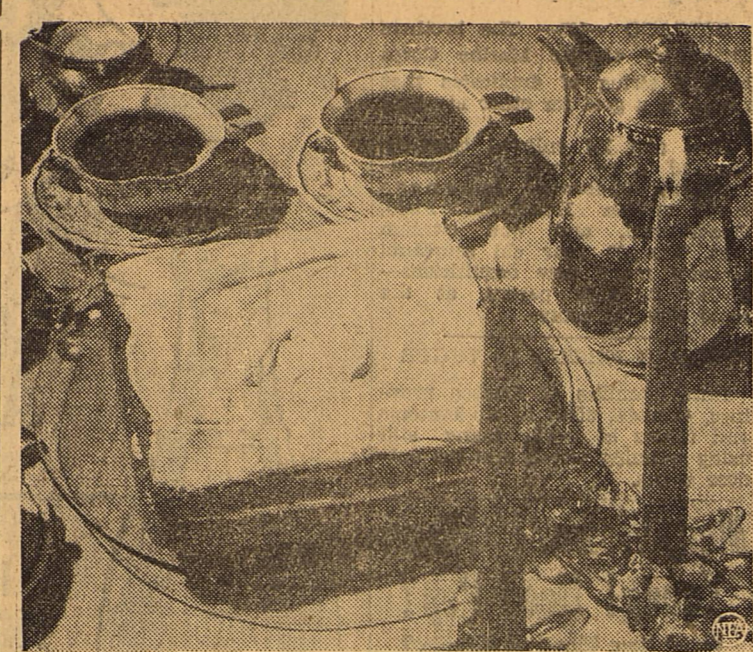

Seven Employes Of Dallas Bomber Plant Convicted Of Fraud

DALLAS —(P)— Workers at the North American bomber plant here, whose zeal and patriotism were questioned by Federal Judge J. Whitfield Davidson in sentencing seven of the plant's former employes, were quickly defended by Factory Manager H. F. Schwedes.

Judge Davidson Wednesday gave the defendants, who had pleaded guilty to conspiracy to defraud the government by falsification of time cards, sentences ranging up to six months in jail, and asserted:

"If one-tenth of what we hear is to be believed, there is no more patriotism within the walls of that plant than among those who would make a Roman holiday."

"One man, a fine machinist whose word I would not question, told me that his foreman came to him at his machine and told him to slow down; that he didn't need to hurry. The government was paying for it all."

"If such a situation had not existed, MacArthur who has pleaded for airplanes, might have had planes long before this with which to bomb Tokyo."

Manager Defends Employes.

U. S. District Attorney Clyde O. Eastus told the court that while some of the defendants, four of whom were women, were away from the plant on dates, one of the others would clock out their time cards at quitting time.

"The government," Eastus said, "was paying for the time they were away on parties."

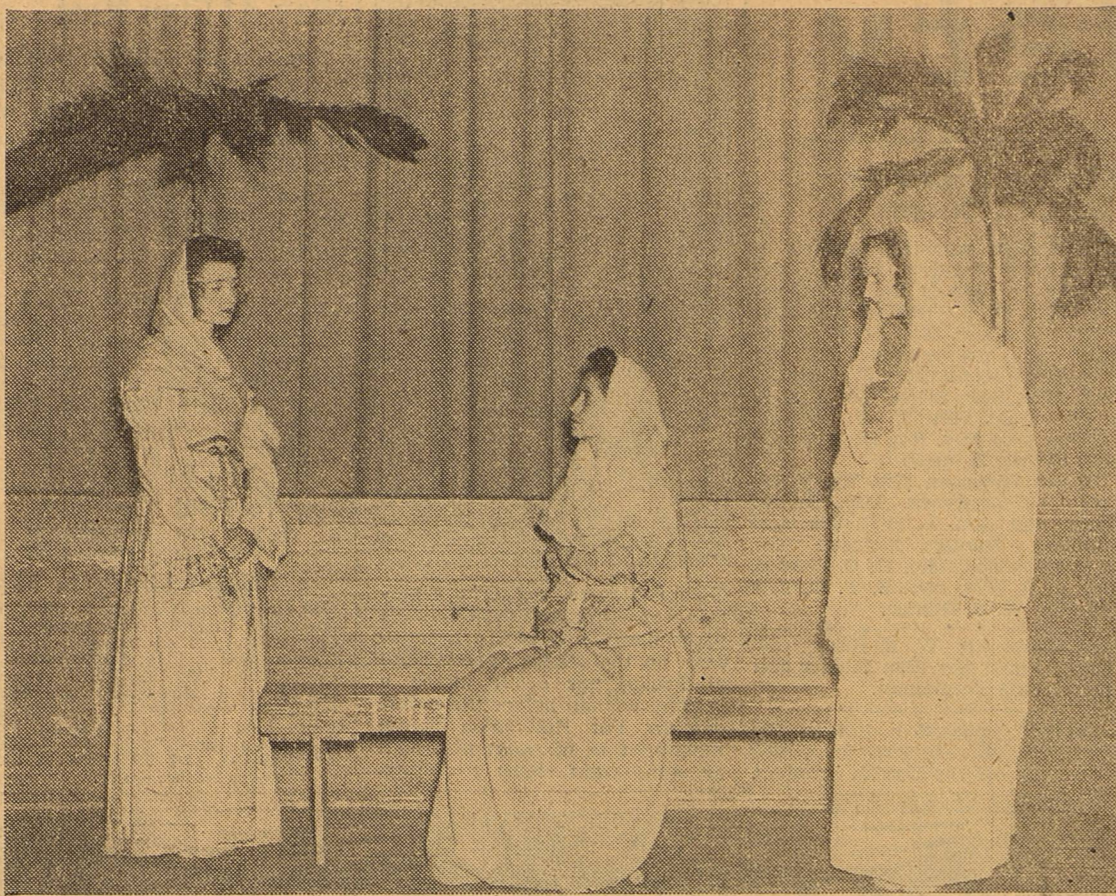
Schwedes issued a written statement that North American Aviation had initiated the investigation which resulted in the sentences and that the guilty employes were "an infinitesimal part of the working force."

"The overwhelming majority of men and women working in the concern's plants here, the statement said, 'have been honest with their government, with North American Aviation, and with themselves. They can look anyone in the eye and say they are proud of their part in the war effort.'"

Navies Lose Over Twice As Many Ships As In World War I

NEW YORK —(P)— Contending navies in 53 months of World War Two have lost more than twice as many destroyers as the belligerents in the first World War which lasted about two months less than the present conflict has.

Destroyer losses in the present conflict total 425, compared to 185 between Aug. 1, 1914, and Nov. 11, 1918, naval communice and semi-official sources indicate.

Figuring in the increase has been the global scope of present naval patrol and offensive operations, contrasted to concentration of such activity in Atlantic and European waters between 1914 and 1918.

Another factor in the increased expenditure of destroyer strength probably has been the airplane, a naval weapon of negligible value 30 years ago.

Plane attacks are known to have cost more than one in every five of the combined Anglo-American destroyer losses and an even higher degree of fatality among Japanese ships of this type.

Twenty thousand pounds of clothing were distributed by the Red Cross among 1,500 American repatriates returning from Japan aboard the Gripsholm.

Identical Twins Have String Of Duplicates

CHICAGO —(P)— The brothers Drieschart of the Marine Corps have a string of duplicates that might be a goal for other identical twins.

Paul and Ed enlisted together, received three promotions simultaneously, underwent Japanese bombings on Henderson Field, Guadalcanal, and won citation bars. The 22 year old sergeants recently made new acquisitions—30-day furlough papers, at the same time, of course.

THE WAR TODAY

The Soviet Union's startling extension of the sovereignty of its 16 component republics to include military and diplomatic affairs has left the outside world in the position of the scientist who has witnessed a phenomenon which he recognizes as having momentous potentialities but which he isn't able to explain with finality.

The reconstruction tends to create a commonwealth of such flexibility that other nations may become members irrespective of whether they are geographically contiguous to Russia. I cite merely as examples, the cases of Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, and Greece, all of which have developed Communist parties. Should they adopt the Soviet form of government, there would seem to be no reason why they shouldn't become members of the Soviet Union with the same degree of sovereignty as the present members have.

This also might be true of other countries whose political complexities have become doubtful since the war.

Post-War Problem
In short, the end of the European conflict might find the Soviet Union with considerably more than its present sixteen members.

Even if there are no acquisitions to the union, the present membership could create a tremendous problem in the construction of any post-war "League of Nations." The point is, of course, that since each of the component states of the union is privileged to have separate relations with the outside world, Moscow would in effect—should it insist on the point—have sixteen votes in a league of nations. All other countries would have one, excepting that the British commonwealth has six, counting its Dominions and India.

Now that's one of the rocks on which President Wilson's hopes of American membership in the League of Nations crashed. The United States Senate in refusing to join the league based its action in part on the fact that the British would have six votes to our one. This might result in the United States being voted into a position it didn't like.

Whatever may happen in the matter of multiple voting power, the autonomy of the sixteen Soviet republics will give the union great bargaining strength.

The Soviet reorganization also would seem likely to ease the way for reincorporation of the Baltic states into the union. As sovereign nations they have a right to join the Russian commonwealth.

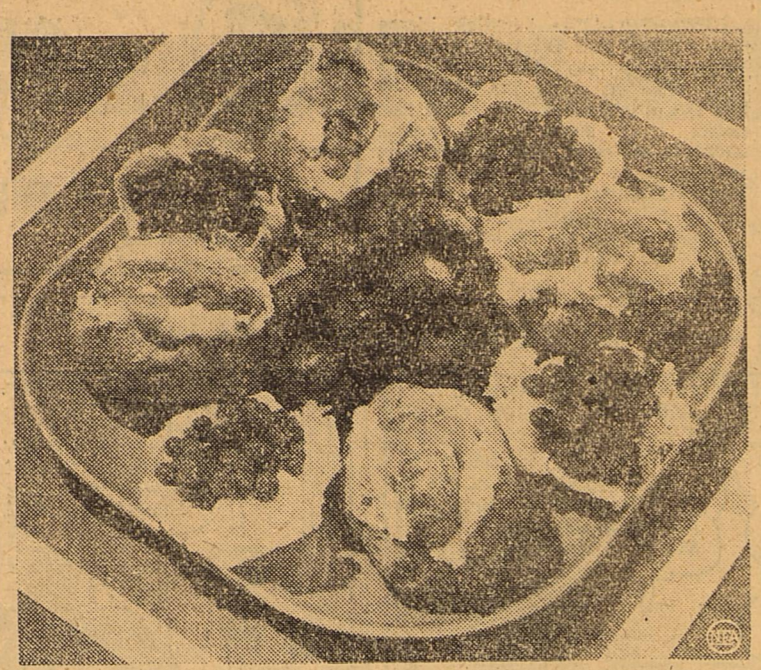

Vivid Vegetables Add Dash To Meals

Red beets and red cranberries give vividness to simple meals. Try serving a platter with baked potatoes stuffed with frankfurters, boiled and buttered beets stacked in the center, and cold cooked cranberries on the side, served in crisp lettuce cups.

For a winter vegetable, serve winter squash.
Baked Winter Squash
Two-pound piece of squash, 1 tablespoon butter or fortified margarine, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, pepper, nutmeg.

Remove seeds and pithy part of squash. Cut into serving pieces. Place in a greased utility dish with the rind side up. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees F. Remove from oven. Turn squash over and spread with butter or fortified margarine. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and a very little nutmeg and the brown sugar. Return to oven and finish baking in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 20 to 30 minutes.

Steamed Winter Squash
Squash, salt, pepper, butter or fortified margarine.
Scrub squash; cut into pieces; remove seeds and stringy portions. Peel if possible. Steam over boiling water 30 to 40 minutes or until tender. Remove peeling if still on fruit squash through a sieve or potato ricer. Beat well. Season with salt and pepper, butter or fortified margarine. Beat well. Serve hot.

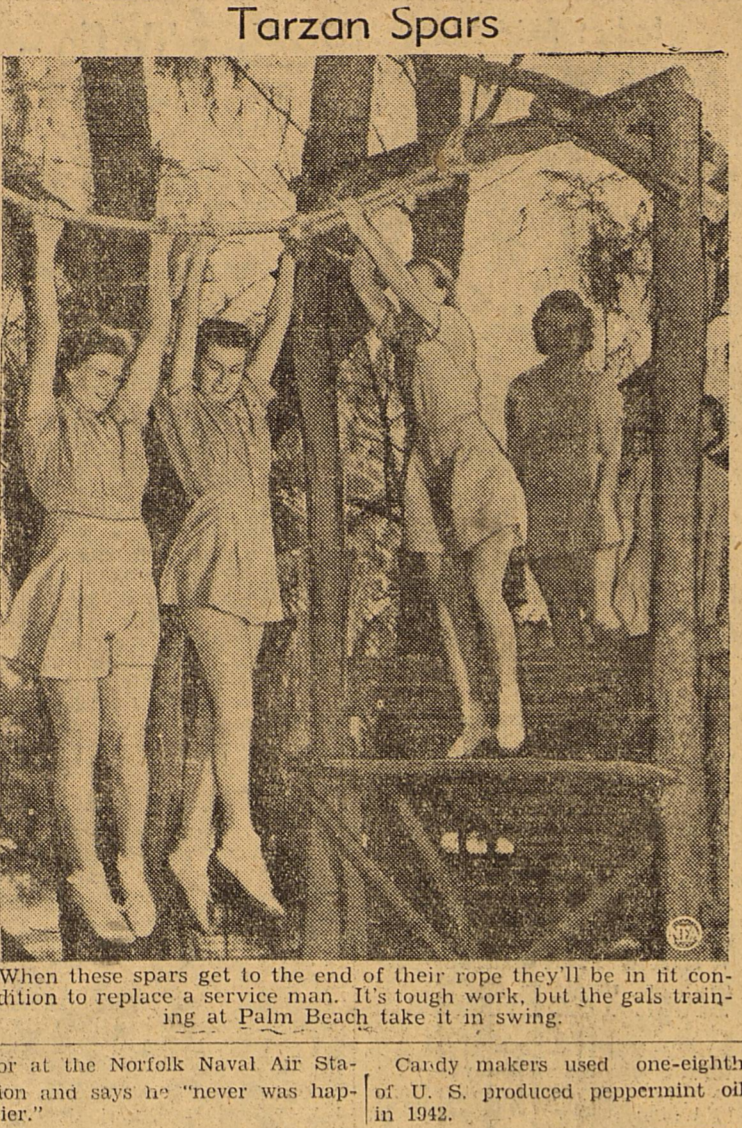
