Only The Worthy Remain Free

As the calendar heralds 1944, grim predictions of Allied political and military leaders rank foremost in the minds of all people. Nineteen-hundred-forty-four is the year of decision. It is the year of total war and destruction, death and suffering. It may well be the year of military victory—thanks to the courage of our fighting men and the American production miracle.

Armament production in the United States has reached staggering proportions. In November, every five minutes saw the birth of one new complete plane. The month's total was 8,789, of which 1,000 were heavy bombers. More than 150,000 war planes have been built since the start of hostilities.

Nineteen million tons of merchant ships were launch-

ed in 1943, compared to 1,163,000 tons in 1941. Naval and shipbuilding has outstripped the imaginations of the wildest dreamers. About a dozen aircraft carriers were turned out in November alone. Warship tonnage in 1941 was 2,132,000. Out of the ashes of Pearl Harbor it rose to 5,000 tons in 1943, a colussus bent on the destruction of Japanese aggression and Nazi tyranny.

Tanks, guns and supplies are being produced in unbelievable quantities.

These things were nade possible by the productive genius of free enterprise. In the hands of 10,000.000 American men and their companions in arms, they are America's answer to the warped leaders of Europe and First Methodist Church will meet Japan who have challenged our freedom.

But we have no cause to rejoice. Thousands of our men must die in 1944 to meet the challenge of the dictators. Usual year-end speechmaking and editorial phrase-making are out of place. find out can be seen in the gusts of bitter controversy sweeping through the land over strikes, taxes, subsidies and inflation. They are the prelude to the storm. When WEDNESDAY it hits in full fury, the test of our love of freedom will

No person in this nation can ever shut from his mind the awful vision of the last days of 1943 in which 1,000 Marines lay dead on the beaches of a South Pacific island. Those men died for the right to be free. We at home have yet to prove worthy of the freedom for which they

Associated Press War Analyst Russia's great new offensive, which is plowing into the German line with such devastating effect represents the formal opening of the decisive and final phase of the European war—the beginning of Allied land onslaught which soon will see the inauguration of the vital second front in France.

This time a year ago the Red Army at Stalingrad was putting the finishing touches on Hitler's hopes of winning the war. From that moment the master gangster went on the defensive.

In the intervening 12 months the Russians have forced the powerful German war machine back across the steppes until the Muscovites are battling at the old Polish border west of Kiev. From Stalingrad to that border is more than 700 miles, each foot of which has been wet with the blood of the hundreds of thousands of men who have

Winter Aids Russians Russia's winter finally has come to the full aid of the Soviet forces. Big Russian offensives are under way in three sectors of the thou-sand-mile front: in the Dnieper Bend, where the Germans are gravely endangered; in the Kiev bulge, which now is a corridor to Polish border; further north in the Vitebsk-Nevel zone, where the attacking forces are headed for the neighboring Latvian border.

The position of the Germans in all three sectors undoubtedly is serious. It would be a delectable morsel to roll under the tongue if we could say that catastrophe was imminent for the Hitlerites but, while they're certainly going to crack one cause about all it got was a snicker

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# Simplified Tax Plan Is Proposed

WASHINGTON —(P)— A major legislative operation designed to make it unnecessary for millians of persons to file any federal income tax returns at all was proposed Monday by Rep. Carlson (R-Kans.). Most income taxes would be deducted automatically from

wages and salaries under his plan. The Kansan, a member of the tax-initiating ways and means committee and author of the Ruml pay-as-you-go bill, described present revenue statutes as "a hodge-podge or language that cannot be correctly and definitely interpreted by a Philadelphia lawyer."
