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# American Artillery Pounds German Escape Highway Leading To Rome

# 6,000 Allied Bombers, Fighters Pound Hitler's Transport System

## 12 Rail Junctions Hammered By Aerial Raiders

LONDON - (AP) -Pounding Hitler's transport system with one of the greatest coordinated blows ever struck from bases in Britain and Italy, nearly 6,000 Allied bombers and fighters attacked Fortress Europe in wave after wave Saturday to carry the pre-invasion aerial offensive through its ninth consecutive day.

At least 12 important railroad junctions, five airfields, two aircraft repair factories and several railroad bridges were among the targets blasted by well over 6,000 tons of exploding steel.

Some of the attackers encountered fighter opposition while others made their raids unmolested, the U. S. Eighth Air Force said in announcing that 24 bombers and seven fighters were missing. In addition 11 U.S. medium bombers were lost in other phases of the widespread assault.

At least 49 Nazi planes were shot down in the main attacks by the fleet flying from Britain, bomber gunners claiming 13 and escorting fighters getting 36.

Apparently the Allied aerial at-

tacks were being carried on into the night. Air raid warnings were sounded in the Berlin area and the radio stations in other cities told of the penetration of enemy planes into the Reich.

## The Peoria Plan

The city of Peoria, Ill., has launched a community program that seems worth noting and copying elsewhere. It is a plan for rehabilitating and re-employing handicapped war veterans, and it has wisely been perfected before there is any considerable need for it.

The Peoria Plan started with the known fact that there are many jobs which partially disabled persons can perform efficiently. The planners asked industries and businesses to survey such job opportunities. Then the whole community pitched in and helped.

An Peoria called on district representatives of federal agencies for help. They knew that their efforts should tie in with legislation and plans for veterans now under way in Washington. But they also knew that the final job must be done at what bureaucracy calls the "local

In the case of handicapped men, the Veterans' Administration will see to it that they learn new skills, if necessary, in preparation for readjustment. But the government cannot do all. The Peoria planners decided that "delay is dangerous and demoralizing," and that their prime objective was to "conserve the greatest of all American assets—useful and self-respecting human beings."

It became a city-wide concern that handicapped veterans should resume their places in community life quickly, not as objects of pity or charity, but as normal citizens capable of making their own way in a worthwhile job. It will be difficult enough at best for wounded veterans to return home as different men from those who left it. But surely such a program as this will greatly lessen the psychic shock of disability or disfigurement.

Such a plan as this is worth thinking about in other cities. Concern for the returning veteran is a shining national exception to the domestic disagreement inevitable in this election year. Plans for service men, both sound and handicapped, are under way from Capitol Hill to be spent either in the hospital and working in a large victory the old fashioned "readying-up" the smallest crossroads town. These plans are a decent expression of gratitude and of a determination that victorious soldiers and sailors shall not come back to disil-





The cutting of the Via Casilina -Highway 6-would seriously impair the German efforts to make an orderly withdrawal of the large forces still fighting in the Līri valley.

Of the 17 enemy divisions reinforced with regiments or smaller units from other divisions which the Germans have committed to action south of Rome, eight are in the line where their escape would be complicated by the cutting of the Via Casilina.

These are the 715th Infantry and 29th Panzier Grenadiers, holding the line from the Cori area southeast through the Lepini hills; the 26th Panzer and 15th Panzer Grenadiers, who principally are facing the French to protect the southern edges of the Liri valley; the 334th Infantry, the 305th Infantry and the 90th Panzer Grenadiers, who are striving to hold off the Eighth Army thrusts up Highway 6 against Ceprano and Arce; and finally, what little is left of the First Parachute Division, whose tattered remnants are being pursued in the hills north of the Liri valley

## Examine Dress Both Inside And Out Before Purchasing

By DOROTHY ROE

Ever buy a new dress that struck your fancy in the store, and find the seams pulling out and the buttons coming off when you got it

This is a small tragedy that happens hundreds of times every day to the enthusiastic but often careless shoppers of America-a mistake that's easy to avoid with the exercise of a little care in selection.

A dress needn't be expensive to be good. If you don't have time for a minute inspection of the garment, one good way to make sure you get money's worth is to become with brand names on dresses, find one that suits you, and for it by name.

For the guidance of the dressbuying public. I have compiled a list of rules for judging the quality and workmanship of a garment:

Fxamine the fabric, inquire as to color fastness, possible shrinkfebric label. Most manufacturers now include a fabric label with their dresses, giving the content of the febric together with rules for cleaning or washing.

Look carefull at finishing details, such as bindings, buttonholes and buttons, and be sure the workmanship is good. A frayed buttonhole or a dangling button often is a tip-off to sloppy workmanship in other more vital parts of the dress

3. Be particular about the fit of the garment. Never buy a dress without trying it on. If it isn't the right size, don't buy it. If seams pull or bind, armholes are crooked, collar is ill-fitting-don't buy it. If standard sizes uusually don't fit you, try a different range, such as junior sizes or half sizes. The art of correct sizing has progressed to such a fine point in America's dress busitoday that few alterations should be necessary if you know your size before you start to buy.

Turn the dress inside out, and examine seams, shoulder pads, hem and inside finish. A well-made dress should have at least a halfinch seam allowance, all seams should be pinked or bound to prevent fraying, hems and skirt bands should be taped, shoulder pads should be well-made and neatly attached. The inside story of your dress is one you should never over-
