



the state would do additional paying on the roads if property owned would supply curbs and The roads are paved now,

but are not curbed and guttered. The highway officials said they couldn't be sure when the state would have money available for the project, but they said it would possibly be this

"You (Bovina) will have a chance of getting the state to do the paving if you have the curbs and gutters ready when the money is allotted," Crain said.

"We certainly want to cooperate with you," he went on, 'It will help looks of your town, make maintenance much easier and such projects are where the state can spend money where it will do most good."

With the state furnishing additional paving, it will be necessary for property owners to only pay for curbs and gutters. Also, the state will need an additional 10 feet of right-ofway -- five feet on each side of road--on Third Street and FM Road 1731. This, however, will not be used by state and is necessary only to keep obstructions from being placed too close to the streets.

Third Street and 1731 will be 64 feer wide when the project is complete with Highway 86 being 68 feet wide. No additional right-of-way is needed on 86, Crain pointed out.

DEMONSTRATING HOW to take a soil sample is Parmer County Agent Joe Jones. Three ways a person can take the tests are with the probe, being demonstrated here, a shovel, or an auger. The important thing in taking samples, Jones points out, is getting a composite sample of a complete field. This is done by taking from 10 to 15 samples by zig-zagging across the field and placing each sample into a clean container. The samples are taken from the top of the soil to about six or eight inches in depth. All of the samples from each probe are mixed thoroughly and then a small quantity is shipped to the testing station. It is important that no cigarette ashes or other foreign matter get into the soil samples. Instructions on taking samples can be obtained from the county agent or any fertilizer dealer in the county.



This type fertilizer placement is rather common where fertilizer is put on in 16 to 24 inch bands at right angles to direction rows will run. Fertilizer should be placed so that all plants will be equal distance from the fertilizer, not some 12 inches away while others right over the band.
