## Army's Shortages Must Be Made Up From Family Men Artillery Fire At

Medical Commission Tells White House That Military Forces Can Use No More Limited Service Personnel

WASHINGTON -(P)- The manpower shortage for the armed services which President Roosevelt has called "grave" must be made up from family men and others, a special medical commission reported to the White House Monday ,and not by lowering physical standards.

The commission was created at the suggestion of Congress on the theory that a relaxation of induction requirements, especially for limited service, might delay drafting of fathers and others with dependents. But it reported existing standards could not be reduced "without impairing the efficiency" of the armed services and no more limited service inductions are needed.

The report will be sent to Congress Tuesday The commission proposed some minor changes in existing physical standards, but Major Gen Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service director, the quality rather than the quantity of inductees.

The commission, headed by the President's personal physician and surgeon general of the Navy, Vice Admiral Ross T. McIntire, made these four additional conclusions, based on refrom the Army, Navy, Selective Service and Veterans Administration:

"1—The services have reached saturation for newly inducted men for limited service since the need for men in this category will be fully met by men already in service.

"2—It is evident that the urgent and increasing need of the services today is for men for general service and that this need will progressively increase. "3-It is apparent that these needs can not

be met by lowering the physical requirements for admission to the armed forces or by increasing the induction of men for limited service.

"4—In view of the needs of the armed services for men qualified for general service, it is

Miller G. White, said there were only 7.482,000 officers and men in the Army as of Dec 31, 1943, a deficit of 218,000 in total authorized

strength of 7,700,000, Part of the deficit he attributed to inductions falling off 211,000, or 31 per cent, of the call for 675,000 in the last four months of 1943:
"After the Army reaches its authorized strength," he said, "there will be a continuing need for from 75,000 to 100,000 men per month to replace losses, and the majority of these men

must be qualified for combat service. He pointed out discharges are largely from combat units and replacements from now on should be of the best possible physical caliber 'since they will all be potentially front-line

He said not more than 10 per cent of the Army's strength can be composed of men who meet only present standards for limited service and there already are more than 500,000 men in

He concluded present physical standards thus could not be lowered in view of the "present large losses from physical defects, the emall number of remaining limited service positions to be filled, the necessity for high grade combat replacements from now on, the time loss in taking in too many

General Hershey said the principal causes for rejection of those in 4-F have been mental disease, educational deficiency, syphilis, musculoskeletal conditions and cardio-vascular refects. They account for half of those now in this class.

He said a review of the whole 4-F group would be made, but did not expect more than 8 per cent would be found fit for general service.



### School For Labor Problems

Both organized labor and private ownership are here to stay. Everybody, except a handful of ultra-radicals and ultra-conservatives will agree to that. But within what boundaries are they to stay? There you have the point at which unanimity of opinion vanishes.

We have been seeking the answer to that second question for years, not only without much success, but without much system. The search has been marked by improvisation and blundering, by hot heads and harsh words and bloodshed. War has brought us no closer to the solution. And the proposals and demands of most "postwar planners" do not offer much future promise.

But there is one cheering piece of news in the midst of all this chaos. A forthcoming bill in the New York legislature, already assured of approval, will establish a School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University, to begin operation next year under state control and sup-

It will be open to representatives of management and labor or to anyone interested, for that matter. All will be taught by the same instructors, and will tackle the same problems. The school's trustees will include, under the proposed bill, the heads of the New York C. I. O. and A. F. of L., the presidents of the state Chamber of Commerce and the Associated Industries of New York State, two members of the state legislature, the state commissioner of edu-cation, and the president of Cornell. All of them, incidentally, have already approved the plan.

The school's opening is being delayed for a year because it is felt that a competent and unbiased faculty could not be assembled at present. That decision, besides being wise, is a pointed illustration of how short a way we have progressed toward solving perhaps the most delicate and difficult problem of our economic life.

This new school offers no sudden Utopia, of course. Its reason for being is predicated upon the assumption that labor and management are going to take it seriously There is no orderly structure of tradition on which to build a curriculum. And if the interested parties bring their old animosities to school, and line up in the classroom like opposing armies, as they have too often done across the conference table, then the school's purpose will be defeat-

But that doesn't mean that it is not a sane, logical and g-needed approach to the industrial relations problem. After the war we will not need more labor boards and strike legislation to solve it. What we will need is a transfer of this problem to the realm of "higher learning." And an institution devoted to just that seems a good place to

## Germany, Badly In Need Of Labor, Puts Millions Of Slave Workers Into Agriculture, War Plants

of this dispatch, Taylor Henry, formerly of Palestine, Texas, who now is in Portgual awaiting repatriation, was Associated Press bureau chief in Vichy at the time of the German occupation and subsequently was interned at Lourdes, France, and Baden-Baden, Germany

By TAYLOR HENRY LISBON—(AP)— The latest available estimates of the number of foreign workers in Germany show

Germany are Russians, Poles and mans French, in that order, with the Russians totaling 2,500,000, the Poles approximately 1,000,000 and the French only slightly less.

An estimated 100,000 Jews picked up in occupied territories and sent to mines along the Polish-German frontier are also impressed.

The great majority of the foreign workers were earmarked for farms and were parcelled out among German landowners just as though they were slaves. In industry as a whole only 20 per cent are foreigners and many of these are

French specialists. But despite these millions of foreigners, the Nazis still lack possibly 1,000,000 badly needed workers. They are said to be short 500,-000 workers in armament industries 300,000 in agriculture, 150,000 for

transportation, and 30,000 miners. Although the Germans had counted heavily on the Russians, they have not been able to get much work out of them, principally because of the extraordinary number of deaths among Russian prisoners and the fact that the percentag of skilled workers among the Rus

A confidential source said that of the first 4,000,000 Russians captured by the Germans only 1,500,000 survived the rigors of German prison camps.

There is no Red Cross convention between Germany and Russia, con-sequently no neutral power looks after the interests of Russian pris-The deaths among them during

the first year of the war in the East reached a high of 15,000 daily, dropped to about 6,000 daily a year ago and now is said to have declined into the hundreds.
