Local Man Is Stabbed Sun. Night

Corn Harvest Is Underway

Corn harvest is underway in the Bovina area, and it has been an unusual harvest, due to the weather.

Harvest has been underway for about ten days, and the beginning of harvest was delayed somewhat due to rain and wet fields. Showers on Monday of this week may again delay the cutting to some extent where the showers fell.

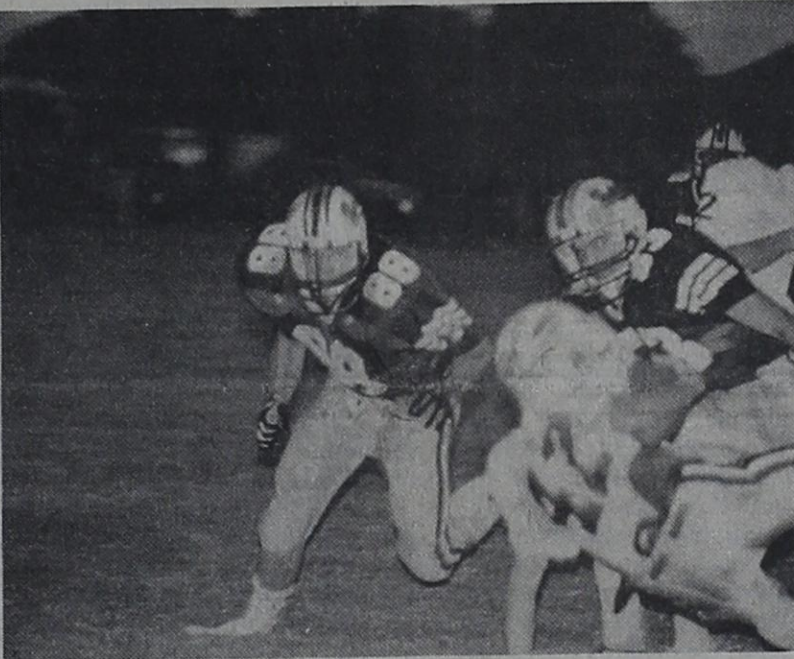
Harry Johnson, spokesman for Sherley Grain Company in Bovina, said that so far the bulk of the corn has been cut for ensilage for the feed yards.

"The moisture level is higher than usual, and the yield is also better than average. We had a good growing season this year," Johnson said.

James Clayton had the honor of marketing the first load of corn at Sherley Grain for the 1986 season on September 9, and received a \$50 bonus for his efforts.

The only drawback to the harvest situation is the price of corn, which on Tuesday stood at just \$3.30 per hundredweight.

This is down by almost one-half of what farmers received for their corn 20 to 25 years ago, when prices got up to \$5.50 and \$6.00. The problem is, that expenses have risen considerably since that time, and cost of producing a crop has mushroomed.

Defense Shines In 6-0 Mustang Loss

The Bovina Mustangs played well in their second game of the season last Friday, but couldn't get their offense untracked in a 6-0 loss to the Melrose Buffaloes.

"I thought the kids played hard. We had 78 plays on defense and only allowed the six points. That's about all you could ask," said Coach Bill Talley.

The Buffaloes advanced the ball inside the Bovina on two other occasions, but good defensive play by the Mustangs prevented any further scoring.

On one particular play, Tom Fuentes and Vince Mesza combined for a quarterback sack to halt one visitors' scoring threat.

Talley had words of praise for Vicente Munoz, who was "in the right place a number of times," linebacker Bud Venable, seeing his first action since a back injury, and Todd Ware. "The entire defense just played a fine game. They played about as well as they possibly could," Talley said.

Melrose's passing game sank the Mustangs, as quarterback Rex Bostwick completed 15 of 34 attempts for 173 yards.

The only score of the game came in the third quarter when Frank Morgan ran six yards for the touchdown. A pass for extra points failed, but the lone touchdown held up. The TD was set up by a 50-yard pass play from Bostwick to Jeff Wallace.

Mustang fullback Todd Ware was Bovina's leading ground-gainer with a net of 24 yards on nine tries. Bovina had just 77 total

McCathern Takes Issue With Combest

"Our nation is in one of the biggest crises it has faced in years," Gerald McCathern told a group of supporters at a rally in his honor last Thursday evening in Friona.

McCathern is the Democratic nominee who will face incumbent Larry Combest in the November election for the 19th District Congressional seat.

"There is no reason that wheat prices should be \$2.00 a bushel today, and corn prices should be dropping close to \$3.00 a hundred," McCathern said.

"We have people running our government who either do not understand the farmers' situation, or if they do, they have decided to get rid of a bunch of farmers," the candidate said, pointing out the large number of farmers who have already been driven from their farms.

"Our district (19th Congressional) affects the national economy as much as any in the nation, due to our agriculture and oil," McCathern said, decrying the sad economic condition that both of these industries are currently faced with.

"Yet, the farm program we have was pushed and supported by our present congressman, who voted for it eight times. He also was quoted as saying the drop in oil prices might be good, as it would push out the marginal, ineffective producers," McCathern said.

Mustangs Pay Visit To Owls

Bovina High School's Mustangs will visit Hale Center on Friday for their third game of the season. The Mustangs are hopeful of scoring their first win of the season.

"The kids were disappointed that we didn't beat Melrose, but if they can overcome their disappointment, I feel that we'll have a good chance for a win Friday," said Coach Bill Talley.

"These kids definitely have character. We have improved considerably over last year. This time around we should have a chance to win when we go out there," Talley said.

Hale Center, with a 1-2 season record, isn't quite as salty a team this year as they have been in the past. The Owls' win was over Tahoka. They have lost to New Deal and Petersburg.

The Owls return virtually their entire line from 1985 intact, with an experienced quarterback in the backfield. They are expected to be a formidable opponent.

The Mustangs, meanwhile, had a good workout on Monday, in and around the raindrops, and are expected to be ready to square off against the Owls.

Homer Renteria sustained a slight back injury in the Melrose game, suffering a bruised muscle, but is expected to be in the lineup on Friday.

The Hereford area farmer, who was a leader in the American Agriculture Movement, said that in order for our national economy to be strong, the pricing of raw materials, including oil and farm products, must be adequate for producers to make a profit.

The congressional candidate also attacked the nation's import policy. "We are an island of free trade in an ocean of protectionism," McCathern charged, implying that our domestic industries need to be given more consideration by the government.

"We don't need more taxes, we need more taxpayers," McCathern said, pointing out that the 19th Congressional District was formerly one of the biggest taxpaying districts in the country, but that due to the current situation with agriculture and the oil industry, the district could be facing a tax-deficit situation.

The candidate said that agriculture was a great industry (in years when prices allowed the farmers to make a profit). "Every farm is a factory. We manufacture a product. But our tax base is going to be eroded if the present situation continues. That will in turn be a major problem for our school districts.

"This is what made me decide to run for office. Someone needs to tell our story. I feel we have an excellent opportunity of winning the election, if we carry the rural areas by a big margin," McCathern told the group.

Jerry Don Glover of Lazbuddie introduced McCathern, and urged those attending the rally to work on behalf of his election. "We appreciate Gerald taking this year out of his life to run for office. We need to do everything in our power to get him elected," Glover said.

The rally was sponsored by the Steering Committee to elect McCathern. A "Mexican Fiesta" meal was served, and a good crowd attended the event at the Friona Grade School Cafeteria.

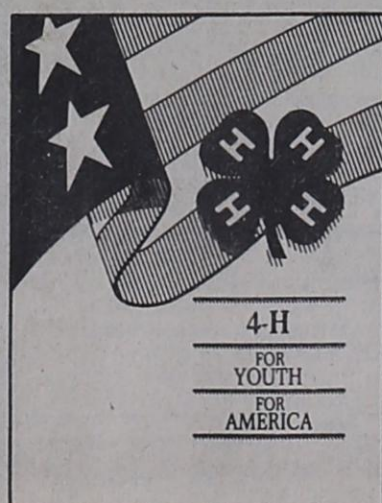
After his speech, farm toys, donated by Friona implement dealers, were auctioned off, with proceeds going to the campaign.

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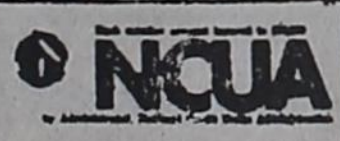

As you are aware, our State Legislature is in special session to try to resolve an approximate three billion dollar deficit.

The House of Representatives is fighting any type of tax increase. I personally believe that increasing the sales tax to five per cent and broadening its base will go along way in solving the deficit problem.

At the present time, we have three years to make up the deficit, but if the legislature does not do something in this special session then there will only be two years to work with, and the deficit will probably triple.

Please contact Congressman Pete Laney and let him know that you would much rather see an increase in the state sales tax than an increase in your local taxes. A modest increase in the sales tax could raise approximately nine billion dollars by the end of fiscal year 1989. This would solve our deficit problem and virtually guarantee that we would not have to look forward to an even higher tax increase in the regular session which convenes in January, 1987.

Write a letter, make a phone call, or personally contact Congressman Laney and let your feelings be known.

Mark White may not be your candidate, but he is sticking his neck out to fight the problem head-on. Bill Clements brags of no new state taxes while he was Governor, while in reality, local property taxes were increasing all over Texas to fund education.

Taxes are not popular with anyone, but a broad-based state tax is a much better choice than increased local taxes.

OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."
