



It Was A Great Fight

The big fight between the right and left wings of New York's American Labor Party is over, and it was quite a scrap while it lasted. Who won? Well, that's

a little hard to say. The left wing won the primary election and got control of the state machine. The right wing walked out, leaving their opponents with the original party's name and whatever prestige clings to it. But they also left the other side with the charge of being Communist-con-

The left wing has denied that, of course. But the charge, considering its source, is not easy to laugh off. If the National Association of Manufacturers, for instance, had said the same thing, the defense would have been easy. The left wingers could have just yelled "Fascist" or "labor baiter" or some such, and let it go at that. But the accusation comes from labor men. They had attended the American Labor Party's birth, and had worked with some of the men who have now superseded them. It will take a lot of shouting to convince most people that these men are talking through their hats.

It is not surprising that when the Communists moved in with their aims, ideals, zeal and organizational ability, the more at 8 p. m. with Mrs. C. S. O. P. Griffin Talks To Midland Garden Club On Insect Control

The Midland Garden Club heard talk at its meeting Thursday in the home of Mrs. L. C. Link on insect control. O. P. Griffin, county agricultural agent from Big Spring, was the speaker.

"Regulating and working with natures own insect controls is the surest way to succeed," the speaker stated. Most trees are not killed by insects but attract sour sap from dying trees. For all except vine crops he recommended one part of a five per cent rotenone compound available commercially to 10 or 20 parts of dusting sulphur for sucking boring insects.

NEW YORK -(AP)- A uniform style for foreign place names was adopted by the three American news services Saturday to make it easier for the public to follow the

In an effort to end possible confusion over places appearing in the war news under more than one name, the Associated Press, the United Press and International News Service adopted in general the style of the National Geographic Society, but made certain exceptions to conform with American usage.

78 Exceptions

Out of 40,000 names listed by the society, the three news services made 78 exceptions in the cases of places figuring prominently in western culture, history or tradition under an anglicized form. These exceptions include Rome instead of Roma, Moscow instead

of Moskva, Athens instead of Ath-

enai, Limerick instead of Luimneach, Euphrates River instead of rat River, etc. Among the national geographic usages adopted are Romania instead of Rumania, Yugoslavia instead of Jugoslavia, Manchuria in-stead of Manchuuo, and Dnepr and

Dnestr Rivers instead of Dnieper and Dniester Foreign names for such words as "island," "gulf," "sea," etc., generally given in the society's lists in native form, are to be translated into English by the news services.
