

Husband Charged In Death Of Ex-Wife

A Hereford woman was found shot to death last Thursday in a parked car behind a Farwell television repair shop, and her 30-year-old former husband has been charged with murder in connection with the shooting.

Funeral services for Betty Ann Carlisle, 22, were conducted Saturday in Hereford. Burial was in West Park Cemetery, Hereford.

Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace said employees of Bob's TV in Farwell noticed the car and its occupant when they reported for work around 7 a.m. Later, around noon, it was discovered that the woman was still in the car, and authorities were notified.

The victim's ex-husband, David Carlisle of Plainview, was released on \$25,000 bond Friday after being charged with murder before justice of the peace R. E. Mears.

Carlisle and his ex-wife had reportedly been seen about 1 a.m. Thursday leaving the Jord-Inn Truck Stop Cafe in Hereford, where she had previously worked as a cashier. Sheriff Lovelace said Mrs. Carlisle had been shot in the right side. A .38 calibre pistol was found near the scene in some weeds, the sheriff reported.

Carlisle, in whose name the car was registered, was charged after being brought to Parmer County Jail Thursday by his father, a truck operator in Friona, the sheriff said.

The deceased woman was

born in Waurika, Okla., and came to Hereford in 1968 from Lubbock.

Survivors include a son, Jerry Heggstad of the home, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elgin Moore of Hereford; two brothers, Randall and Ricky Moore, both of the home, and grandparents, Mrs. Martha Williams of Bryan, Okla. and C. H. Moore of Petrolia.

Parmer Projects To Contract Stage

Highway construction contracts awarded in July by the Texas Highway Commission include two projects in Parmer County. The total construction amounts to \$1,778,249.71.

One project, to require an estimated 45 working days, will re-construct a bridge at Catfish Draw, a half mile north of Bovina on Farm to Market Road 1731.

In addition to the contract for the bridge, State Force work for grading, base, surfacing, special signing and detours in the amount of \$12,350 is included in the project.

Total amount of the bid was \$1,749,50. The contract was awarded to H.C.H. Construction Co., Inc. of Odessa.

The other project is somewhat more sizeable. It calls for asphalt stabilized base, hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement and seal coat on the shoulders on U.S. Highway 84 from the Bailey County line to 7th Street in Farwell, a distance of 10.2 miles.

Contractor on this job will be Henry L. Stafford and Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Lubbock. Low bid was \$1,746,500.21. It will require an estimated 120

working days.

Both projects will be supervised by District Engineer George C. Wall, Jr. of

Lubbock, and will be under highway department engineer Rhea E. Bradley of Littlefield.

Several Bovina tennis enthusiasts have competed in area tournaments this past month, bringing home trophies and gift certificates.

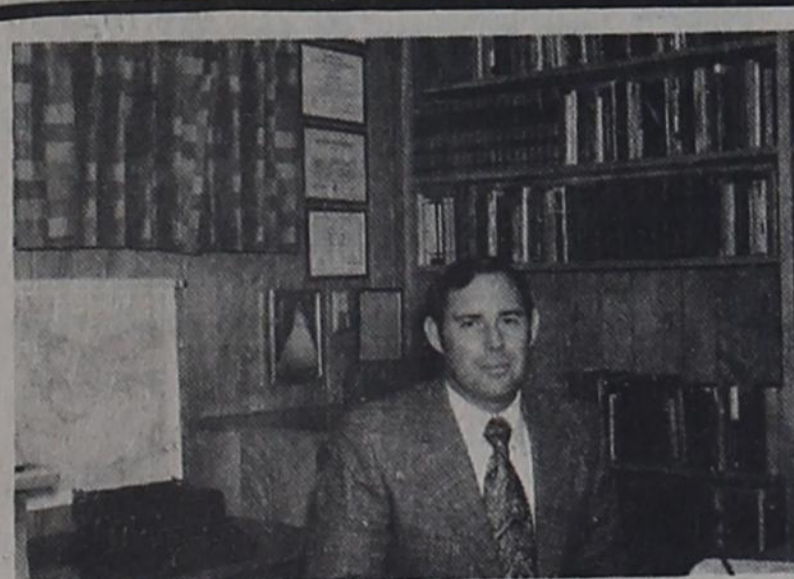

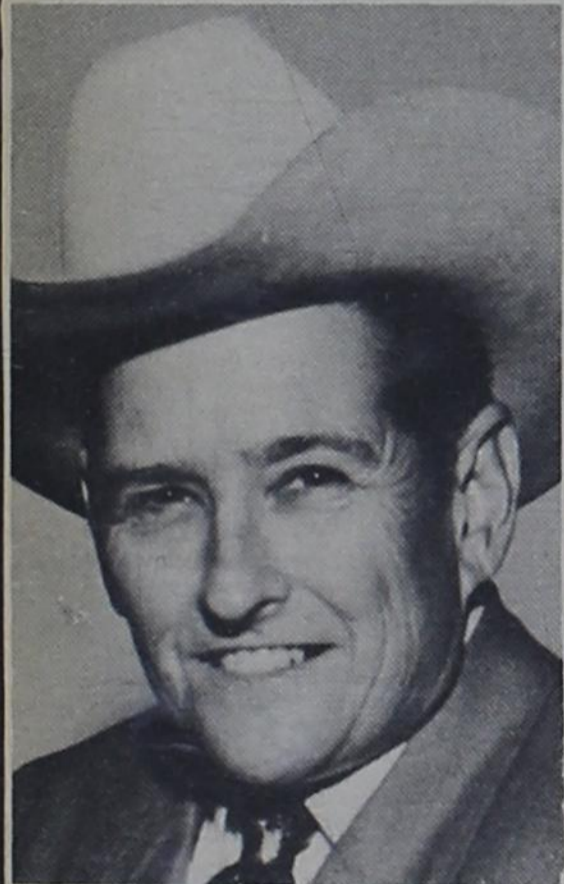

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

TGSP Meeting Set Tuesday At Lubbock Office

The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has set its bi-monthly meeting Tuesday, August 13, at its head-quarters at 1708-A 15th Street in Lubbock. The board will meet at 10:00 a.m.

On the agenda will be a report from Dr. George McBee, resident director of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Lubbock. Dr. McBee will discuss progress on production and release of greenbug resistant hybrids-a TGSPB funded project.

Other topics will be the U.S. Feed Grains Council work of grain sorghum promotion overseas which is supported by TGSPB, miscellaneous research insect reports, and market seminars to be held in September.

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Briscoe Approves Panhandle Grants

Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved two criminal justice grants totaling \$100,955 for improving law enforcement in the area served by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, based in Amarillo. Larger of the two grants, \$69,263, goes to Amarillo for fourth-year funding of the Potter-Randall Metro Intelligence Unit. The unit is made up of members from the Amarillo and Canyon police departments and sheriffs' offices of Potter, Randall and Deaf Smith counties. The unit conducts investigations and surveillances pertaining to organized criminal activities and either assists in making arrests or provides information to an enforcement unit for arrest and prosecution. The second grant, to Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for \$31,692, pro-

vides continuation of the law enforcement academy. Two basic law enforcement training courses of six weeks each and a nine-week specialized training course will be offered to some 340 officers with 1974 funding. The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973. The local grants were among 60 totaling \$4.7 million which the governor approved.

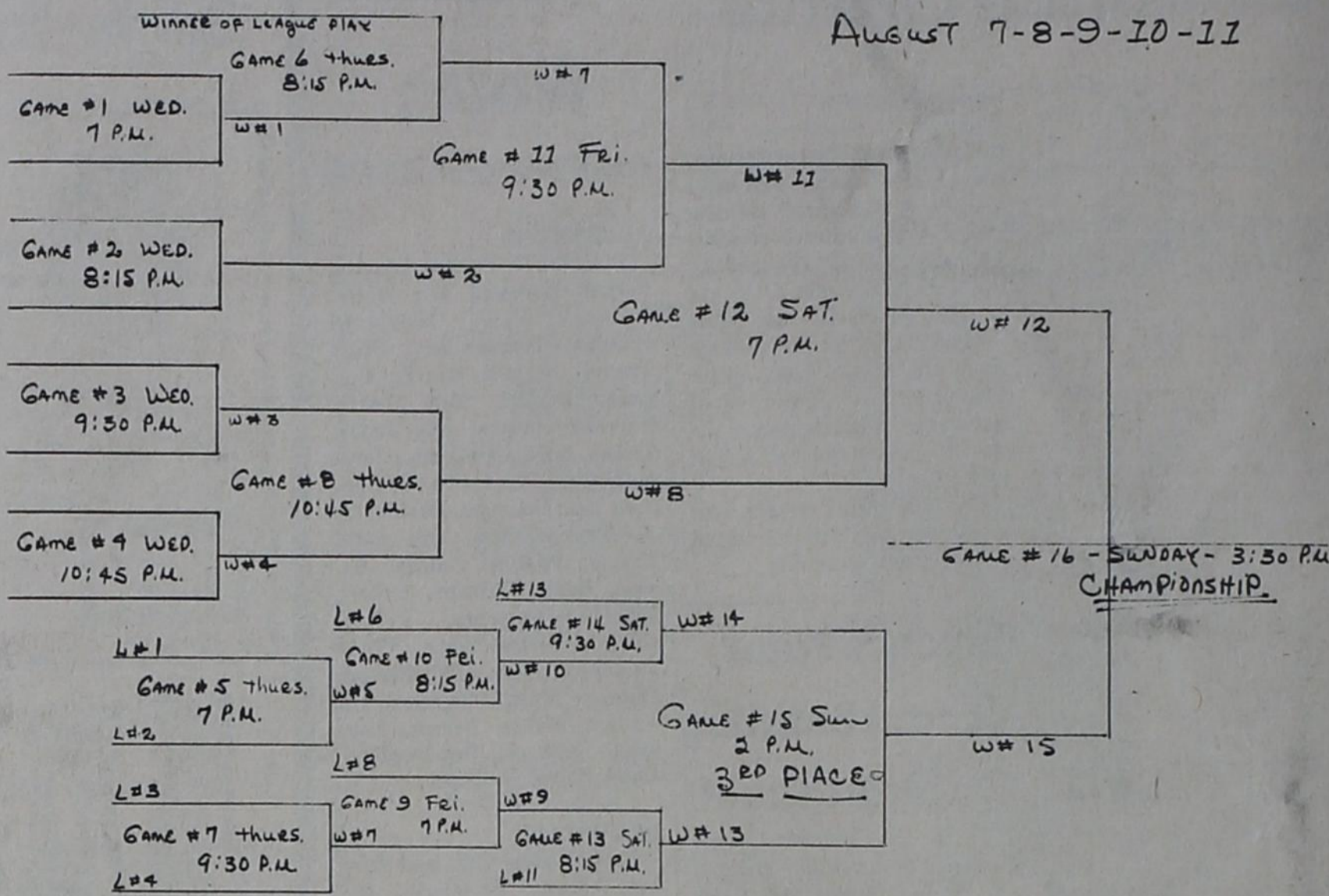

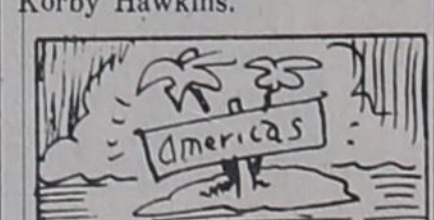
