soda, salt and ginger together. Heat molasses and shortening together until it just boils. Stir in the dry ingredients until smooth. Divide dough into two balls. Bovina's population was in the neighborhood of 350 in 1932 when Rhinehart left the cafe business to go to work for the state highway department. After about two years, with the highway department, he bought the Phillips wholesale business and ran it for 10 yearsuntil 1944 when his health got bad. After 1944 he spent more time with his farming operations, which he had taken on as a sideline in 1932. When his health improved in 1947, he began his present business, real estate and insurance.
