LIKE MOST TEXANS we were a mite disappointed when the Constitutional Convention adjourned last Tuesday at midnight without passing a proposed constitution for the voters to decide upon.

When the last vote was taken on the final resolution, there were 118 votes in favor, just three votes short of the 121 votes needed for passage.

Since the taxpayers of Texas had been tapped to the tune of approximately \$5 million to finance the Constitutional Convention, most voters felt like they should have been given something for all of this time and expense.

Some of the suggestions, in case another opportunity presents itself to re-write the constitution, include choosing ordinary citizens as delegates. rather than legislators, many of whom have special interests, or axes to grind, and thus try to influence the makeup of the document in their favor.

Representative Bill Clayton placed the blame on organized labor for the convention's failure to pass a new document. Labor, according to Clayton, put on a "do or die" effort to keep the right-to-work clause out of the constitution.

There had been several provisions in the proposed new constitution that we had agreed with, and would have liked to have seen passed into law, but suppose we'll just have to wait awhile, now.

Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved two criminal justice grants totaling \$100,955 for improving law enforcement in the area served by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, based in Amarillo.

Larger of the two grants, \$69,263, goes to Amarillo for fourth-year funding of the Potter-Randall Metro Intelligence Unit. The unit is made up of members from the Amarillo and Canyon police departments and sheriffs' offices of Potter, Randall and Deaf Smith counties.

The unit conducts investigations and surveillances pertaining to organized criminal activities and either assists in making arrests or provides information to an enforcement unit for arrest and prosecution.



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
