





Martinez, critically injured in the explosion, drove a pickup to Bovina to summon help following the accident.



Martinez was alone in the house at time of the explosion. After getting help in Bovina. he was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona by Claborn ambulance, Deputy Henry Minter called Friona for an ambulance and a doctor when the seriousness of Martinez' injuries were discovered.

The explosion was accompanied by a small amount of fire. However, firemen report that Martinez evidently snuffed out the flames prior to making the trip to town. There was no fire when firemen arrived on the scene. Some bedding and clothing were burned in the fire.

Damage to the house from the explosion was extensive, firemen report. Roof of the house was knocked loose from the

Martinez' wife and four children were not in the house at time of the explosion.



### HD Agent's Notes

BY MISS ETTIE MUSIL

Are you interested in trying to beat the heat? You may try serving some delicious frozen orange juice or lemonade to your family, or for your afternoon break. You might mix juices from canned fruit for a quick energy builder, too.

The 4-H Club girls have a delicious cooler that they made this year in their Favorite Foods unit. Try this for a summer drink. Mix 1 cup cold milk, 3/4 cup cold apricot nectar, 1 tablespoon sugar, and 1/4 teaspoon lemon juice together and blend well. Then pour into glasses. This recipe will serve

Lately we have beem victims to the mosquito population. During these summer days camping, fishing, picnicing or just outof-the-house cooking and eating are so popular, but so are the mosquitoes during the evening

A new insect repellent is now on the market that has been developed by the USDA scientists and is sold under several trade names. The repellent is commonly called deet, and diethyltoluamide is the chemical desig-

Deet is effective and safe for general use on the skin or on certain kinds of clothing materials. It can be used against mosquitoes, ticks, fleas, chiggers and biting flies. However, instructions for the use of the repellent should be followed

If the chemical is not properly used it may affect certain County Farm Bureau. The meetpaints, varnishes, and some of ing will begin at 10 a.m. the plastic materials. It is safe for use on cotton or wool fabrics if they contain no synthetic fibers. Some insect repel-

lents stain certain fabrics. When smeared evenly on exposed skin areas, deet is effective for several hours. Another good point is that it has little or no odor and it does not cause a greasy feeling on the skin.

During these warm days perspiration stains on clothing are most common. Perspiration stains normally are acid and usually will wash out of washable fabric. Sometimes the color of the fabric is changed. If so, dampen the stain with water and hold it over the fumes from an, open bottle of ammonia. This may restore the color. Old stains may be alkaline, If so, sponge with

Perspiration odors may be removed by sponging the stain with warm water to which a few drops of vinegar have been added. Then sprinkle with powdered pepsin. Work the powder into the stain and let stand one or two hours, keepthe spot moist. Finally, brush powder off and rinse Farm Bureau,

During these warm days we can stay fresh as a daisy with deodorants after a daily bath. Deodorants remove odor only, but antiperspirants check perspiration. In our science courses we were told that antiperspirants could be unhealthy for many people. If a brand of a deodorant irritates your skin, try another until you find the brand that will help you stay neat and sweet summer and winter months.

Perfume and fabrics do not mix either. When applied directly to your clothing, perfume may result in dye rings, color removal, permanent stains and a disagreeable odor upon aging in the fabric.







Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

TEXAS:

Section '1: That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations.

The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of Constitution and laws of this state.

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, im-paired, suspended, repealed or sus-

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 10(a). The Legislature may authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which shall include all or part of the West Columbia. Brazoria, and Damon Independent School Districts and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District. The qualified electorate of the hospital districts may, by majority vote of each such hospital district, consolidate the Sweeny Hospital District into the Damon, West Columbia, and Brazoria Hospital District at any time subsequent to the organization of the separate hospital districts. "Such districts, if created, may be

"Such districts, if created, may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property within the districts. provided no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident, qualified, property tax paying voters who may have erty taxpaying voters who may have duly rendered their property for tax-ation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections, provided existing obligations are not impaired, but in no event shall any change of rate exceed twenty-five cents (25c) per one hundred dollar

"The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to acquire, construct, maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the acquisition, construction, purchase, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same and such bonds shall be payable from said
