wet the top soil at Midland and over much of the adjacent territory, although no hard showers had fallen. The rain total was still below a tenth of an inch, it was estimated. The airport weather station gauged .03 of an inch, while the government gauge at the Southern Ice Co. was found to be out of order and unable to

Additional rain had fallen at Rankin and points south of Midland where rain and damaging hail had been recorded the night before From the Midway filling station, between Rankin and Midland, to the Van Huss draw, the rain was heavy enough to cause water to run in barrow pits along the highway. Toward Midland it was lighter. Roy Parks, visiting his south ranges, found the moisture very little heavier than at Midland.

Rain began falling slowly last night at Big Spring, continuing through the night and causing water to run in the gutters by morn-

It was reported rain fell throughout the night at Odessa and was continuing at one o'clock this afternoon. A half-inch was estimated from the slow drizzle.

Reports from Lubbock indicated an estimated five inches of rain fell in a short while at Shallowwater, near Lubbock, early last night. Lubbock reported an inch and a half.

#### The Soviets "Biggest Thing for Moscow in Years, Official Declares

MOSCOW, May 4 (A).-Vyaches laff Molotoff, Joseph Stalin's right hand man, took over direction of Soviet foreign affairs today, replacing Maxim Litvinoff, important figure in international conferences for nearly 20 years.

Silence of Soviet officials as to the significance of Litvinoff's displacement heightened the impression in diplomatic circles of imminent crucial developments.

One foreign diplomat said "whatever this means, it is the biggest thing that has happened to Moscow for years."

## **Car and Truck** Meet Head-On On Highway

Mrs. J. C. Farmer Dies Here 4 Hours After the Accident

Mrs. J. C. Farmer, 34, Odessa, died in a local hospital this morning at 11:15, approximately four hours after the car she was driving collided with a truck about seven and a half miles west of Midland. She suffered internal injuries, fractured jaw and shoulder and severe lacerations. She was given a blood transfusion this

morning. The truck was said to have been driven by John McFaring, Colorado City, who was en route to Odessa. He escaped uninjured.

The husband of Mrs. Farmer said that she apparently lost control of her car when she jerked it back on the pavement after getting off on the shoulder. The pavement was wet, causing the car to spin directly into the approaching truck de-spite efforts of McFaring to avert an accident, traffic patrolman Frank Manning said.

Mrs. Farmer was en route to Madill, Okla., to visit her mother, Mrs. O. S. Lowrey, at the time of the accident. Her husband was en route to Midland on business and was folowing his wife in another automobile. He was a witness of the acci-
