As American soldiers on Leyte Island continued their slashing attacks against demoralized Japanese troops, Radio Tokyo admitted Saturday that heavy U.S. reinforcements were landing and that the Philippine situation was serious for Nippon.

American airmen relentlessly pursued remnants of the defeated Japanese fleet in waters west of the Philippines. Evidence multiplied to indicate that the Nippon defeats in the sea battles of the Philippines were greater than reported official-

One estimate listed 40 Japanese men-of-war sunk or damaged.



LONDON - (AP) - Forty thousand Germans reeled northward Saturday in a scramble to get across the Maas (Meuse) and Waal Rhine and escape destruction at the hands of advancing Canadian and British forces who smashed the enemy defense lines in Western Holland.

Field dispatches from the muddy Dutch front said that the 50-mile-long German line from the sea to 'S Hertogenbosh had fallen to pieces and that it was evident a fullscale German withdrawal was in progress after some of the most stubborn fighting of the Western Front campaign.

The American people, being now in the mood for debate, might keep right on after the elections with a discussion of the part they should like to see this country take in the international security organization which the Dumbarton Oaks conferees have christened the United Nations.

It would be a good thing both for the sake of the people and of the public servants who will finally make the direct decision on our participation. There are some divergent opinions to be reconciled before we can hope to take our place in this United Nations organization. The sooner they are tackled and threshed out, the sooner our government can proceed in the assurance that it is backed by unity and good will.

Some questions have already presented themselves: Should the Constitution be amended to give treaty-ratifying power to a simple majority of both branches of Congress, instead of the present two-thirds majority of the Senate? How much authority should the permanent American member of the United Nations security council be given? Senator Connally Says Dewey Wants To Recall Only FDR

DALLAS - (AP) - Senator Tom Connally (D-Texas) predicted here Saturday night that "the people of Law Violation To the United States will not cashier or recall the commander in chief of our armies and navies in the midst of a triumphant sweep toward victory.

In an address prepared for a Senate Committee on Foreign Relations, said the presidency of the United States is "the most powerful and influential office in the entire world."

Connally said Thomas Dewey, the Republican presidential nominee, had expressed approval of social-progress legislation under the Roosevelt administration, "yet he abuses and denounces the leader-ship who conceived them (the acts) and led in their adoption."

Of John Bricker, the GOP vice presidential nominee, Connally said Governor Bricker knows Hillman (head of the CIO's National Politi-cal Action Committee) did not conrol the Democratic convention at Chicago. He supported Wallace for vice president and the convention selected Truman.'



USS Princeton Sailor Describes Carrier's Sinking

ABOARD U. S. CARRIER TASK FORCE FLAGSHIP, PHILIPPINE SEA-(P)-From his topside battle station aboard the light carrier U. Princeton, Chief Gunner's Mate Clark L. Zeiders saw the first Japanese aerial bomb hurtle down her, crash through her flight deck and start her on the way to destruction.

"A Japanese plane dived almost directly ahead of the ship from about 2,000 feet," Zeiders said. The dark-haired, swarthy survivor from Etters, Pa., said the bomb "looked like a 1,000 pounder, but appeared 10 times that large as it came down. Exploded On Third Deck

The bomb smashed into the hangar deck and finally exploded on the third deck with a great burst

On the bridge of this carrier, two days ago, I saw the first smoke curl up from the Princeton at 8:45 a. m. During the next few hours we looked on helplessly as explosion after explosion tore into the ship, sending a cloud of smoke billowing a thousand feet into the sky. What happened on the carrier itself was related by the 25-yearold Zeiders and six other survivors who were brought aboard this ship. Two of them once before made the same fight to live when the original Wasp and Hornet were sunk
