



How Soon Is Practicable?

Washington newspapermen were finally admitted to the mystery-shrouded precincts of Dumbarton Oaks after a week of what Undersecretary of State Stettinius called "reticence on the part of the international organization conference. They heard a statement of general agreement which the delegates had reached, along with Stettinius' apology for the "reticence."

They learned that the conference had decided on an international assembly of peace-loving nations, a smaller council with limited authority, and an international court of justice. This was encouraging but hardly startling. Substantially the same agreement had been reached in the Fulbright and Connally resolutions and the Democratic and Republican platforms.

It is good to know that the international conference has started down a logical and obvious road toward world peace. But if these foregone conclusions sum up the first week's accomplishments, the conference thus far could scarcely be called fruitful.

Have any further agreements been reached? Apparently "reticence" would forbid their disclosure. Stettinius defended this reticence by invoking other secret sessions, from his Constitutional Convention of 1787 to presentday congressional committees and political platform drafters. He emphasized that the only difference between bitter Pro and Anti Roosevelt cleavsuch sessions and Dumbarton Oaks is that the latter is "a matter of international as well as domestic concern."

Appeal To Spain



Dewey Predicts Early End To German War

LANSING-(AP)-An early end to the German war was predicted Saturday by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, who made it clear that the administration's agreement to keep him informed on foreign policy matters covers only discussions of postwar security and sanctions against the Axis—not military strategy.

"It should be hoped," the Republican nominee told reporters at a campaign tour stop in his native state; "that the German war will be over long before the next administration takes office on January 20, and that progress in the war against Japan will be so far along that plans will be well advanced if not completely executed."

Before continuing to his native Owasso, Dewey went through a round of private conferences with political and labor leaders.

It also should include the proper Army Post Office or Fleet Post Office number and the port from which it will leave. The return address should be complete.

Postage on all parcels must be fully prepaid—fourth class on packages over eight ounces, third class

AN EIGTH AIR FORCE FIGHT-ER STATION, ENGLAND - First Lt. Wayne J. Lanham, of Midland, Texas, recently helped set a new long-distance record for Britishbased fighter planes. He flew on 1,600-mile round trip to the Polish Corridor with an Eighth Fighter Command P-51 Mustang group.
