## U.S. Fire Bombs Smash Berlin

## American Fliers Hit Capital For Third Time

LONDON — (AP) — Strong forces of U. S. heavy bombers attacked Berlin Wednesday for the third American attack in a week against the German capital.

The Liberator and Fortress formations bombarded Berlin with more than 350,-000 incendiary bombs and 10,000 explosive bombs.

It was the American heavy bombers' eighth big assault in ten days, and came after only one day's interval since the last heavy attack on the German capital.

The American daylight aerial campaign against Berlin started last Friday when Lightning fighters penetrated to the capital. This was followed up Saturday by the American's first bomber attack, by one formation.

Monday's big attack was made by a force estimated unofficially at upwards of 850 bombers.

## Junior College Application Is Filed In Austin

With an application on file Wednesday with the State Board of Education for establishment of a junior college here, Midland's campaign of five years for an institution of higher education nears a climax.

The formal application was filed in Austin Tuesday by School Superintendent Frank Monroe.

Civic leaders recently circulated petitions which were signed by more than 200 taxpayers, asking the Midland Independent School District to immediately file application with the state board for establishment of the college here, which will receive some support from the state. After studying the proposal, the district authorized filing of the application and Monroe was ordered to take it to Aus-

Methods Studied For more than five years, civic leaders have discussed plans for establishment of a college here and various methods have been given thorough consideration. Even sites and curricula have been studied for the proposed college.

Among persons consulted in past years concerning the plan were State Senator H. L. Winfield, the late State Rep. Taylor White, Dr. Homer P. Rainey of the University of Texas, and N. B. Cluck, president of Cisco Junior College.



## Russians Hit Hard At Nazi Ukraine Line

LONDON —(AP)—Overnowering heavy German ounterattacks. Red Army troops driving toward Rumania are threatening to outflank the important junction city of Tarnopol on the Odessa - Warsaw railway, Moscow dispatches said Wednesday.

Russian spearheads Tuesday captured the town of Igrovitsa, nine miles northwest of Tarnopol and only four miles from the Warsaw railway, a Russian communique announced. Other forces operating east of Tarnopol actually severed the line in two places 20 miles apart.

## German Morale

Since the tide of war started running against the Nazis, we have been getting a variety of solemn and authoritative statements on the subject of German civilian morale. They have come from people who had been in Germany after the war started, people who had lived there earlier, people who had taken a Cook's tour of the Rhine country back in the twenties, or from folks who were just self-confessed experts in human nature, or confessed to an uncanny intuition.

They have assured us that the German people had caught paranoia from their fuehrer and that it was spreading in epidemic proportions. We have been told that they could only hold up while they were winning, and that when they felt the weight of Allied bombs their propagandabuilt belief in invincibility would collapse, and they would Nation Will Need go entirely to pot.

Well, these things may all come to pass, but they More Beef In '44 haven't yet. And the latest story out of Germany, from a readily believable source, makes it appear that they won't in the immediate future.

Their report indicates that the average German is either extremely stoical or extremely confident. It may be that he had been so stuffed with assurance of certain victory, sweetened by early Nazi triumphs and later distortion of fact, that he is only now beginning to realize the seriousness of his plight.

This news is a little disquieting, for most of us have indulged in wishful thinking about a crackup in the Nazi home front. Coupled with Prime Minister Churchill's rather gloomy summation of the Nazis ground forces' strength in his latest speech, it makes it appear that the day of

German collapse may be a long way off. Perhaps this is another pessimistic story that Allied authorities have been objecting to. But if it is true we should know it here at home, and plan and act accordingly. Surely and eventually we shall beat Germany, but it appears that it is going to take considerable doing.

BRISBANE, AUSTRALFA-If the United States decides to let its servicemen go to the polls for next November's election, the Commonwealth of Australia can give its ally some pointers on how to take the polls to the servicemen.

All persons over 21 in Australia's armed forces are and have been entitled to vote. The sixteenth Parliament extended the franchise to all over 18 who have served or are serving outside Australia. As a result, in the recent election of the seventeenth Parliament, about onetenth of the total ballots were cast by men and women in uniform.

Starting well in advance of the date for civilian voting, trained electoral officers traveled virtually all over the world to reach Australians stationed in Britain, Canada, India the Middle East, and on Pacific islands. So thoroughly was the job done that electoral authorities now truck, can be used by pipeline or calculate that all eligible voters oil company, equipped with radio, were reached except a few of the groups who were at sea with the Royal Australian Navy. Electoral officers used every sor


