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American Heavies Blast Berlin Nazis Say Yanks Take Wakde Island Defenses

Allied Forces Hammer Into Myitkyina

Powerful Allied offensives in the Southwest Pacific and in Burma Friday broughtcontrol of the important Wakde area of Dutch New Guinea and sent junglehardened veterans into Myitkynia, main Japanese base in Northern Burma.

American Sixth Army troops hopped more than 100 miles up the Dutch New Guinea coast from Hollandia for a speedy amphibious conquest of the Wakde Island area site of an important air base from which General MacArthur's forces might speed the clean-up of New Guinea and bring the Palau and Philippine Islands under air as-

Latest reports indicated the Americans had pinned the last Japanese defenders of Wadke against the edge of the 4,700-foot coral airstrip and were wiping out determined enemy mortar gun chews. On the whole, Japanese defenses were "negligible," Mac-Arthur said.



What Kind Of Television?

Postwar planning in the television industry has stirred up a bitter fight which has raged, without much publicity, for several weeks. The basic question is whether the present type of television will continue, or whether-and when-sets of considerable improvement will be made

The fight began when the Columbia Broadcasting System proposed that the task of eliminating technical bugs be divided among various laboratories now. In this way, CBS contends, high-frequency transmission of larger. clearer, more detailed images in color as fell as black and white might be ready soon after the war ends.

When television improvement comes, as it seems bound to, it must come "upstairs" in the radio spectrum. And this improvement will make present television equipment not gradually obsolescent, as was the case with radio development, but suddenly and completely worthless. So CBS opposes manufacture and marketing of prewar type television instruments while leisurely improvements

The Federal Communications Commission, which divides and assigns the radio spectrum, is in general agreement with CBS. James L. Fly, FCC chairman, has stated his opposition to any freezing of television standards at their present level for the sake of selling present-model

Opponents of the CBS proposal include officials of the Television Broadcasters Association and the National Broadcasting Co. Their arguments include the contention that present television standards satisfy legitimate demands; that manufacturers, now engaged in war work, Works Under Handicaps cannot be expected to work on high-frequency improvements as well; that such work would deny employment to returning veterans.
