Irish Culture

We don't mean to take issue with the late Mrs. George Bernard Shaw on the matter of Irish character. After all, Mrs. Shaw was Irish herself.

Our only point is that the Irish character must undergo a tremendous change when it is transplanted to foreign soil.

Take the matter of self-control. It is true that the individual Irishman has been known to indulge in an occasional brawl in this land of his adoption.

As for elocutionary deficiencies, our observation is again limited. But it happens that, though we have known illiterate Irishmen, we never knew an inarticulate one.

Mrs. Shaw stipulated that some of the income from her bequest might be used to bring masterpieces of fine art within the range of the Irish people.

Ireland gave the world one of its best contemporary playwrights in Mrs. Shaw's husband, and other distinguished dramatists, like O'Casey and Synge and Lady Gregory and Paul Vincent Carroll.

Shaw's acquaintances have said that he was painfully shy and practically tongue-tied when Mrs. Shaw first met him.

We hope that isn't the case. Brilliant as the aged playwright is, he is also inclined to be a little exhausting.

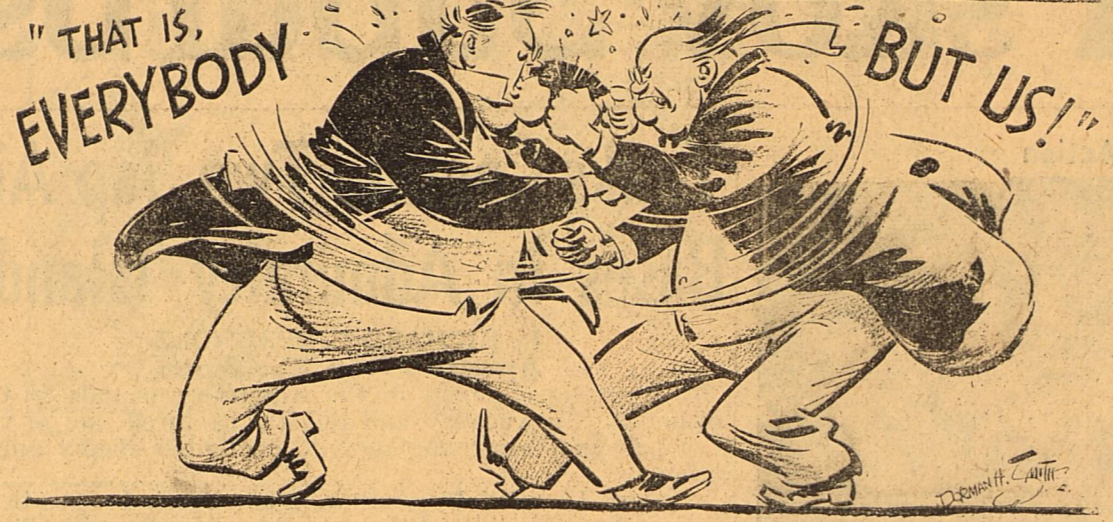

Louisiana Voters Name Hillbilly Bandmaster As Next Governor

NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—Louisiana Democratic voters rejected Tuesday a group of candidates for state office who advocated a return to the "liberal government of the late Huey P. Long" and elevated to the governorship Jimmie H. Davis, the author of "You Are My Sunshine", who campaigned with a hillbilly band.

In laying the ghost of "Longism," the voters also defeated the bid for state and party power of the "old regular" organization of New Orleans and its leader, Mayor Robert S. Maestri, unable during the second primary campaign to deliver an expected heavy majority from the metropolitan area.

LONDON—(AP)—RAF Mosquito bombers attacked objectives in Western Germany Tuesday night, an Air Ministry communique announced Wednesday. The British planes returned from their mission without loss, the communique added.

The overnight assault followed a heavy daylight attack by U. S. Flying Fortresses on the German aircraft center of Brunswick and a Liberator raid on the Pas-de-Calais coast of France, which were carried out at a cost of one bomber and eight fighter planes.

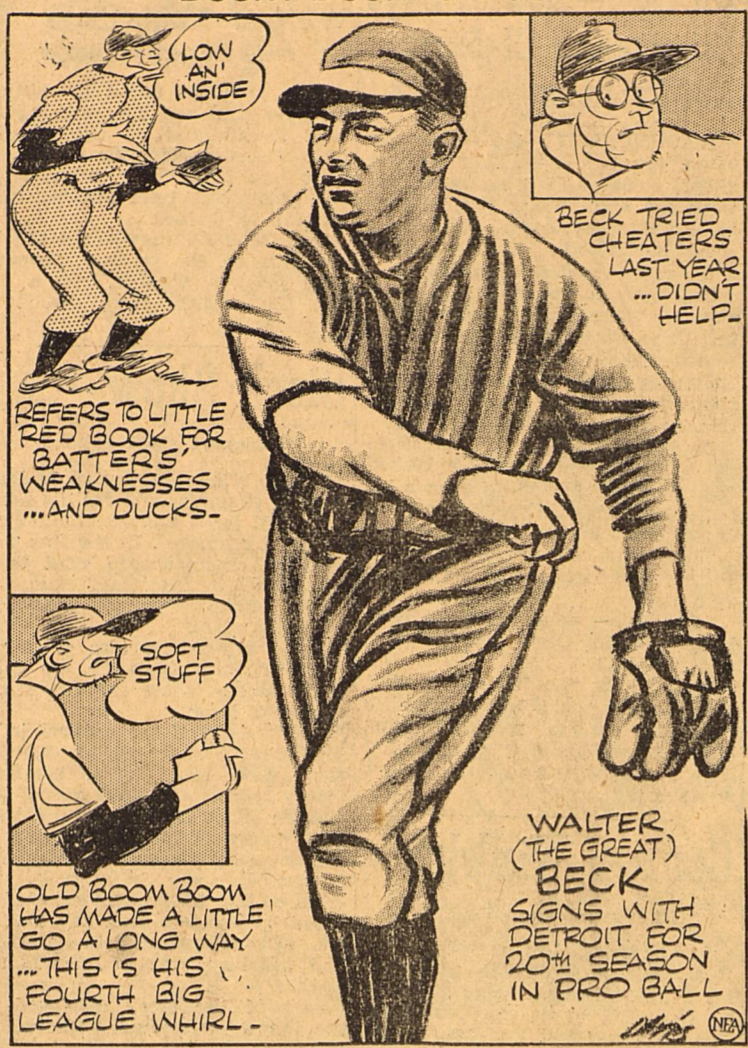

He wasn't at all cooperative until I hauled out two packs of American cigarettes and waved them under his nose.

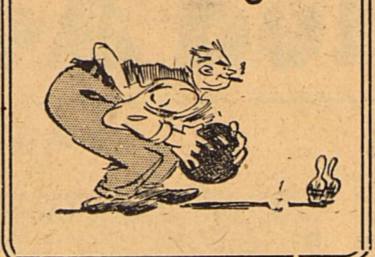
The barber went to work. I held a mirror so I could watch every move he made. He sweat so did I. Finally, an hour later, the job was done.

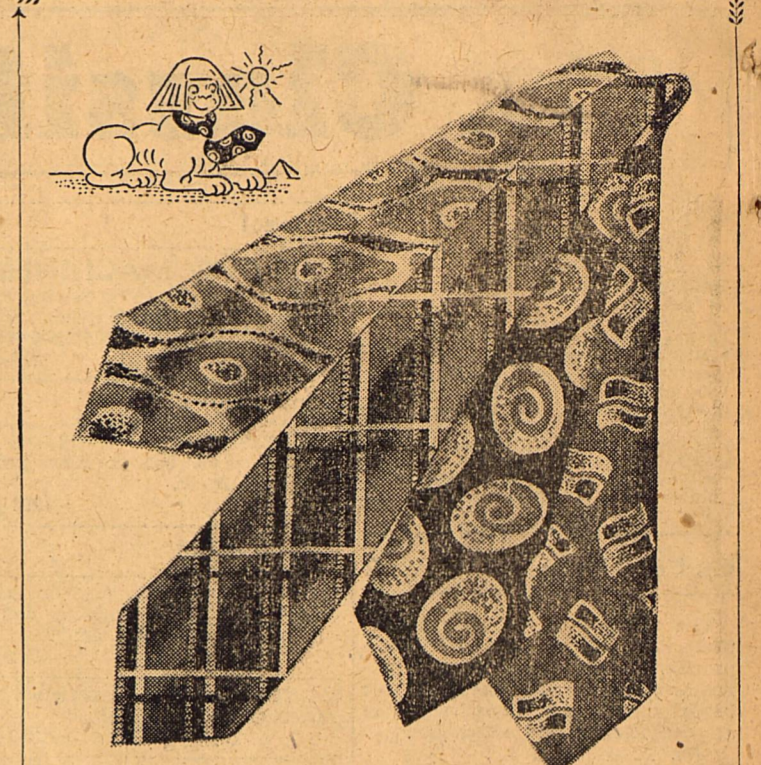

H. C. Slack, Pioneer Pecos Cowboy, Dies At Fort Worth

FORT WORTH —(AP)— Henry Clay Slack, 76, who took part in a rodeo—it was called a "carnival" at the time—at Pecos, Texas, as far back as 1883, died Tuesday night in a Fort Worth hospital after a two-months' illness.

Slack, who came here in December to live with a daughter, Mrs. R. D. Mahoney, was a native of Cotton Valley, La. He ran away from home when he was 14 to "go to Texas and be a cowboy."

His first job was on the old "W" ranch near Pecos in 1882. On July 4 of the next year, it was as a result of friendly rivalry between his outfit and the boys from the Hash Knife ranch that they roped off Pecos' only street for hopping, bulldozing and riding contests.

As he was the youngest lad of the "W" outfit, Slack led them in a parade up the street while untamed horses and cattle were rounded up for the event.

Residents of Pecos liked the "cowboy carnival"—the name "rodeo" was substituted later—and decided to hold one annually. Slack took part in the celebration for the next 60 years and traditionally led the opening parade.

Burial is scheduled at Pecos cemetery tomorrow. Other survivors include a son, H. C. Slack Jr. of Presidio and a brother, Jim, of Goldthwaite.

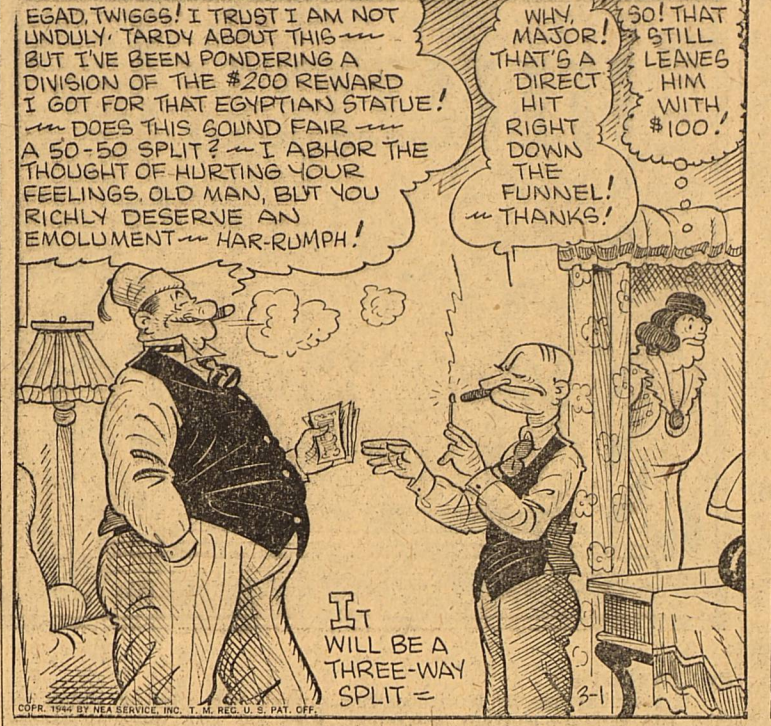

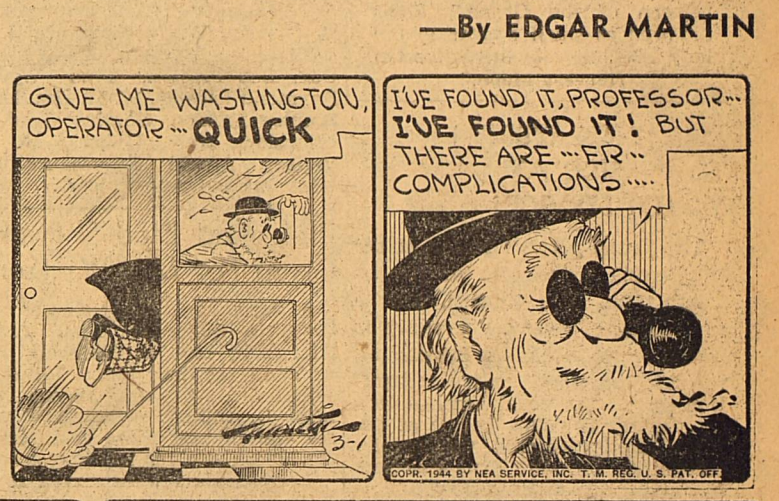
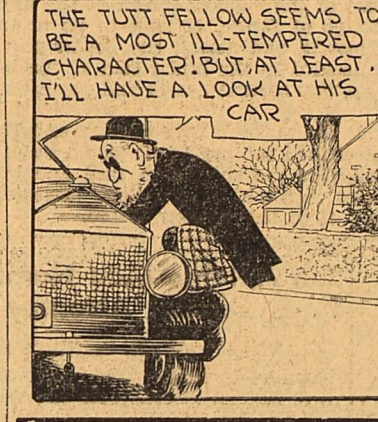

Texas Sworn In As Undersecretary Of Agriculture

WASHINGTON—(P)—In an informal ceremony in the office of Secretary of Agriculture Wickard Tuesday, Grover B. Hill, Texas rancher and wheat farmer, was sworn in as undersecretary of agriculture.

Hill succeeds Paul H. Appleby, recently named assistant director of the Bureau of the Budget. The Texan had served as an assistant secretary of agriculture and will continue to perform his duties as first assistant war food administrator.

Attending the ceremony were Vice President Wallace, Secretary of Commerce Jones, War Food Administrator Marvin Jones, Wickard, several Texas congressmen and more than a hundred associates of Hill in the department.

The other convict is Oliver Pichard, who was serving a 50-year sentence from Bexar County.

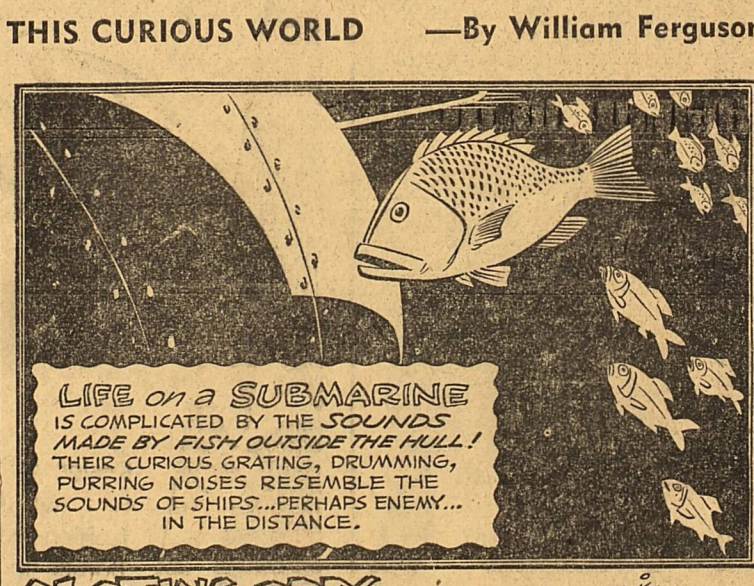

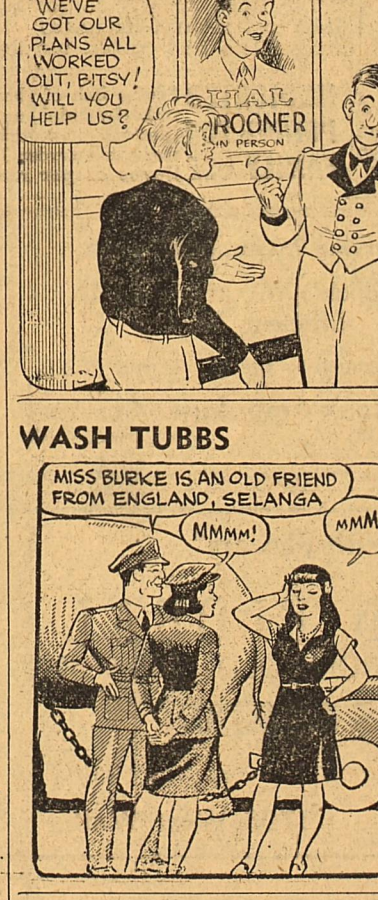

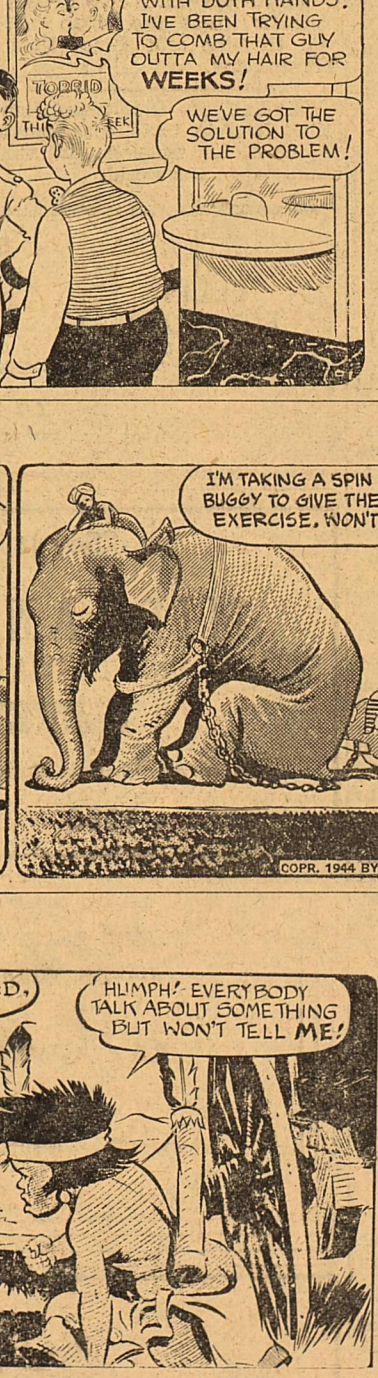
