

Reporter-Telegram Observes Birthday

Fifteen years ago, on March 10, 1929, by popular demand in Midland, The Reporter-Telegram came into existence.

In the two years, from 1927 to

1929, the population of the city almost tripled, increasing from approximately 2,500 to about 7,000. Those were the years in which the city grew from a prairie town to a modern city. The Scharbauer Hotel, still one of the finest and most modern hotels in the South-west, was built during that time and the Petroleum Building was erected to house the many oil companies which were crowding.

Paul Barron, who at that time was publishing a weekly newspaper, "The Reporter," asking him to make his paper a daily.

The Reporter went daily in January, 1929, and on March 10, 1929. Barron bought the opposition paper, known as "The Telegram," and published the first edition of "The Reporter-Tele-

'Vinegar Joe' Stilwell's Rapid Offensive In North Burma Surprises Most Optimistic Military Men

NEW HELHI -(A)- So fast is Lt. Joseph W. Stilwell forcing the fighting pace in North Burma that a crisis which will make or break this year's Burma campaign is now rapidly approaching.

Critics who once scoffed at the possibility of a major Burma action this year have begun to show surprise and real interest in the fact that. with limited resources, "Vinegar Joe" has forced his way approximately 100 miles into North

The leathery-faced general is rapidly confronting the Japanese with a major decision— They must draw forces from other Burma fronts to halt Stilwell's Chinese and American columns or permit him to accomplish his objective relatively unhindered. His aim is to clear the Japanese from North Burma so he can build a new link to the Burma Road which can carry supplies to fighting forces in China.

So far as seizing territory is concerned, Stilwell's show is the biggest operation going on against the Japanese this side of the Japanese-

Critics in this theater have questioned the military and engineering feasibility of General Stilwell's Ledo Road from Northeast India down the Hukawng Valley and on to North Central Burma, where it would hook up with the old Burma Road.

Stilwell's reply to both objections was given at a recent press conference when he said his forces had already accomplished what he had

been told here was "impossible."
"Vinegar Joe's" action in diverting his American infantry column into operations in direct cooperation with his American-trained Chinese is a direct revision of the first plan to have the column merely make a long-range harassing penetration of Burma similar to the operation conducted last year by Wingate's raiders.

Instead, they made a big left loop around the Japanese and came in 10 miles behind their ranks to spread confusion. Such liberty of action is perhaps not enjoyed by any other commander in the Southeast Asia Command. It is perhaps conceded to Stilwell because he is in command of all U. S. forces in the China-Burma-India theater.

The U. A. W.'s Forward Step

Ever since labor took the no-strike pledge, high union officials have expressed their disapproval of unauthorized work stoppages. But it has remained for the United Automobile Workers, C. I. O., to take the first, long-needed step to implement this disapproval with disciplinary meas-

Under a new and drastic policy, the U. A. W. will investigate all work stoppages or strikes by its members, will refuse "all services" to the members responsible, and will refuse to intercede in their behalf if management takes disciplinary action against them. In addition, the international union has instructed local officers to file charges and prosecute members responsible for work stoppages. If the local fails to do this, its officials must appear The War Today before the international executive board to show cause why such action was not taken.



Striking at race prejudice in this country, the booklet concludes that the United States should "clean its own house" so it can "stand unashamed before the Nazis and condemn, without confusion, their doctrines of a master race.' Southerners, in and out of Congress, recently have declared firmfor "white supremacy" in the South. The South Carolina House of Representatives two weeks ago adopted a resolution reaffirming "our belief in and our allegiance to established white supremacy. Southerners Object

This week a Kentucky Democrat Rep. May, chairman of the House military committee in Congress, attacked "The Races of Mankind." The booklet - written by two Columbia University anthropologists, Professor Ruth Benedict and Dr. Gene Weltfis—was published as 85th in a series on Public Affairs Committee, Inc. That committee includes a number of edu-

The booklet had been sold publicly for 10 cents since last October and was to have been used by the Army in soldier-instruction courses until May's attack blocked distribu-

Kansas Executes First Criminal **Since 1870**

LANSING, KAS .- (AP) -- Confessed slayer Ernest Hoefgen mounted the 13 steps of a new gallows at state prison and was hanged Friday morning, the first man Kansas has executed since 1870.

Hoefgen, 31, displayed no emotion "I'm sorry I couldn't die for my country and had to go out this way," he told Warden Robert H. Hudspeth at the foot of the steps. "I love my wife."

He glanced at E. A. Smoll, father of Bruce Smoll, the 18-year-old boy for whose murder he was beng hanged. Neither spoke. Young Smoll, a student at Kan-

sas State College, was picked up by Hoefgen on the highway, then shot and killed in a corn field, One Official Protest
Although it was the state's first hanging in nearly 75 years, the

only official protest came from former Warden Milton F. Amrine who resigned last month after 21 years in the state's penal service. He told Gov. Andrew Schoeppel he could not serve as hangman.

A telephone line was held open to the warden's office in case of

a last minute reprieve or legal move to stay the execution. In his last hours with prison Chaplain T. F. Rudisill, Hoefgen asked that pleas be sent to a number of persons over the state who would attest his innocence. But at other times he admitted the crime

and said he was sorry. In sending Hoefgen to his death, Kansas closed the record on nis criminal record in three states, including a hatchet murder of an Independence, Kas., man in Texas for which he had been sentenced to life imprisonment, but had

WASHINGTON — (P) — A subsurface AFL-CIO rivalry for prestige has intensified the campaign to smash the Little Steel formula so much that the War Labor Board has decided to seek some White House guidance.

In brief, the WLB will attempt to learn whether the administra-tion is prepared to have a showdown now with labor on wage ceilings and, if so, how to proceed. This was learned Friday as the steel industry opened its fight to have the CIO steelworkers' 17-cent wage demand thrown out of panel hearings on grounds that it is con-trary to existing wage policy.

The AFL and the CIO, both of which are represented on the War Labor Board, have a common objective of dumping the Little Steel formula or, at least, raising the 15 per cent limitation. But, being rivals in the organizing field, they are apprehensive of one another


