WASHINGTON—(P)—The invasion jitters are just beginning. From here on there will be "false alarms, feints and dress rehearsals" by the Anglo-American high command and phony reports and rumors put out by the Germans. This will continue until the smartest deceptionists on both sides of the English Channel have exhausted their bags of tricks in the greatest battle of nerves, preceding the greatest amphibious assault in history.

The quoted words are from Prime Minister Churchill's Sunday broadcast. His brief reference to the forthcoming attempts to deceive the enemy about exactly where and when the blow or blows will fall was interpreted here Tuesday as a warning to the Allied world to get ready for some strange maneuvers.

Surprise is one of the deadliest weapons in the Allied arsenal of attack, and the Germans are believed to be working along similar lines. They need deception primarily to arouse the underground

The Question Mark Remains

The opening paragraph of Secretary of State Hull's 17-point memorandum states that it was issued in response to "an increasing number of requests for information about various points in our foreign policy." But after reading the memorandum, it seems possible that Hull misunderstood what all the clamor was about.

What press and public unquestionably want to know is what steps this country is going to take to meet the swift and frequent changes in our Allies' policies and diplomacies. Instead Hull reiterated the declarations of the Atlantic Charter and the Moscow conference. Few Americans doubt the justice and wisdom of those declarations; fewer still doubt that we shall try to live up to them.

But the complexion of European events has altered considerably since the Atlantic meeting and Moscow. There are immediate problems to be settled before we can begin to carry out the laudable declarations, just as there are problems of reconversion and re-employment that we must settle here at home before we enter the age of helicopter, teardrop automobile and electronic heating system.

The most important new points in Hull's memorandum are his emphasis on our national interest as a primary fastor in determining foreign policy, and his statement that as the Four Nations (Moscow) declaration is put into effect "there will no longer be need for spheres of influence, for alliances, for balances of power.

The first point is significant because national interest has not been stressed in previous statements of American post-war policy. The second is important in view of the obvious fact that spheres of influence, alliances and balances of power are the object of recent Russian and British diplomatic moves. It remains to be seen whether Hull means that the United States will not be a party to postwar agreements embodying such arrangements. But certainly his memorandum gives no hint as to measures we will take to check the drift toward a division of Europe into Russian and British spheres.

So the biggest question mark in the public request for information remains. Will we continue to temporize with France, disavowing both Vichy and DeGaulle? 

This would horrify Tojo, but the enemies with him in death. sad fact is that his soldiers always Yank Mind Rebels have to prove to themselves that they are brave men; in contrast to the American, who never questions his own bravery but wonders only if he is a smart soldier.

The accent on bravery runs through all Japanese propaganda directed at Japanese soldiers and from the broadcasts of Tokyo Rose to the general issue postcards (almost invariably carrying picturization of Japanese victories or individual sacrifices) which clutter the camps captured by the Americans in the last year. Strange Propaganda

In the Gilberts, the Japanese lost nearly 5,000 men killed (or captured) on Tarawa and Makin. Promptly, the Tokyo propaganda machine, designed primarily to affect its own people, began grinding out a strange theme, not "get revenge!", as was the spontaneous American reaction to Wake Island and Bataan. It was, "be as brave as they were!'

Seldom are officers captured. They die, either in strange, pointless "banzai" charges, waving their long swords as they run against machine guns, or more or less ceremonially by their own hands. (The ceremony, using a grenade to blow themselves up, is not very impressive.)
