Aerial Blow Flattens Nazi Stronghold

ALLIED HEADQUAR-TERS, NAPLES — (AP) — Allied air power devastated Cassino Wednesday with history's greatest concentrated Armando, 14; Ana Maria, 6, and bombing attack, and Allied ground forces immediately charged in to drive the Germans from the rubble of the fortress town.

More than 1,400 tons of bombs were hurled on a target area of less than a square mile by every type of Allied plane in an armada of 3,000 sorties. Its goal was destruction of this

Shirley Howard **Conviction** Reversed

The State Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin Wednesday reversed and remanded the conviction of Shirley Howard of Midland who was sentenced to 45 years last May 26 for the slaying of J. A. Whittenton, 57-year old South Elementary School custodian.

Howard, a 31-year old ice deliveryman, was convicted of murder with malice aforethought by a district court jury here. Whittenton was shot and wounded fatally Nov. 8, 1942, on South Main Street. Howard is in the county jail.

A temporary insanity plea was advanced for Howard near the close of the trial, after he had testified Whittenton broke up his home and that he had improper reltions with Mrs. Howard, who committed suicide in August, 1942.



There is so much to be done. And labor and industry can do so much to help-if they will only leave their ball bats where they are.



Texas Co. President Rev. Mark Paddock **Expects New Oil Pools** To Be Hard To Find

eum discoveries will be less frequent and new production will be more costly, says the Texas Co's. president, W. S. S. Rodgers, "unless an entirely new or improved technique for locating oil deposits is eveloped."

Rodgers, writing in the firm's annual report, said his company believed the 1943 peak rate of crude oil production, approximately 1,500,-000,000 barrels, could be maintained in 1944 but that thereafter "the country can anticipate the beginning of a substantial decline in its ability to produce crude oil unless some large discoveries are made in the United States."

"This is especially true," he said, "if the Office of Price Administration maintains the ceilings on crude oil prices now in effect, because at present levels the independent pro-ducer in most cases cannot afford to incur the risks inherent in wildcat drilling."


