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

Birth Control Clinics Growing In Importance Over the Nation

Announcement made a week ago that steps would be taken here toward organizing for Midland a birth control clinic doubtlessly has brought forth much comment. It s demonstrated, by those investigating such a clinic, that similar projects have been undertaken all over the nation and are growing in importance and public goodwill.

Taking the Maternal Health Center of Fort Worth as an example, a few statistics might be brought out. It is a charitable organization, non-sectarian, non-political, supported by private donations for the purpose of providing scientific birth control information and materials to married women unable to pay a physician. The Center proeeds on the theory that it is better that poverty stricken mothers do not have large families of children—if they and their husbands so desire—when the only sure heritage or those children is dependency, or disease, or both. Famly planning is considered a more accurate description of the Center's objective than the term "birth control."

Opened February 22, 1938, clinics have been held each Tuesday and, to date, 425 women have applied for admission, of whom 137 were rejected because of existng pregnancy or of high income, and 298 were accepted. Of this number, 167 were women on relief. Hospitalization, where necessary, was provided in some instances and possibly the lives of several women were saved.

From the purely economic standpoint, figures reveal ed were interesting. If the clinic prevented the birth of 298 unwanted babies, the delivery of each one being comouted at \$25, approximately \$7,500 was saved. The cost of maintaining the children, had they been born, was estimated at \$5,000, or a total of \$12,500. Total expense of the clinic was \$1,850, or a saving to the community of \$10.650.

That point of view is strictly mercenary. From the larger and more humane view, the saving in suffering was incalculable. 



Provisions Are Explained There are three classes of loans under the new Modernization Credit Plan of the Federal Housing Administration. A detailed explanation of the provisions of the three classes follows: Class 1 Loans A class I loan may be used to finance the cost of alterations, repairs, or nprovements upon or in connection with existing structures only. For

Modernization Credit Plan

REPAIRS. Including carpentry, masonry, electrical, and plumbing repairs. This means anything from a crack in the sidewalk to a

REDECORATING. Floors, walls, and woodwork can be refinished. New floors can be laid, or "permanent" floor coverings such as tile or cemented linoleum paid for. **REMODELING.** Any structural change may be made, such as putting up or removing partitions, building additions, making "new" rooms out of unused attic or basement space, building porches, sun

parlors, etc. The loan may also be used to convert one type of building into another type. For instance, a single-family house could be converted into an apartment. MODERNIZING. Cabinets, shelves, and other conveniences may

be built in. New plumbing, heating, and wiring systems may be installed or old ones modernized. The installation of a septic tank or cesspool, or the drilling of a well, together with the necessary pumping equipment, would also be eligible.

LANDSCAPING. The ground on which the building stands may be improved by grading, laying walks, building fences, and planting. A class 1 loan may not be used to finance the cost of completing an unfinished structure. This, however, does not exclude a loan for the repair of a building which has been damaged but not substantially destroyed by deterioration, flood, fire, or other casualty; nor the construction of an attached garage or other attached building in connection with a completed house or other completed building.

Types of buildings which may be improved with a class 1 loan are: Homes, apartment houses, multiple-family houses, hotels, office or other commercial buildings, hospitals, orphanages, colleges, churches, manufacturing, and industrial plants

Class 2 Loans Loans in this class are for financing new structures which are not used wholly or in part for residential purposes. These include barns, garages, service buildings of various types, wayside stands, gasoline stations, tour-

ist cabins, and various industrial or commercial buildings.

The cost of the equipment used in the operation of a business occupying the structure may not be included in the loan, but the cost of heating or lighting systems and similar items eligible for class 1 loans may be included. For example, if the loan is used to build a gas station, part of the loan may be used to install a heating system but not to buy and equip the structure with pumps or other trade equipment

No part of the loan may be used to purchase land or existing structures, but more than one new structure may be built on a single piece of property if the total amount expended is not more than \$2,500.

This class is for financing the construction of new buildings which are to be used wholly or in part as residences. Certain minimum requirements must be complied with to assure sound and habitable construction. These apply to any commercial structure, such as a wayside stand, which is used as living quarters for the operators. As in the case of class loans, the loan may be used for new construction only, not for the purchase of land or for equipment other than that eligible under class 1, not may the loan be used to complete an unfinished structure.
