





# Water Table Drops Nearly Four Feet

According to records recently published by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, the groundwater level continues to decline in Parmer County.

W. L. (Bill) Broadhurst, Chief Hydrologist for the Water District, states that water levels in more than 50 observation wells that are measured annually by the Texas Water Commission and the High Plains Water District indicate that ground water beneath the County is gradually being depleted.

"To illustrate what is occurring throughout Parmer County, we have picked at random four observation wells that have been measured since January 1956. Each of the wells selected is from a different part of the County," Broadhurst said.

He continued, "for purposes of illustration, we picked observation well #387, 3 miles southwest of Friona, on land owned by C. W. Dixon; well #390, about 6 miles east of Bovina on land owned by W. H. Long; well #398, 2 miles northwest of Lazbuddie, on land owned by W. M. (Bill) Sherley, a former member of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Water District: and well #401, about 4 miles east of Farwell on land owned by J. W. Billingsley."

According to Broadhurst, the four selected wells are typical of irrigation wells used throughout Parmer County to water agricultural crops. Broadhurst did some figuring







There have been several meetings in the county on the use of systemic insecticides, to be used in cotton.

These systemic insecticides will give four to six weeks protection from planting date on to avoid prolonged contact with thrips, aphids, spider mites and leaf miners.

Phorate (Thrimet) applied to dust. the seed or placed in the furrow in granulated form at planting. One-fourth to 1/2 pound of the active ingredient per acre may be applied as a seed treatment or 1/2 to one pound per acre in the furrow.

Seed may be treated at the rate of 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per 100 pounds of seed to accommodate planting rate.

One pound of actual Di-syston applied in the granular form at time of planting is also affective. Over-dosing with seed treatments may retard early growth especially under weather conditions unfavorable for emergence. Use extreme care in handling treated seed or granulars because they are toxic

Be mindful of insecticidal drift that may contaminate neighboring vegetables or forage crops at the time cotton is sprayed or dusted. Plan crop locations in advance to eliminate this problem.

Farmers are already buying seed for this years crop. Study tags or labels on seed, so you will know what you are buying. Be sure and notice if there is any noxious weed seed in the bag. We do not want to plant bindweed or Johnson grass. Also, it is best to plant treated seed, Good seed cost a little more, but it can pay you big dividends in the long run.
