

Willkie Quits GOP Presidential Race

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A presidential nomination without strings floated enticingly close before Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York Thursday as Wendell L. Willkie quit the Republican race after losing a long-shot gamble for Wisconsin delegates.

Dewey, who reached for the prize at Philadelphia in 1940 only to find Willkie had grabbed it, stood far out as the leading possibility for *-

Nips Suffer Big Losses In Advance

Japanese forces are continuing to exert pressure all along the Assam front north of Imphal, but Allied troops have inflicted casualties on the enemy in ambushes laid along roads north and south of that Indian base, Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten's headquarters announc ed Thursday.

In Northern Burma, meanwhile, the announcement said, Chinese forces are driving the enemy steadily southward in the upper Modung Valley and are advancing on the village of Wakawng

The bulletin also disclosed that 24 Japanese planes had been destroyed in an air commando attack against the Aungban airfield in Central Burma Tuesday.

Fighter pilots who returned to inspect the airdrome on the following day reported that it appeared to be almost entirely de-stroyed by fire. The attack was a complete surprise, the communique said, and was accomplished with-out loss to the commando squadron.

More Thoughts On Taxes

Now that the Ides of March are past it may seem like reopening old wounds to bring up the matter of taxes. But the tussle with Form 1040ES is just around the corner, and the last few days have brought enough surprises to make the painful subject timely once again. So shudder and turn aside if you will-here goes.

First of all there is proof, in the proposed new simplifying law, that 50 million taxpayers can't be ignored. This year Form 1040 visited almost every American home. New mulititudes had a first taste of searching their brains and receipted bills for deductions, and puzzling over the choice of something or something else.

A great cry went up throughout the land. Congress A great cry went up throughout the land. Congress heard, and headed. For 30 years the income tax regulations had been growing increasingly complex. But in two months' time, the House Ways and Means Committee has cleared away considerable confusion. Probably the job could have been done even more quickly, for the basic principles of the tax law have not been changed. Many inequities remain. 

to file an amended declaration. That's one of the three means of protecting taxpavers against penalties for underestimating. The law requires "reasonable" estimates which can be amended once each quarter, if desired, on or before June 15, Sept. 15 or Dec. 15.

The other two protections are:

1. No penalty is to be assessed the estimate is based on last year's actual income (but at present rates and exemptions) and install-

2. No penalty is to be assessed if you estimate the tax within 20 per cent (33 1/3 per cent for farmers) of the final 1944 tax as fig-

ured next March. If you expect to go into the armed services, you'll have to decide for yourself when you "reasonably" can expect to be called.

Existence Was Doubted

Most of the Golgi bodies are so diminutive—about one-twenty-five thousandth of an inch in diameter -and so transparent, that ever since they were discovered in 1898 by an Italian scientist, Camillo Golgi, there has been doubt even about their existence.

The techniques which helped to verify them and at the same time demonstrated photographically and by chemical means that the little bodies were producing fats and pro-teins, are reported in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences by Dr. Leonard G. Worley, and his wife, Dr. Elizabeth K. Worley, of the department of biology, Brookln College, N. Y., and the Scripps Institute of Oceanography

What Made The Mystery The mystery about Golgi bodies was largely due to the fact that they were not generally believed to be visible until a tissue cell had been killed and its contents rendered visible with salts of heavy metals. Then the Golgi bodshowed up as rings, rods and networks. It had never been certain that these forms were not merely precipitations of the metal-

The corresponding living structures are in the form of minute granules and small balls, quite different in shape from the Golgi boodies of dead cells. These bodies have been known for years, but it had never been known conclusively that they are the living represen-tative of the Golgi apparatus of the dead tissue

Blue Stain Used . The Worleys used a methylene blue stain which did not kill the cells of their contents. This dye colored the little spheres a darker blue than any of the other scores of particles visible in the cells. Photographically the Worleys were able to trace the transition from the tiny living balls—their consistency that of overripe tomatoes—through the distortion process accompanying death, into the classical and familiar rings and net-

works discovered by Golgi.
Fully recorded, too, in the pictures was the behavior of the living Golgi bodies in the elabora-tion of fats and proteins. Each blue ball would begin to swell. In several hours its diameter might expand as much as 10 times, and its volume 100-fold.




