

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES — (AP) — German troops, armed with a new "secret weapon" tank loaded with explosives, have slugged out in new assaults against the Anzio beachhead, and Allied headquarters said this may be a third great offensive aimed at driving the invasion troops into the sea.

The Nazis opened a heavy attack midway between Carroceto and Cisterna Tuesday morning, and this was growing stronger.

Artillery duels thundered, and front dispatches Tuesday night said the enemy had pounded the beachhead with the heaviest bombard- *ment since the initial land-

Headquarters disclosed the Germans had used new radiocontrolled tanks, bearing 1,000pound charges and designed to blow up within Allied lines, in their second major offensive against the beachhead, but that Allied artillery had exploded 14 of them before they reached the Allied line.

The Germans struck at beachhead at two points Monday and Tuesday night, and continued to "exert pressure" without result, headquarters said. There were no details on the

thrust against the eastern half of the beachhead between Corroceto and Cisterna, but if it develops into a major offensive, it would be the third attempt to wipe out the strongly-held Allied sector. Allied artillery and bombers lash-

ed back, with U.S. planes hammering Nazi troops and tanks massed in the Cisterna area. The Germans were probing the beachhead lines, apparently seeking a soft spot, and Nazi tanks appear-

Irish Culture

We don't mean to take issue with the late Mrs George Bernard Shaw on the matter of Irish character. After all, Mrs. Shaw was Irish herself. And if she chose to leave \$400,000 in her will "to teach the Irish self-control, deportment, elocution and the art of personal behavior," she must have sincerely believed that the Irish need the instruction. After all, nobody is facetious to the tune of \$400,000.

Our only point is that the Irish character must undergo a tremendous change when it is transplanted to foreign soil. And the manifestations of Irish culture that reach the outside world must be deceiving.

Take the matter of self-control. It is true that the individual Irishman has been known to indulge in an occasional brawl in this land of his adoption. It is also true that a son of Eire, one Mickey Finn, lent his name to a potent sedative calculated to rurb violence by more violent means. On the other hand it must be admitted that the Irish, as a government, have exercised too much self-control in keeping out of history's biggest fight, now in progress.

As for elocutionary deficiencies, our observation is again limited. But it happens that, though we have known illiterate Irishmen, we never knew an inarticulate one. In fact, we have frequently been impressed by the richness and poetic fancy that flows without effort from the most unlearned Irish lips. It even creeps into their pro-

Mrs. Shaw stipulated that some of the income from her bequest might be used to bring masterpieces of fine art within the range of the Irish people. If one does not limit fine art to the painted variety, a good bit of it has been produced by Ireland's own men and women.

Ireland gave the world one of its best contemporary playwrights in Mrs. Shaw's husband, and other distinguished dramatists, like O'Casey and Synge and Lady Gregory and Paul Vincent Carroll. Their plays were, in a happier time, acted by a matchless Dublin troupe called the Abbey Players. In addition, there is the poetry of such men as Yeats and Russell, and a heritage of native folk music second to none.

Shaw's acquaintances have said that he was painfully shy and practically tongue-tied when Mrs. Shaw first met him. Perhaps she regarded this as a prevalent national affliction and, seeing how culture produced the voluble, volatile GBS of later years, hoped that her bequest might work the same miracle on the whole country.

We hope that isn't the case. Brilliant as the aged playwright is, he is also inclined to be a little exhausting. And we doubt that an exhausted post-war world could cope with an Ireland full of G. B. Shaws.

Delay In Steel Wage Decision

Months of delay, unwinding of red tape and legalistic arguments are in prospect before any kind of settlement can be made in the "Big Steel" wage increase case now before the War Labor Board. This dispute, in which the United Steel Workers of America, CIO, are demanding pay base increases from 78 to 95 cents an hour, minimum annual wage and 20 other things for their 750-000 members, is now the number one wage controversy in the country because on its outcome depend the fate of the Little Steel Formula and the administration's entire stabilization program which CIO President Phil Murray frankly admits he is trying to break.

Steel company executives are pushing for early settlement. Union representatives can take the matter more slowly, since it is all to their advantage to do so. They have a telegram from the President himself saying that any wage adjustment made in their case will be retroactive provided the Little Steel Formula is not broken, and this assurance is officially confirmed by the War Labor Board. But with the cost of living advancing, with the possibility that subsidies will be knocked out to cause further increases, and with the Stabilization Act itself expiring on June 30 unless renewed by Congress, the steelworkers have everything to gain by taking it easy. The longer settlement is delayed, the greater is apt to be the wage adjustment they receive and the more the amount of their retroactive pay settlement.

Pleat it, and attach the border to the window frame with thumb tacks concealed in the under fold of the bias tape finish. If you like an extra fillip, buy several decals and paste them on the panes.

Another window dressing trick is the make-believe awning and bar-ber poll supports shown below. Bold-striped awning fabric would be your best choice. Use the stripes vertically for the shallow cornice and bind the scalloped edges. Cut the side strips on the bias, turn edges under and use rubber cement or glue to anchor it to the window frame.
